THREE COSTUMES FOR WEEK END PARTY

Bendel Chooses a Suit, Evening Gown and Ensemble

NEW YORK, Nov. 2.—The week-end house party for the big football game is one of the most important dates in a young girl's life.

The kind of time she has depends largely upon the clothes she carries along. Girls in their teens are apt to have a self-consciousness that can be overcome if they are sure they look their best and that other guests are casting admiring glances at the various costumes they wear.

Three changes of costume are enough for a week-end. If a girl chooses wisely. And of course a topcoat, preferably of fur.

First there is the suit or ensemble she travels in, which in some ways is the most important, since she wears it when she makes her first impression on the party. And every woman knows how important first impressions are!

May Be Semi-Formal

If she chooses this with taste and discretion, it will be formal enough to give her a feeling of perfect grooming and appropriateness when she arrives and yet snappy enough to make her the cynosure of envious eyes when she wears it Saturday morning for whatever informal entertainment the boys have planned.

Second, there is the evening gown for the ball given after the team has won. This should be one of those desirable gowns that is perfect when it is a formal affair and not too lavishly decorative should the dance turn to more informality.

Lastly, there is the dressy suit or ensemble for Sunday wear, and sometimes to wear for the game itself. If the girls decide to be as ornamental as possible to the occasion reserved for the house party.

I have selected three costumes and a coat that seem to be ideal for a week-end house party.

For the traveling suit and perhaps the game, I suggest a smart tweed suit, in beige and rust red. It is dashing, very chic and colorful. The short coat is simple, tailored.

For the formal dance, nothing could be lovelier than a dawn pink tulle taffeta from Lanvin. It has a very full skirt, achieved by a rather intricate circular cut with a charming overskirt over a dro skirt with longer sides. The draped bodice has one peplum side and one side tied. The loveliest touch of all is the dainty little curtain bertha, sparkling decorated by paillettes in three shades of pink and silver.

For the formal suit, nothing is a better choice this season than a winered velvet suit. It has a charming slender line to its straight coat that still has a roomy cut. The skirt is slender lined, also, with a wraparound skirt that allows freedom for walking.

The coat's collar and muff are distinctive touches. A little racoon choker ends in a very full ruffle of the velvet. A little racoon muff has full velvet ends so that it seems to be a mere continuation of the cuffs. The little toque of matching velvet has rose beige velvet flowers over one ear.

With this two blouses can be worn, one very formal of metal cloth or lame, the other of flat crepe, handkerchief in velvet. One is appropriate for an informal tea dance while the other is perfect if she chooses to wear this suit to the game.

FLOWER TALKS

Editor's Note: This is one of a series of "Flower Talks" suggesting to News-Review readers what and how to plant gardens this fall in preparation for next year. The articles are written for NEA Service by Romaine B. Ware, magazine contributor on horticulture.

This is the season of the year to plant new perennial borders and to make over the old ones. Borders have taken the place of the old fashioned flower beds and it is not considered good taste to plant things out in the center of the lawn area. The lawn should be left open as a foil for the borders that surround it. Many of our yards are small. If they are cluttered up with flower beds—no matter how beautiful the flowers may be—they are spoiled.

Nearly all of the hardy flowers may be planted in the fall and then they are all ready to start growth early in the spring. Sections where the winters are very severe are an exception and there planting is best deferred till spring.

The general rule is to plant the outer edges of the property and leave the center open. At the extreme edge of the property line there should be a fence; inside of

that should be planted a screen of shrubbery as a background and in front of this, where they will show to the best advantage, plant the flowers.

The perennial border is not made up strictly of perennial flowers, but should contain a great variety of things so that it will have masses of color at all times during the growing season. Bulbs are needed for early spring, a variety of perennials for later bloom, and in midsummer the annuals are indispensable to make gay masses of color.

The true measure of the successful border is that it shall have good masses of color throughout all of the season. This is not an easy thing to do and it is well worth your careful study. There are two books, found in many of the public libraries, that will help you: "Studies in Gardening," by Arthur Clifton Brock and "Color Schemes for the Flower Garden," by Gertrude Jekyll.
