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FORMATION OF XMAS TURKEY POOL STARTED

with the accuracy of the inventory made prior to the Thanksgiving pool. The deliveries were within a very close percentage of the estimates, and if this same condition is maintained in the future it will be of great assistance in handling the sales, as buyers will learn that they can depend upon about how many birds they can obtain.

The association officers and the buyers were exceptionally well pleased with the quality of the birds obtained in this Thanksgiving pool. Usually No. 2 birds made up about 10 per cent of the total, Douglas county growers have been working for several years, however, to improve their standards and the results are now being shown. At Oakland and Yoncalla the Thanksgiving pool had less than 4 per cent number 2 birds. At Medford the percentage was higher, 7 per cent, but was caused by receipts from two inexperienced growers who did not pick their birds properly.

Several growers brought up as many as 60 and 65 birds all of which dressed No. 1 grade. In one batch from Coos county there were only 12 No. 2 birds out of 220, which is considered a very fine showing.

The picking demonstration held last year proved to be great help in aiding the growers to prepare their birds properly for the market. Some of the powers were bringing in their first birds for dress and did not know how to dress them properly, this being particularly true in the country tributary to Roseburg where many growers have raised turkeys this year for the first time. It is the plan of the association to work in cooperation with the extension department of the state college in carrying on an educational campaign during the coming spring and summer to aid the growers, particularly those new to the business, in learning how to kill and dress their birds according to the accepted standards. It is hoped to have a uniform pack among the association members, and special emphasis will be given this feature at the demonstrations that will be held during the coming months.

Some valuable experience has been gained in handling the first pool, according to Herbert Beyers, the association manager, and it is expected that the Christmas pool will be handled with much less confusion.

One change will be made and that will be to extend the receiving period over two days at points where there will be more than one carload. This will give more time for grading and picking the birds at the receiving station, and will provide much more uniform loading. The organization of the handling forces will also be more complete next time, as it was necessary at the first pool to work out an entirely new system for handling the birds, so that a few readjustments are necessary.

Turkey growers are quite interested in the daily market broadcast now being sent out over station KOAC at Corvallis. In the market reports, broadcast during the noon hour and after 7 o'clock at night, a period is given to the turkey market, with reports from the various buying centers. The Douglas County association is adding in this broadcast, particularly through the furnishing of information on conditions in the Umpqua valley and prices quoted here. The broadcasts will continue, the college radio officials report, as long as turkey shipments are made.

Mr. Beyers reports that the association will continue shipments as long as pools can be made up in carload lots. Christmas and New Year shipments will be made, and if there are birds left for market after the first of the year there will be additional pools formed as rapidly as sales can be profitably negotiated.

DOUGLAS COUNTY GETS \$10,162 FORESTRY COIN
(Associated Press Local Wire)
SALEM, Ore., Nov. 22.—A total of \$171,628.19, representing the state's 25 per cent of national forest receipts collected by the federal government, was apportioned by Secretary of State Hoss yesterday to the 31 Oregon counties that have national forest area within their borders. The government's receipts are from sales of land, rental and some other sources. The total acreage of national forest reserve in the state is 13,278,866, the largest apportionment goes to Klamath county, its share being \$37,063.20. Deschutes receives \$14,244.65, Douglas \$10,162.78, Jackson \$29,573.98, Lake \$10,229.95, Lane \$16,229.53, Wallowa \$10,882.18 and the other smaller amounts. Polk county receives only \$11.79.
