New Legion Chief Didn't Get to France

BLOOMINGTON, Ind., Nov. 6.—The new national commander of the American Legion is one of those unhappy Americans whose services during the world war were highly essential but not at all spectacular or exciting. Colonel Paul V. McNutt, the 37-year-old chief of the soldiers' organization, knew too much about field artillery for his own good. Because of his knowledge the army authorities kept him at San Antonio, Texas, where he just won election to the Legion's highest office, training artillery units. He was considered one of the two most theoretical field artillery instructors in the country—and that was just his hard luck.

Colonel McNutt is youthful to be a national commander; but then, he has traveled far for his years in other ways, too. He is dean of the Indiana University School of Law, and has been granted a year's leave of absence from that post to carry on the duties of his Legion office. He won the appointment three years ago, having the distinction of being the youngest man ever made a dean at Indiana. Born in Martinsville, Ind., in 1891, McNutt studied at Indiana University, graduating in 1912, and went to Harvard to study law. He finished his law course in 1916, returned to Indiana to become an assistant professor of law, and on the outbreak of the war joined the army, receiving his training and commission as artillery captain at Fort Benjamin Harrison.

He was assigned to San Antonio, and spent the remainder of the war there, having won promotion to a lieutenant colonel. He is now colonel in the reserves and commander of the 326th field artillery.

It was in San Antonio that Colonel McNutt met his wife, then Miss Kathleen Timotei. They were married there in 1914, and their recent trip to the Legion convention at San Antonio was a tenth anniversary of their honeymoon.

POINCARÉ CABINET RESIGNS IN SPAT OVER THE BUDGET

PARIS, Nov. 6.—The Poincaré cabinet, which has been in office since July 23, 1926, resigned in a body today after four radical socialist ministers offered their resignations. The radicals who resigned were Albert Sarraut, minister of interior; Edouard Herriot, minister of education; Henri Queille, minister of agriculture; and Leon Perrier, minister of colonies.

The radicals announced that their party's program made continued collaboration with the national union cabinet impossible.

The crisis resulted from action of the radical congress held at Amers. At this conference the party made demands for changes in the governmental program, especially in regard to the budget, which Premier Poincaré refused.

The general opinion today was that Premier Poincaré would be able to form a cabinet without the radicals, but that would command a sufficient majority in the chamber of deputies to continue the program of the union government.

"SPLENDID" IN HIS
"THE WEDDING MARCH"

Erich von Stroheim has returned to the screen!

NEW YORK, Nov. 6.—As a surging crowd looked on from the street, Gov. Smith and his wife case their ballots today in a little stationery store at 34 East 48th street.

A large crowd cheered the nominee as he left his hotel, under heavy police escort and this gathering followed him to the stationery store. Here another crowd joined its shouts with those trooping with the governor and Mrs. Smith and broke through police lines and charged the store in mass.

Democratic women leaders of the 26th election and tenth assembly district in which the store is situated, newsmen and photographers were swept toward the large plate glass window of the voting place and many were taken off their feet in the rush. Several score police linked their arms and finally pushed the crowd back into the street but the gathering broke away again when the governor came out and once more trooped along after him and Mrs. Smith started the walk back to the Hillmore hotel.

At one time during the milling about, a police inspector shouted to the crowd: "If you men would only act half the part of New York crowd that never causes any commotion, we would be all right."

After the governor had emerged from the store he was presented with a bouquet of American beauty roses by Miss Estelle Bonner, woman captain of the 36th election district. He then posed for photographers, waving his brown derby in familiar campaign fashion.

Mrs. Smith's Birthday

It was Mrs. Smith's birthday, as well as election day, and on the way to the polling place she was greeted with shouts of "happy birthday." Greetings of "hello Al" and "see you in Washington" were directed at her husband.

Before going to the voting booth, the governor held a brief conference with press correspondents in his hotel suite and was asked whether he was going to vote the straight democratic ticket.

With a smile he replied: "Well, I was thinking it over. I've not seen the captain of the district yet."
