PATTERSON NAMES BOY FOR WEST POINT SCHOOL

SALEM, Ore., Dec. 6.—Private Franklin T. Hurlbut, Portland high school student, has been nominated by Governor Patterson for entrance in the United States Military Academy at West Point. Private Samuel G. Walker of company E, La Grande, was nominated as alternate.

The nominations were made on the basis of grades made in a competitive examination held in November.

Hurlbut is a member of head-

RICH SPORTSMAN NOT SPORT WHEN LADY USES SHOE

(Associated Press Local Wire)

HAVANA, Dec. 6.—Ordered to appear in court Saturday, Miss Frances Porter, of Atlanta, was said by members of the crew to be under a physician's care aboard the yacht Malvern today. Conkey T. Whitehead, wealthy Atlanta sportsman, has preferred charges of assault against her. A representative of the Havana police court presented warrants aboard the yacht, which is owned by Whitehead, ordering Miss Porter to court. She is alleged to have assaulted Whitehead with a shoe.

Members of the crew said that Miss Porter fainted when she saw the policeman and fell down the hatchway to her cabin, injuring herself. She was arrested last Wednesday but escaped next day from a hospital where she was being treated for nerves and sought refuge aboard the yacht. Whitehead has remained ashore since.

The warrant served on Miss Porter ordered her to appear on Saturday under penalty not only of forfeiting her \$100 bond but also of being held in contempt, the penalties for which are severe under Spanish laws.

Whitehead was made defendant more than a year ago in a divorce suit in which his wife charged that he staged drunken "orgies" in their home in Atlanta. Mrs. Whitehead is receiving a temporary monthly alimony of \$1500 under an agreement of settlement.

Miss Porter established a reputation as a dancer in Atlanta after coming there about eight years ago from North Carolina. She later repudiated the charges.

Slain Girl

An automobile horn was sounded in the street in front of her home and 16-year-old Emma Alley of Newcastle, Pa., left the house. That was the last her parents saw of her alive. Her body was found in the woods near the city. Police are holding her companions for questioning.
