CRASH KILLS ONE FLYER, ERROR IN 'CHUTE ANOTHER

NEWPORT NEWS, Va., Nov. 2.—A mid-air collision of two planes from the Langley Field tactical school yesterday resulted in the death of one pilot, Captain Robert A. Archibald, of the marine corps, while the other, Captain Earl J. DeFord, also of the marine corps, landed safely by means of his parachute.

Archibald, like DeFord, attempted to make a parachute drop, but putting the rudder a moment too soon, the parachute became entangled in the tail gear of his plane and he was hurled to the ground.

The direct cause of the collision is unknown. Both pilots were considered capable aviators.

Archibald is survived by a widow and several children. His home was at Brighton, Mass.

CHICAGO, Nov. 2.—Julian J. Farrell, youngest son of Arthur Farrell, Chicago millionaire, was killed in a crash yesterday when his airplane plunged to earth at Chanute field, Kansas.

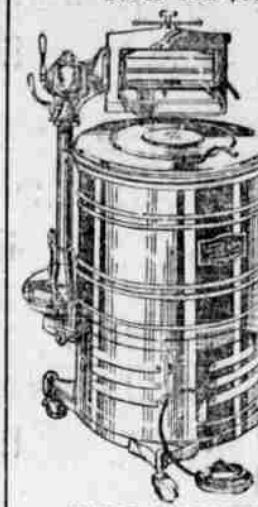
