16,768, in 338 precincts out of 813. Robert R. Butler, republican, was running well ahead of Walter M. Pierce, democratic and ex-governor of Oregon, in the second district. In 228 precincts out of 457, Butler had 13,865 votes, and Pierce 8,871.

Other Results

It was apparent on the face of returns so far tabulated that both Justices John L. Rand and George Rossman would be returned to the supreme court bench of the state. Loyal M. Graham was running third.

There was "no race" as far as Thomas B. Kay, state treasurer, and Hal E. Hoss, secretary of state, were concerned. Each commanded a huge majority. L. H. Van Winkle, incumbent, was running three to one ahead of William S. Levens for attorney general, and John D. Mickle, dairy and food commissioner, was leading seven to one over his nearest competitor, A. E. Sanderson, for re-election.

Van Duzer Pleased

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 7.—Pleased by returns indicating defeat of the Dunne bills, Chairman H. B. Van Duzen of the state highway commission, said he would call a special meeting of the commission to plan resumption of highway work which had been held in abeyance due to uncertainty of revenue.

At the special meeting of the commission bids will be called for on road work which has been delayed pending outcome of the vote on the bills which proposed reduction of motor vehicle license fees and increase in gasoline tax.

Chairman Van Duzer said that all tax ends of roads that have been held up will be pressed to completion, and that all promises made to the people during the campaign would be fulfilled.

Portland's Recall

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 7.—A large group of club women and prominent social workers will petition Governor Patterson for the appointment of Mary Jane Spurlin as judge of the court of domestic relations in the event of the recall of Richard Delch, the incumbent.

When the recall of Judge Delch seemed assured by the count of votes completed at noon today, workers in behalf of Miss Spurlin at once gave out the announcement, declaring that they wished to be the first to reach Governor Patterson with petitions for Miss Spurlin's appointment.

Mrs. S. M. Blumauer is one of the leaders of the movement. Others are Mrs. Elliott Corbett, Mrs. George Gerlinger, Mrs. C. V. Ross, Miss Rose Dexter, Mrs. Frederick Stong, Miss Emma Debrulle, Mrs. Chas. Carter, Jr., Mrs. Rhoda B. Hayes, Miss Eleanor Thompson, Mrs. George Perkins and Mrs. Wilhelmine McElroy.

For a short time Miss Spurlin served as judge of one of the district courts by appointment of Governor Pierce.

Miss Spurlin's candidacy will be emphasized to Governor Patterson through letters, petitions and personal calls, said Mrs. Blumauer.

precincts are not expected to in any way change the final outcome. The county judge race was an easy walkaway for Hamilton, who in 47 precincts had a margin of 1,098 votes.

These three contests were the only ones within the county that were hotly fought, as the other candidates did not enter so vigorously into the campaign. Cordon had an easy two-to-one victory over Austin for district attorney, billing up a lead in the majority of the precincts of the county. In Austin's own section, however, the lower Umpqua, he made a fine showing and was considerably ahead of his party's registration. James Sawyers, treasurer, had no difficulty in assembling his usual showing of political strength.

Hoover Given Big Vote

The county gave Herbert Hoover for president an excellent vote, returning 5517 for the republican candidate and 2650 for Smith. In all the national and state offices the county went strongly republican, which made the county results appear bewildering. Hawley carried the county by a wide margin for congress, while Hoss for secretary of state was four to one over his democratic opponent. Kay received a flattering vote for state treasurer, while Rand and Rossman had no difficulty in securing the county vote for justices of the supreme court. Van Winkle was given the county majority for attorney general and Mickle was approved as food commissioner by the county voters with a wide margin.

Hamilton Gets Best Vote

The largest vote to be received by any individual candidate on the Douglas county ballot was given Judge J. W. Hamilton, candidate for circuit judge, who received 6,319 of the approximately 8,000 votes cast. Frank Calkins was second with 6320 votes.

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Returns Come Fast

The task of tabulating the unofficial returns of the election was a gigantic one. This was assumed, as usual, by The News-Review, and record service was given. The first precinct to report was Hermann, a city precinct that made its final report about 15 minutes after 3 p. m. The first out of town precinct to telephone in the returns was West Sutherland. Within an hour after the polls had closed 12 county precincts had made their reports. By noon today all of the precincts that could be reached by telephone had been reported. The huge crowd that assembled in front of The News-Review office received the reports as rapidly as they were received and by midnight the trend of the election had been definitely established, later precincts making no changes in the relative standings of the several candidates.

eight councilmen, only four stood for re-election. Only one of these S. L. Kidder, was successful, while the other three, F. W. Chase, Storey Iles and G. W. Young, ran behind their opponents.

The new mayor-to-be stands pledged to greater economy in the administration of the city's affairs, enforcement of law, a satisfactory solution of the public garbage ground problem and all possible cooperation in the movement to bring about completion of the Roseburg-Diamond lake highway.

New Council-To-Be

The new city council will be made up largely of the candidates offered by the so-called business men's committee. In ward one, Elmer McKean and Charles Wharton were elected. Wharton receiving 260 votes, McKean 229 and Storey Iles 174. In ward two A. J. Young received 259 votes, Stanley Kidder 238 and W. R. Brown 234, which places Young and Kidder upon the council, Mr. Kidder being the only one of the former council to be re-elected. In ward three there were four candidates, F. W. Chase, J. E. Dent, James Hutchings and A. G. McMullin. Mr. Hutchings received the high vote, 254, with Dent second 245, while Chase received 195 and McMullin 145. In ward four, W. F. Harris and S. J. Shoemaker were elected, Harris receiving 319, Shoemaker 271 and G. W. Young 261.

W. F. Harris, city treasurer, unopposed, candidate for re-election, was given a very fine vote, receiving 1,540 votes, one of the largest totals ever received by any candidate for a city office.

Be Seated Jan. 1

The officers elected to the city council at yesterday's election will take over their duties the first of the year, the present city law having been passed several years ago to change the former custom of having the new officers seated as soon as the vote had been canvassed.

Dillard Elected

While complete returns were not received on the race for constable the returns indicated that F. W. Dillard, who has served for many years in that office, defeated his opponent "Bourdough Jim" Gay by a vote of about two to one.

Interest Keen

The city election attracted a great deal of attention. The defeated fight made by rival candidates for mayorality and council positions, with attendant publicity

that set a new precedent for a city campaign drew the attention of the residents of Roseburg away from many of the other issues of the election. The calls received at the News-Review office usually asked for information concerning the city offices ahead of any of the other contests.

The outcome was in doubt until the very last ballots were counted. Hoover was given a wide margin in some of the precincts to report early, but in this later precincts Houck began creeping up, and it was not until the final report was received that the result could be announced.

Roseburg precinct was the last of the city voting districts to be counted, and gave Dr. Houck a big majority. This margin however was not sufficient to cut down Dr. Hoover's lead gained in previous reported tabulations.

Dump Grounds Issue

Apparently it was the dump grounds issue that spelled defeat of the present city administration. Umpqua precinct, which lies along Winchester street where the odiferous dump yard makes itself most manifest, gave Houck 82 and Roseburg 140, this result being a plain expression of the sentiments of the residents of that section of the city concerning the dump grounds. Much dissatisfaction has been expressed for several years in that neighborhood, and an effort was made to sure some action from the council through a petition of the residents. Nothing, however, was done to alleviate the situation and the vote in that precinct is accepted as a vote of dissatisfaction particularly over that matter.
