NATIONAL GUARD NOTES

Monday night Company D was favored by a visit from Captain McGee, of the U. S. regular army, who is attached to the Oregon National Guard for instruction. Captain McGee inspected and checked the company property and equipment during his visit here.

Sgt. Vaughn of Salem, also spent Monday evening here and assisted in the company instruction.

The attendance was exceedingly good this week and a full evening was put to good advantage. Lt. Knudson instructed in elementary machine gun drill, assisted by Sgts. Dolan and Walton.

Lt. Gerretsen had charge of the infantry drill instruction.

Some recent facts given out by the "Oregon Guardsman," the O. N. G. paper of interest to guard circles are "The Oregon National Guard men are now taking the preliminary West Point examinations for entrance to the academy."

"The operation of the Oregon National Guard during the present year has cost the state \$70 per capita. This is very low compared to other states in the union. During the same period the government spent \$310.86 for each Oregon guardsman."

"During the past year the government has spent in Oregon for the operation of the state guard, \$920,149.00."

"During the past two years the government has spent \$78,876.15 on installations at Camp Clatsop. In the next year \$95,000 will be spent for additional buildings."

"The annual battle demonstrations held in conjunction with the annual review at camp having met with such enthusiastic response from more than 20,000 visitors, it is planned to make it a regular part of the visitors' day program at future camps."
