FINGER PRINTING OF EMPLOYEES IS U. S. MONEY SAVER

WASHINGTON, Nov. 27.—Government employees are being finger printed by the civil service commission with the announced objective: "To keep out the crooks."

In New York City post office losses have been reduced 50 per cent by the finger printing of temporary employees taken on during rush seasons.

The commission said that at Cleveland and Philadelphia two fugitive criminals were caught when they applied for government jobs.

"When it is generally known that fingerprints will be made of all applicants," said the commission, "the criminals will quietly disappear" from the applicants for government positions.

CO. AGRICULTURAL CONFERENCE TO BE HELD FEB. 18-22

Arrangements are being made for an economic conference to be held in Roseburg February 18 to 22, according to County Agent J. C. Leedy. Three years ago an agricultural conference was held here and resulted in a very important report, which has been of great help in outlining and developing the county's agricultural program. Roseburg failed to take full advantage of the conference, as the report was never printed in booklet style as originally intended, no money being provided to pay the printing costs.

The next conference will be of the same thorough nature as before, but will be on a more specialized plan. One day will be devoted to each commodity of particular line of agricultural endeavor. Poultry, horticulture, livestock, dairying and crops will be among the subjects to be discussed. Experts from the extension service of the state college will be present to help in the conference. Preliminary meetings will be held by local producers, who will prepare reports and outline suggestions. These reports will then come before the conference for general discussion.

The detailed arrangements for the conference are to be worked out in the near future.

NOAH'S ARK QUEST MAY BE LAUNCHED

CHICAGO, Nov. 27.—An expedition to search the ancient world for Noah's Ark is in the hope of finding the Biblical ship for exhibition at the Chicago world's fair in 1933 has been suggested here.

Rafus C. Dawes, president of the world's fair committee, said today he had received an offer from William Strong, former president of the Chicago Association of Engineers, to finance a corporation for the boat which rode the flood through 40 days and nights.

Mr. Strong, who also is a former president of the Aviation Club of Chicago and an alumnus of Moody Bible Institute, said if Noah's Ark actually was built, the possibilities are that it is still in existence. He said the Bible describes the ship's construction as of gopher wood, a species of cypress, decay is not subject to fungus decay. "The ark grounded on Mount Ararat and the rarity of the air at high altitudes would tend to preserve the ship," Strong said.

It would have required an earthquake, an avalanche or some other cataclysm of nature to destroy the ark, in Strong's opinion.
