

KING OF ENGLAND
SAYS HE'S HAPPY
OVER PEACE PACT

(Associated Press Leased Wire)
LONDON, Nov. 6.—The Kellogg-Briand pact renouncing war took precedence today in the address which King George read from the throne in opening parliament.

The speech was heard by a brilliantly robed assemblage of peers and their bejeweled peeresses with commoners looking on and listening in from their balcony.

"My relations with foreign powers continue to be friendly," the king began in deep, clear tones, reading from a scroll. "My government has been happy to accept the treaty of renunciation of war in the form proposed by the government of the United States. To my great satisfaction this treaty was signed in Paris on August 27 by plenipotentiaries on behalf of all my governments and in behalf of the United States, France, Germany, Italy, Japan, Belgium, Poland and Czechoslovakia."

A cold yellow November fog enshrouded the king and queen and their great state coach of glass and gold as they rolled through the streets of London this morning to open parliament in state. The fog hung like a gray blanket over the Mall and all along the line of the royal route from Buckingham palace to Westminster. Troops moved like ghosts through the fog and crowds of hardy spirits braving the weather, stood in huddled groups outside the palace an hour before their majesties were due to leave.

OREGON STATE TO
GIVE WEBFOOTERS
A REAL CONTEST

CORVALLIS, Nov. 7. With the exception of Carl Metten, halfback, and Delbert Scott, tackle, the Oregon State football team promises to be at full war strength for the traditional battle with University of Oregon here November 17.

Metten, who had his right foot broken in the game with Southern California October 6, had the cast removed last week and is now running around with a slight limp. Metten says he will be ready for the big game but the doctors and coaches still are in doubt. Delbert Scott was badly battered in the game with Washington State October 20 and has not been in a suit since. There is still a chance he will see action in the Oregon game.

Only a few slight injuries were received by the Orangemen in the mix with University of Montana here Saturday. A few days of rest for the cripples will bring them to the front again.

Oregon seems to be a slight favorite in the coming tussle on account of her great defeat of Washington and the stand the Webfoots made against the strong University of California team last Saturday. This is the first time the Webfoots have been run in as favorites over the Orangemen since Coach Schlessler came to Oregon State in 1924.
