He had a son and a daughter in the machine with him and both were injured, the son losing two fingers from one hand and suffering numerous cuts and bruises. The girl was not seriously hurt. The accident was caused, according to the measure taken, given the brother here, when a motorist was racing a train and ran into Mr. Hercher's machine.

ANTARCTIC MAY PROVE TO BE LAST WORLD CONTINENT

NEW YORK, Nov. 5.—(A. P.)—

The possibility of discovering a

new continent—probably the last

in the world—lies in the scope of

the Wilkins expedition to Ant-

arctica.

This expedition of two planes,

three flyers and a mechanic is

headed for that great sector of A-

merica which no man has seen, a

stretch about as long as the United

States is wide. That geographers

have said may be separated from

Antarctica by an ice-capped strait.

So completely unknown is most

of this area that any additional

knowledge whatever will go far to

ward permanent conclusions about

its structure.

Like Tadpole in Form

On present maps, Antarctica is

shaped somewhat like a tadpole,

its head toward Australia and its

tail projecting far northward to-

ward South America. From Cape

Horn to this tail is less than 1,000

miles, but everywhere else an

ocean about as wide as the North

Atlantic surrounds Antarctica.

From the tail of the tadpole, down

the west side, is the largest un-

known portion of the frozen con-

tinent.

It is this portion that Wilkins

proposes to explore, starting from

the tail tip. The far end of this

stretch lies near the base of the

Byrd expedition, on the east side

of the tail is Weddell Sea, a great

indentation in Antarctica, which,

if it connects with Ross Sea, makes

a separate continent of the land

over which Wilkins plans to fly.

Geographers have assumed that

this area is land, and that there

is possibly a connection between

the two seas named.

Wilkins himself has said he be-

lieves the unknown coast is low.

Elsewhere in Antarctica the known

coasts are high.

CHINESE PIRATES SHOOT AMERICAN, ROB 2 OTHERS

HANKOW, China, Nov. 5.—Hon-

ry Henley, an American who was

formerly manager of a Hankow

firm, today had a shattered thigh,

sustained when pirates shot him

during a robbery on the steamer

Shanxi of the China Navigation

company.

and Mrs. Pepper, were robbed

when the pirates looted the cabin

of property valued at \$7,500, sailing

a Chinese business agent and

escaped in a launch. Mr. Pepper

is believed to be Nathaniel Pe-

pper, a magazine writer.

FIRST SHOT IN '61 FIRED BY TEXAS LAW TEACHER

AUSTIN, Texas, Nov. 5.—(A. P.)—

Credited with having fired the

first shot on Fort Sumpter in the

Civil war, Judge William Ste-

venson, at the age of 87, still

walks several blocks to law classes

at the University of Texas and

lectures them on "how to behave

when you get out of school."

The board of regents of the uni-

versity has released him from a

regular professor's duties, but he

meets a senior group weekly for

talks on legal ethics.

At the age of 23, Judge Stevens

became grand cyclops of the origi-

nal organization of the Ku Klux

Klan in Florida. He is a native of

South Carolina.

Resembling Jan Paderewski, the

Polish pianist, Judge Stevens is

remembered by thousands of for-

mer students for his pungent hu-

mor and philosophy.

BOXER IN CRITICAL CONDITION AFTER CHICAGO BATTLE

Billy Showers Gets Brain Injury and Collapses in Sixth Round of Melee.

CHICAGO, Nov. 6.—Billy Showers, youthful St. Paul middleweight boxer, was believed to be in a critical condition today, suffering from either concussion of the brain, a hemorrhage or a fracture at the base of the brain, as the result of a vicious ring battle with "Shuffle" Callahan of Chicago.

After absorbing a terrific punishment in the scheduled 10-round bout at White City last night, Showers collapsed and fell unconscious in the sixth round. After physicians had worked for 45 minutes attempting to revive him, a motor ambulance from a nearby fire department was called but it also failed. He was then taken to a hospital.

Callahan had several stitches taken over his eye to close a bad wound suffered in the fight and then was taken into custody under no charge by the police, pending outcome of Showers' injuries.

At the hospital, Showers was in a semi-comatose condition and repeated that his head was buzzing and very sore.

Dave Barry, referee of the bout, and Promoter Mike Malloy were taken along with Callahan to the Woodlawn avenue station, but were released after a few minutes' questioning.

Basque Beats Belgian NEW YORK, Nov. 6.—Otto Von Porat's upward progress in the heavyweight division has been checked temporarily at least by that rock of the Pyrenees, Paulino Uzcudun.

The Norwegian, who has been cutting a wide swath in middle western flint circles, found it was easier to hit Paulino than to floor him and consequently dropped a ten-round decision before 15,000 customers at Madison Square Garden.

As a matter of fact all the floor, log that was done last night was done by Paulino. The basque wood-chopper caught Von Porat's long chin with a jolting right in the first round and dropped the Norwegian to the canvas for a count of nine. The process was repeated again in the fifth round.

Von Porat waited until the last round to demonstrate the paralyzing power of his punch. He caught Paulino flush with several right hand punches that staggered the Spaniard as he never has been staggered before. Only a few as durable as Paulino's could have withstood the effects of those few blows. As it was Paulino was glad to hang on as much as possible and wait for the bell. That round and the fourth, however, were all that Von Porat was, according to the Associated Press score sheet.

All the others went to Paulino. Tiny Rothrock, 240-pound Choctaw Indian, made an inauspicious New York debut. He was knocked out in a single round by Arthur Dekker, big New York Italian.
