ROSEBURG JUNIOR HIGH TEAM WINS AT COTTAGE GROVE

The Roseburg Junior high school team completed a very successful season Saturday by defeating Cottage Grove Junior high 15 to 12 in a close and fast game. Roseburg was behind in the scoring until the last five minutes of play despite the fact that the local team outplayed the Cottage Grove team in all departments of the game. The victory was obtained within a very few minutes before the end of the final period.

Roseburg scored early in the first quarter, receiving the kick-off and pushing through to the Cottage Grove goal in five plays. Roseburg failed to convert, making the score 6 to 0 in Roseburg's favor.

A break in Cottage Grove's favor, however, quickly tied the score. Cottage Grove punted and as the Roseburg safety ran in to take the ball on the first bounce, the piker took a wild hop. The Roseburg player jumped and touched it, but failed to hang onto the ball, which was scooped up by a Cottage Grove player who ran for a touchdown.

Roseburg came back determined to win and smashed down to the Cottage Grove line, but the half ended before the ball could be punched over from the 3-yard line where Roseburg had advanced the ball for first downs just before the period was finished.

Cottage Grove opened up with a series of end runs. In the third quarter and scored another touchdown, making the score 12 to 6 in their favor.

In the fourth quarter Roseburg again started a march down the field and scored following a long run by Lady, Roseburg tackle, on a delayed play. Roseburg converted, making the score 13 to 12 in Roseburg's favor.

Roseburg elected to receive and again started smacking through the Cottage Grove team and had the ball on the Cottage Grove 6 inch line with four more downs to go when the game ended.

Considerable excitement ensued following the game when a group of rowdies started a fight with the Roseburg fans, necessitating police intervention. Bruce Bridges and H. C. Darby were both struck by belligerent Cottage Grove spectators.

POISONER-THIEF HOUNDS FAMILY AT PORT ORFORD, ORE.

PORT ORFORD, Ore., Nov. 25.—A reign of terror, punctuated by attempted murder by poisoning, robbery and the carving of a death's head on the kitchen table, has descended upon the Lester Tichenor home here.

Reverend \$100 has already been posted by Frank McIntyre, owner of the house in which the Tichenors live, for information leading to conviction. The home was first entered Monday night when the Tichenors were away. A traveling bag was slashed at that time. The prowler again entered Tuesday night, with a pass key, leaving a death's head on the table with a butcher knife, stealing an auto robe and an overcoat and leaving poisoned bread and canned fruit on the table. By chance of fate, Mr. Tichenor, next morning fed some bread to the cat before starting to eat. The cat died shortly from effects of the poison. The doctor pronounced fruit also poisoned. As the Tichenors are both deaf they did not hear the entry the second night.

CONSTRUCTION ON UMPOUA JETTY TO BE CONTINUED

Construction work on the North Jetty of the Umpqua river is to continue throughout the winter, according to the announcement of Captain Roscoe Cole, United States engineer in charge of construction, says the Port Piquos Conyer. The projected position of the Umpqua river in addition to the fact that the jetty has not been extended far enough to receive the brunt of the heavy winter winds and seas allows further progress.

MYRTLE CREEK WATER MAIN TO BE EXTENDED

The town of Myrtle Creek is preparing to extend its water main some 1200 feet from the present intake on the McGraw place, using four-inch steel pipe for the improvement. In addition to this extension 1800 feet of four-inch steel pipe will be laid to the farthest spring owned by the town. This later improvement will bring the water down to the end of the proposed four-inch main extension and all the water will thus be gathered and sent down through the trunk line to town.

This extension will not only put an absolute safeguard against pollution of the supply but will also increase the water flow materially by conserving much that is now lost through seepage and evaporation. Work on this improvement, which will cost around \$1500, will begin in a short time. Dale Mayers, who has the contract for hauling the pipe from Portland to the improvement site, has already delivered a part of the pipe.
