

SIX HIGH SCHOOL ATHLETES TO PLAY LAST GAME FRIDAY

Six players of the Roseburg high school football team are playing their last game of high school football Friday in the game with Astoria. Three of the players are veterans while the other three are playing their first and last year of football in high school, although all of the boys, it is expected, will go to college to try for places on college teams.

Edton Sandquist, tackle, and Bud Hagar, guard, have each had four years of high school football. These two boys have been a great help on the Roseburg line, both being fast and heavy. Each has good prospects for making college teams, as they have a good knowledge of fundamentals and sufficient experience and weight to make them very valuable players.

Moffitt, who also graduates this year, has had two years of high school football and was made an excellent showing. He is also a member of the basketball squad and has had three years of participation on the high school basketball team.

Sandquist, Roseburg center, came out for football this spring, and because of his excellent work was immediately given a berth. Sandquist is proving himself an exceptionally good player and will be able to make good progress if he goes on in the sport.

Ira Hall and Elmer Robertson, "The Good Part Twins," who hold down the end positions on the Roseburg team have been largely responsible for the good showing the local team has made this season. Roseburg started the year with a team that was exceptionally weak on each flank. Robertson and Hall were "discovered" in the interclass tournament, neither having had previous experience. They are both good athletes, however, and quickly took a liking to football and have developed into exceptionally good players. As a result of their excellent work the end positions on the Roseburg team have now been made the strongest places both in offense and defense. These two boys are an opportunity to make records for themselves in college football.

To fill these vacancies, Coach Turner has several good boys that have been receiving a good deal of experience this season. He will also receive the junior high school team intact, with the exception of two members. This will materially help the senior high team, as the junior high this year has turned out a remarkably fast and clever team, with plenty of weight.

Roseburg has won three games and has lost three during the season. The victories were over Grants Pass, North Bend and Marshfield, each won from Roseburg. The scores in all of the games were close.

If Roseburg can beat Astoria in the game Friday afternoon at Pinaly field, the local school will have beaten a percentage of 200 for the first time in the school's history.

Astoria is reported to have a big and fast team, with a smashing backfield. A heavy fullback is used in smashing the line has been a powerful factor in Astoria's victories this year. The Roseburg team is determined to end the season with a victory if possible, and the players who are leaving school are determined to make their final game the best they have ever played.

CARNEGIE'S GRID CHIEF SAYS SCOTCH LINE WON'T "GIVE"

CHICAGO, Nov. 21.—Judge Walter P. Steffen, the committee head of Carnegie Tech, explained today why the Carnegie Scotch men defeated Notre Dame last Saturday, and in so doing he coined a new Scotch joke.

"That Scotch line," said the judge, "just won't give."

For fifteen years Judge Steffen has been coaching the Carnegie football team.

They call him "your honor" in Chicago, but in Pittsburgh he is just plain "Wally," a mighty good football coach.

Judge Steffen of the Chicago superior court continues his work on the bench with his duties as advisory grid coach at Carnegie Institute of Technology here.

That the judge is a "mighty good coach" cannot be disputed for his 1928 Tartans up to Nov. 17 had not been defeated. They hope to reverse the East in the tournament of Roses battle in California.

Judge Steffen boasts quite a football career himself. He once coached Walter Eckersall's quarter-back on the Chicago team in 1906, playing for two years. Later he was assistant coach to Alvin Stagg. In 1914 he became coach of Carnegie, and that very year the Tartans came into the football limelight. When appointed to the Chicago job, Steffen decided to forget football, but Carnegie prevailed upon him to reconsider and to become advisory coach.
