Old Lace Lends Its Charm to the New Mode

PARIS IS USING IT LAVISHLY FOR COLLARS AND CUFFS; BENDEL SAYS THERE'S NOTHING MORE FLATTERING; GIVES DISTINCTION TO SIMPLE LINES

NEW YORK, Nov. 17.—It is inevitable that lace should assume increasing importance in the new mode.

Soft femininity is the keynote to the smartest costumes this season. And nothing could be softer or more flattering than the right pieces of lace on the right frock.

I do not mean harsh machine laces. I am speaking of finer lace, that bit of real lace from your grandmother's frock. Many a lovely black stain gown, a velvet ensemble or a dancing frock of crisp moire is built around a lace heirloom this year.

Fine little lace neckpieces are one of the age-old adornments that are new right now. Last season few shops carried separate lace vests, collar and cuff sets. Now they all must, if they satisfy their customers.

Lace is used lavishly. Paris uses lace lavishly for collars and cuffs. Some of the sweetest daytime frocks are simple in line. Except for the right lace touch, they would lose their distinction.

There is a lot in knowing when and how to use lace. One of the loveliest little black crepe back frocks has black lace over flesh chiffon let in the form of a bowknot from the back neckline. A little graduated strip, like the end of a bow, runs down the left side front. And a sweet little drop skirt, with a flare at the left side where the satin wrap around.

plaided touch of an overeye and cuffs of fine hand-thread lace.

The frock has a corresponding grace in its cut. Its snug neckline flares in fullness by an ornate

plaided panel just below either hip. These hang slightly lower than the front and back widths.

The collar treatment is new and charming. The lace is pleated in three separate little flounces right

in front, with the front one longer than the sides. The lace is backed by horsehair braid across the back to give a chic little standing effect.

Cuffs of lace join the long sleeves and ruffles of lace edge these, falling over the hand in a charming, old-fashioned way.

A very different lace effect is the flat cape collar of very fine hand-threaded net lace on a bottle green velvet frock with fitted bodice and skirt which dips its pleated tiers down on each side.

This is an extremely youthful model. It would not be so flattering nor so correct on an older woman as on a young girl or matron. Green velvet ribbon binds the neck and ties in a little front bow.

Lace Frills and Bows

Matching lace is pleated for cuff frills. Hanging these over the hands is much newer than turning them back toward the elbows. These also lie with little bows of velvet at the wrist.

Callot uses a beautiful, heavy Italian lace to embellish a black velvet afternoon frock. Point Venice, in a rich cafe au lait shade, forms a flat little collar with points in front and a deep one in the center of the back and cuffs that are shaped in points too.

The lace is used to edge the square overskirt that dips in four points, two front and two back.

As is usual with lace, no jeweled ornaments are used on any of these frocks. Lace is decorative enough. It is far more effective, usually, if used with glowing color and soft fabric, to make it the sole adornment.

FLOWER TALKS

LEAVE THE GRASS LONG IN THE FALL!
LIME THE LAWN FOR WINTER

Editor's Note: This is the tenth of a series of "Flower Talks," suggesting to News-Review readers what and how to plant gardens this fall in preparation for next year. The articles are written for NEA Service, by Romaine B. Ware, horticulture expert.

There seems to be a great deal of misunderstanding about the care a lawn needs in the fall. In the first place it should not be cut too close. Close cutting bares the ground and the roots being close to the surface are injured by the freezing and thawing of the winter. So it is best to set the blades of your mower up higher so that in cutting during the last part of the season you will leave it longer.

In many sections we see lawns covered with stable manure in the winter. This is not considered good practice. It is true that it feeds the lawn but at the same time it distributes a lot of weed seeds that will surely not help your lawn. The best dressing for a lawn in winter is leafmold. You may cover it to a depth of an inch or two and it will not only fertilize it but it will be a good winter protection.

Fall is a good time to lime the lawn. Many lawns are suffering from acid soil and a dressing of around limestone will sweeten the soil and cause the plant food that is in the soil to become more readily available. It may be used liberally, a hundred pounds to each two hundred square feet of lawn is not too much.

There is another good dressing for a lawn if you are able to obtain it, this is tobacco stems. In sections where it is grown you may get the stems and spread them over the lawn. The winter moisture will carry down to the roots of the plants all the secretions from the tobacco stems and not only will it feed the plants but it will drive away many pests that harm them.
