ONE ROSEBURG TEAM IS BEATEN; THE OTHER WINS

Injuries Make Roseburg Juniors Easy Prey for Medford.

FOUR PLAYERS HURT

Senior High Beats Grants Pass in Sensational Game; Best Showing of Season.

Roseburg junior high school lost a heartbreaking game of football here yesterday afternoon in the contest against Medford junior high school, the game being put on as a feature of the Amateur program. The score was 27 to 6 in Medford's favor, but it was not until the last quarter that the game assumed its lopsided aspect.

The first half was as pretty an exhibition of football as a spectator could desire. The two teams were evenly matched in size and weight, and played an unusually fast game. Medford started off by tearing through the Roseburg line for long gains after the first kickoff, reaching off 20 yards on an end run and working a criss cross for another first down. Roseburg took time out to talk over the defense and upon returning to the scrimmage succeeded in throwing the Medford players for a loss.

Roseburg threat strong

Roseburg pointed to safety, and then recovered the ball in Medford territory and drove down to within one foot of the goal line where they were held for downs. For the whole quarter Roseburg stayed within scoring distance of the Medford line, but the visitors put up a wonderful defense, and Roseburg could not penetrate. Then when the second quarter was about half over, Roseburg took the ball out of bounds on Medford's 19 yard line and carried it down on two backs to the 10 yard line from which place it was passed over for the first touchdown. The attempt for goal failed and the score was 6 to 0.

Then near the end of the quarter the play became ferocious. Both teams fought desperately with the ball in the center of the field. Lisle, Roseburg; nailback tore into the line for a 50 yard gain, and sustained a twisted ankle that took him out of the game. Crawford, the Roseburg fullback, was the next player out, sustaining a broken collarbone in a mix-up following a punt.

Visitors Make Touchdown

The loss of two star backfield men demoralized the Roseburg team temporarily and Medford took advantage of the situation to break through for a touchdown.

Medford continued her advance but Roseburg's defense succeeded in stopping her at the 10 yard line. Medford territory was the half of the field.

The badly crippled Roseburg team ran into hard luck at the very outset of the third quarter. With the ball in their possession on their own ten yard line, following the kickoff, Zenor dropped back to punt. The pass from center was wild and rolled over the goal line where Zenor recovered but was tackled for a safety, giving Medford 2 more points. The ball was then put in play on the 20 yard line which place Medford bucked over for another touchdown.

Babus, Roseburg captain and center, the heaviest player on the local team was then removed because of a strained ligament, and Zenor, who had carried the brunt of the Roseburg attack after the local backfield had been shot to pieces by injuries had to retire because of exhaustion. This left Roseburg hopelessly outclassed, and Medford ran away with two more touchdowns. Towards the last of the fourth quarter, Medford made numerous substitutions, and there was no more scoring.

Medford Ball Good

The Medford team played an exceptionally fine brand of ball. The team is coached by Ray Henderson, a former resident of this city. Two of the visiting players, Zumburn and Goble, made an exceedingly fast combination and their playing in yesterday's game was spectacular.

Zenor was Roseburg's outstanding player yesterday, although the team as a whole played a good game until injuries took their toll. Zenor was consistent in his gains through and around the line and his punts went for good distance and were accurate. Lisle also played a good game until forced to retire because of injuries.

While the junior high school was playing Medford here the senior high school team played at Grants Pass and won their game by a score of 19 to 6. It was the best showing Roseburg has made this year, team work being more fight and better teamwork than ever before. The boys played a fast game of ball against a strong team. The first touchdown was scored within three minutes after the game opened, following a series of passes. The second touchdown was secured after Entler had intercepted a pass and returned the ball for 75 yards. He was tackled near the goal line, but on the next play passed across the line to Hull, who made the catch

fect December 5. Mrs. McPherson is completing an European tour, undertaken to preach the gospel of good against the spirit of evil. She left Los Angeles some weeks ago.

Back in Limelight

While the evangelist was denying the rumors of bribery, three of the persons who played outstanding parts in her kidnapping story were reported to have been subpoenaed by the grand jury. They were Mrs. Minnie Kennedy, mother of the evangelist; Kenneth G. Ormiston, Mrs. McPherson's "radio" man and Mrs. Lorraine Wiseman-Sielaff, the mysterious "Miss X" of the kidnapping case.

It was anticipated that documentary evidence which newspapers furnished the grand jury several days ago. It was reported that the evidence indicated that more than \$100,000 was spent in defense of Mrs. McPherson on charges that she and her mother had obstructed justice.

The charges, now nearly two years old, arose out of the evangelist's disappearance and her story that she had been kidnaped. When investigated by the grand jury, the story resulted in the placing of charges against the mother and daughter. These were dismissed later by Keyes for lack of evidence.
