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NUMBER OF BANKS IN OREGON FEWER BY 42 SINCE 1910

Resources, However, Still Climbing; Investments Greater and Loans Are Reduced.

(Associated Press Local Wire)

SALEM, Ore., Nov. 8.—Resources of Oregon banks reached a new high total on October 3, as shown on the call of that date received by A. A. Schramm, state superintendent of banks. The total shown in resources was \$357,417,269.76.

The report shows that while total resources have increased \$4,577,385.89 in the last year, or since the call of October 10, 1927, and about \$57,000,000 since the corresponding call in 1921, the number of banks in operation has steadily decreased. There were 286 banks in the state in 1921, 252 in 1927 and 244 this year, the smallest number since 1910. The reductions of the last year were caused by five consolidations, three voluntary liquidations and four receiverships, against which there were four new charters, making a net decrease of eight. On the average says the report, a much larger business is being done by individual banks.

Bond Investments Rise

Several trends of development are shown in the new summary. Notably a change in character of investments, change in the ratio of the two classes of deposits, and a reduction in borrowed money owed by banks.

The loan reductions and the increase of investments in bonds and securities has been maintained consistently year after year, says the report. In 1921 bond investments represented 17.2 per cent of the total resources, in 1927 28.1 per cent and in 1928 32.8 per cent. Federal government, state, county, city and town, school district, industrial and utility bonds predominated.

Time and savings deposits now stand at 39.8 per cent of total deposits, representing a steady increase yearly.

Since 1920, when the high mark of nearly \$20,000,000 in borrowed money was reported, the banks have reduced this item steadily, until now the total owed by them is only slightly over \$1,000,000. There is a pronounced tendency among bankers to advance for local use funds available locally, the report says, refraining from borrowing from other banks.

CALIFORNIA GIVES HOOVER, JOHNSON HEAVY MAJORITIES

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Nov. 8.—The popularity of President-elect Hoover and Senator Hiram W. Johnson in their home state was accredited largely today to the one-sided victories they achieved in California.

The overwhelming majorities which California gave Hoover and Johnson were shown by late election returns. Final unofficial returns as tabulated by the Associated Press for 8451 precincts out of 9086 in California gave for president:

Hoover 1,048,617.
Smith 581,930.

The figures gave Hoover a majority of almost half a million votes. The republican candidate carried every county in the state with the exception of five, where Smith had small leads. Political forecasts were that Smith would carry the northern and central California counties where "wet" sentiment was believed to prevail, and that Hoover would sweep southern California. Hoover carried nearly all of the counties, however, and swept Los Angeles, while Smith carried San Francisco by a small majority.

Senator Johnson won by a majority of more than 800,000 votes. Minor Moore, his democratic opponent did not conduct an active

114 INDICTED ON LIQUOR GAMBLING COUNTS, ILLINOIS

CHICAGO, Nov. 8.—One hundred and fourteen residents of McHenry county, including resort owners, city and county officials and one state legislator were named in a blanket conspiracy indictment today by the county grand jury which has been investigating liquor and gambling law violations under the direction of Charles W. Maddie, special assistant attorney general.

Among those named in today's blanket indictment were George Druggan, a brother of Terry Druggan, Chicago beer baron; Roy Stewart, state representative from the eighth district; Alfred H. Poase, former state's attorney, now missing; Martin J. Wandrick, deputy sheriff, and Lester Edinger, former sheriff.

Other officials named include Peter W. Fret, mayor of McHenry, and John Walsh, chief of police of McHenry.
