

DOG DISTEMPER PREVENTIVE IS THOUGHT FOUND

LONDON, Nov. 29.—A discovery which was claimed to make dogs completely and permanently immune from distemper was announced today by The Field, an influential weekly sporting paper. The announcement was in the form of an official report by Dr. Patrick Playfair Laidlaw, pathologist to the medical research council, and P. W. Dinklin, a noted veterinary. They made an investigation together in the laboratory of the research council the cost of which was partly met by a fund initiated by The Field and partly from national funds.

The report published today held out the hope that the knowledge gained from the investigation into distemper would be valuable generally in the control of virus diseases not only in animals but also in man.

The investigation has not been concluded but the report stated that a point had already been reached when it was proved possible to render dogs immune from infection by double inoculation. The first inoculation would be with vaccine consisting of the sterilized virus of distemper and the second containing living virus. Experiments were stated to have resulted in immunizing 1350 dogs under rigid tests and the investigators announced their success with confidence.

NEWS BRIEFS

COMPTON, Calif., Nov. 29.—Clarence Swedeholm, 10, saw his dog racing from the yard at his home and jumped from a school bus to put the animal back in the yard. Both boy and dog were struck by the automobile and killed.

PLINT, Mich., Nov. 29.—Charles Tripp, 37, was sentenced to life imprisonment following conviction of a fourth violation of the prohibition law. The sentence was pronounced by Circuit Judge Fred W. Brennan, under the new state criminal code which makes life sentence mandatory for a fourth felony conviction.
Fred Palm of Lansing was sent-

enced to a life term on conviction of possessing a pistol after several months following three felony convictions.

SAN BERNARDINO, Calif., Nov. 29.—Police reported to the coroner that George A. Simmons, 29, had shot and killed himself an hour before he was due to resume testimony against Mrs. Fred Schlosser, charged with murdering her husband. He had testified he saw the woman shoot her husband, but became confused on cross-examination.

HAMILTON, O., Nov. 29.—James Buckner, 26, must write 1,000 copies of a selected Bible verse and the fourth commandment as punishment for striking his 63-year-old father. Municipal Judge Pater suspended a \$50 fine yesterday with the remark, "A fine in money would not be recompense for an offense committed against the laws of God."

LOS ANGELES, Nov. 29.—Tragedy overtook the speeding car of Mr. and Mrs. Robert L. Moates as they headed homeward early today over the dangerous ridge route highway for a Thanksgiving dinner here, when the car failed to round a sharp curve and crashed through a bridge railing, killing both occupants.

OMAHA, Neb., Nov. 29.—His feet stuck in mud and his head barely above water, Ernest Kiesel, 22, was held fast in the Missouri river, after a boat capsized, so long that he died of exposure soon after a farmer rescued him. His brother Louis, 19, and Herman Wolfe, 25, are believed to have drowned. They were hunting ducks when the boat turned over.

GLENDAL, Calif., Nov. 29.—Roy Knabenshue, San Diego aviator, was seriously injured near here today and his companion, Miss Madeline Briggs of New York, was killed when their automobile plunged over an embankment in an effort to avoid a collision with an approaching machine. Hospital authorities said Knabenshue's injuries would probably prove fatal.

RUTH BRYAN OWEN INELIGIBLE FOR CONGRESS, CLAIM

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 29.—Mrs. Ruth Bryan Owen regarded as a joke an effort being made in Florida to question her right to election as a member of congress, when informed here today of a report from Tallahassee.

"It's such an absurdity that it is not worth talking seriously," she declared. "But I am glad you told me about it, so I can telegraph Mr. Martin for his kindness."

TALLAHASSEE, Fla., Nov. 29.—The election of Mrs. Ruth Bryan Owen to the fourth district seat in congress in the recent Florida election will be contested on the ground "that she has not been a citizen of the United States for seven years in accordance with constitutional eligibility rules."

A Daytona Beach law firm notified Governor John W. Martin of the contemplated action in behalf of William C. Lawson of Orlando, defeated republican candidate.

The firm asked the governor to hold up Mrs. Owen's certificate of election, but he announced that he would not comply with the request regardless of any attempt to deprive her of the seat.

Recount in Texas
SAN ANTONIO, Tex., Nov. 29.—The house campaign expenditures committee decided after a conference with republican congressman Harry M. Wurzbach of the 14th Texas district today, to make an inquiry into the election count by which Augustus J. McCloskey, democrat, was declared victor in Wurzbach's race for reelection.

SHIPPING OF FARM PRODUCTS WILL BE CONFERENCE TOPIC

Recognizing the marketing procedure in handling Oregon crops to be one of the paramount problems of the farming industry, the agricultural council of the Pacific Northwest Advisory board, which meets in Portland December 12, is going to give special consideration to this subject, according to an announcement made by R. H. Kipp, manager of the marketing department of the Portland Chamber of Commerce. The volume of agricultural products in the Pacific Northwest has created a surplus west of the Rocky mountains, making it necessary to ship products to the large consuming centers, mostly east of the Mississippi river, Mr. Kipp points out. In considering the distribution of these

products, many of which are of a perishable nature, it is believed that there is no one thing which requires more careful and extensive consideration than the proper preparation of these commodities, so that they may be shipped and distributed in the least possible loss, and in a way to create the most favorable impression with the trade and consuming public. The principal element in this connection is proper standardization and grades of each commodity, Mr. Kipp says. In order that the matter may be discussed in the most complete manner possible, it is desired to have every district of the state represented by a good, strong delegation. Anyone interested in the agricultural problems of the Pacific Northwest is invited to attend.

ENGAGEMENT OF JOHN COOLIDGE IS FORMALLY STATED

HARTFORD, Conn., Nov. 29.—Formal announcement has been made of the engagement of Miss Florence Trumbull, daughter of Governor John H. Trumbull of Connecticut, and John Coolidge, son of President and Mrs. Coolidge.

The announcement was made by Governor and Mrs. Trumbull at a dinner at the Farmington Country Club last night as part of the celebration of their silver wedding anniversary.

No date was announced for the wedding, but indications were it would not take place before summer, thus precluding a White House wedding. The ceremony probably will take place at the Trumbull home in Plainville.

John Coolidge hurried to the reception after concluding his day's work as a clerk at the New Haven offices of the New York, New Haven & Hartford railroad and appeared relieved at the announcement of the engagement, a matter upon which both he and Miss Trumbull have been questioned persistently for more than a year. Miss Trumbull is an attractive

and vivacious young woman and has auburn hair and blue eyes. She is fond of sports, John is more than six feet tall, blue eyed and dark haired. While at college he achieved some attention as a boxer and also was a member of the glee club.

130 DEAD, MILLIONS LOST IN CROPS, TYPHOON TOLL

MANILA, P. I., Nov. 30.—Reports from four destroyers returning today from a relief expedition to the typhoon swept islands of the archipelago place the number of known dead from the storm at 130 while at least 19 persons are still unaccounted for.

Extensive crop damage has been done in almost every island touched by the typhoon and the island of Negros is estimated to have suffered property and crop damage of \$3,500,000.

Reports from the destroyers stated that the sugar, banana, hemp and rice crops suffered most severely and that though the damage was great no immediate relief measures were necessary.

No attempt to estimate the crop and property damage from the typhoon for the entire archipelago is possible because of the crippled condition of communication systems.
