

MICHIGAN BANKER THUGS' CAPTIVE, BUT SAVES COIN

ARGYLE, Mich., Oct. 31.—Two men and a woman last night entered the home of Henry Prentiss, cashier of a private bank here, and held Mr. and Mrs. Prentiss captive more than half the night while they attempted to compel him to open the bank safe. They finally shot the banker in the leg, fracturing the bone, when he attempted to escape.

While the woman-bandit watched over Mrs. Prentiss the men searched Prentiss to the bank where he told them he did not know the combination. They returned him home where the five partook of an early morning breakfast prepared by the woman robber.

the robbers that Mrs. Don Herdell, assistant cashier, knew the combination of the safe and they then escorted him to the Herdell home. Herdell answered the door bell. When one of the robbers shoved a revolver in his face, Herdell hit him and slammed the door. Prentiss, taking advantage of the situation, also struck the bandit and fled. He was shot through the right leg as he ran.

Returning to the Prentiss home, the two men joined their woman companion and fled. They obtained only \$15 from the Prentiss home.

Today Prentiss was in a hospital and his wife was under the care of a physician as a result of nerve shock.

The home of Duncan McKelth in Yale, Mich., was entered and robbed in a similar manner three weeks ago. McKelth, cashier of the Yale bank, failed an attempt to force him to open the bank safe.

HIGHWAY BOARD TO SIT IN ROSEBURG ON NORTH UMPQUA ROAD

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 31.—The highway commission

late yesterday announced that a hearing would be held at Roseburg, at a date to be announced later on a petition for creation of a super-road district to be known as the Diamond Lake-North Umpqua highway district. The district would be formed to levy taxes for a road to Diamond Lake up the North Umpqua river. Boundaries of the proposed district will be among questions to be threshed out at the Roseburg hearing.

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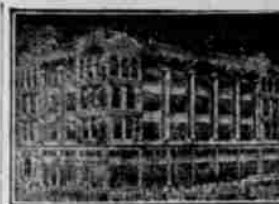

DENTAL SURVEY OF SCHOOLS OF COUNTY BEGUN

A dental survey of school children, sponsored by the Douglas county health unit and the state dental unit, was begun today by Dr. Estill Brunk, who represents the state board. He examined the students of the Rose school for defective teeth and throat ailments, and later he will go to other schools of the city and the larger schools of the county. He expects to continue the work until the middle of December, but because of the limited time he can spend in this county, not all of the schools can be visited.

The survey is for the purpose of securing information as to the prevalence of defective teeth among school children. If the returns from Dr. Brunk's work show a large number of cases needing attention, an effort will be made to have dentists go to the schools for a short period of time, doing dental work for a fixed price, extracting and filling being done at moderate cost to the students. If proper care of the teeth will doubtless raise the standard of health among the schools of the county.

SENATOR OVERMAN AND WIFE WEDDED HALF A CENTURY

H. SCHUMANN-HEINK ON THEFT CHARGE

AUTOIST EXONERATED FOR PORTLAND CHILD'S DEATH

PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 31.—Maxine Hamilton, 3, was killed and Betty Wilson, 11, injured when hit by an automobile driven by J. R. Cassady, 24, on a road in an outlying district late yesterday. Cassady was exonerated when officers found he had applied his brakes in an effort to avoid hitting the children, who had failed to see the approaching car.

PENITENTIARY PRISONERS PREPARE FOR EARLY SHOW

SALEM, Ore., Oct. 31.—Prisoners at the Oregon state penitentiary are rehearsing for the annual prison show, which will be given on the nights of November 7, 8 and 9. The feature attraction will be "Brown's in Town," a farce comedy. This will be followed by a vaudeville entertainment participated in by 16 actors, colored, some by nature and some via burnt cork. Plantation melodies will be featured.

The cast this year is said to be exceptionally strong, and will include the imitable Fred Taylor, a colored boy. Taylor rarely misses a show. Once in a while he happens to be out of prison when the show is given, but usually gets back in time for the next one. His latest offense was implication in the burglary of a wholesale tobacco house in Salem, for which he got five years.

The prison jazz band will accompany the show. The proceeds will go to the prison amusement fund.

STUDENTS WILL TRY TO SOLVE MORALS PROBLEM

SEATTLE, Oct. 31.—To assemble "student opinion of moral problems," a committee has been selected from the University of Washington student council, a group composed of heads of campus organizations. The action follows closely on President M. Lyle Spencer's disclosure of reported drinking at the university and his appeal for student cooperation in meeting the situation.

An attempt will be made to determine what the student body thinks about the drinking problem. It was indicated, but just what method will be used will not be decided upon until next Tuesday night when the board meets again.
