Three Hundred Eighty-Eight Seats in House of Representatives to Be Filled at Election on November 6

WASHINGTON, Nov. 1.—An even 400 of the 435 members who were on the roll of the house of representatives at the last session of congress sought this year to retain their seats for another term. Three hundred and ninety-two of them hurried the process and, with the exception of four already elected in Maine, will submit their cause to the voters November 6.

Besides the eight who failed of re-election, 35 passed out for other reasons, four having resigned and 26 having decided not to run again. Death claimed five, three just before the session ended and two during the recess.

Voluntary Changes
Six of those who elected to quit the house sought nomination to the senate, and three others became candidates as their party choice for governors of their states. Three—Tom Connally of Texas, Theodore E. Burton of Ohio and Charles E. Winter of Wyoming—were successful in their quest for senatorial nominations, but only one, Martin L. Davey, of Ohio, won a place on the gubernatorial ticket.

In addition to Connally, Burton, Winter and Davey, among the outstanding figures who will be missing from the house for 24 years, failed to realize his ambition to become a senator. He was defeated in the Tennessee primaries by Senator Kenneth McKellar.

Blanton, too, was unsuccessful in his fight for a senatorial nomination, both he and Senator Earle B. Mayfield going down before the genial Tom Connally in one of the hottest scraps for a senatorship the Lone Star state has known in many years. Another democrat who sought to unhorse a senator, T. Webber Wilson, was defeated in the Mississippi primaries by Hubert D. Stephens.

Where Davey was successful in obtaining the democratic gubernatorial nomination in Ohio, "Jim" Begg, one of the rising leaders in the house republican ranks, failed to receive the republican nomination, which would have brought him into a contest with his house colleague in November. A second member of the house who failed to obtain a republican gubernatorial nomination was Joseph D. Beck of Wisconsin, one of the LaFollette group of independents, who was defeated by Walter J. Kohler.

Combs, the youngest member of the house, who now is serving his

first term, did not offer for re-election, choosing to resume the practice of law in his home city, but Hersey, a Maine veteran of six sessions, went down to defeat before Donald F. Snow, who was elected in the Pine Tree state last month.

Dem's Remedy Two
Since the first full last May death has removed two prominent members of the house, Henry R. Bathhouse of Illinois and Louis A. Frothingham of Massachusetts. Just before the session ended three other veterans answered the last roll call—Thomas Butler of Pennsylvania, chairman of the naval committee; Martin H. Madden of Illinois, chairman of the appropriations committee; and James A. Gilman of Massachusetts, who was leader of the wet forces.

Six Women in Race
All four of the women now members of the house—Florence P. Kahn of California, Edith Nourse Rogers of Massachusetts, Mary T. Norton of New Jersey and Katherine Langley of Kentucky—are candidates for re-election. In addition two other women, both daughters of once outstanding figures in the republican and the democratic parties, seek house seats.

Ruth Hanna McCormick, daughter of Mark Hanna, is a candidate for representative at large from Illinois, having defeated Representative Richard Yates in the republican primaries. Yates, however, has since been appointed as a candidate in place of Bathhouse.

Ruth Bryan Owen, daughter of William Jennings Bryan, seeks election to the house from the fourth district of Florida. She defeated Rep. William J. Sears in the primaries last spring and generally nomination in that state is tantamount to election.

Party Leaders Survive
All of the leaders of the republican party came through the primaries. N. C. C. Longworth, speaker, is up for re-election in Ohio; John Q. Tilson, floor leader, has been renominated in Connecticut; and Bertrand H. Snell, chairman of the all powerful rules committee, successfully weathered the New York primaries.

Among the democrats John Garner, ranking member on the ways and means committee, and William A. Oldfield, the democratic whip, have been renominated. Garner probably will be democratic candidate for speaker of the house and if Longworth is re-elected, as he will be if the republicans retain their majority, will succeed Garner as pilot of the minority forces.

With the present membership of the house standing at 237 republicans, 195 democrats and three scattered, the democrats in order to obtain control of the house machinery would have to make a net gain of 24 seats. This they claim they will be able to do, but the claim is vigorously disputed by the republicans, who declare they are certain to hold their present margin, with the possibility of increasing it slightly.

National Dairy Show Grand Champion Cow

Another Record For RICHFIELD

FLYING the Lockheed-Vega monoplane "Yankee Doodle," using Richfield Aviation Gasoline, Captain C. B. D. Collyer, round the world record holder, established a new east to west transcontinental non-stop record—shattering the Army record that has stood since 1923.
