IMPROVEMENT IN FLU SITUATION REPORTED TODAY

The influenza situation in Roseburg was reported somewhat improved today. School attendance was slightly larger, although there are still nearly 100 pupils not able to be present.

There is no thought of closing schools unless the condition becomes more serious. It is reported, it is agreed that the children are better off in school, where they can be under observation, than they would be on the streets or playing in groups, where there would be more direct contact.

Recommendations made by County Health Officer Payne, are being put into effect today. The recess period is being discontinued, and also the practice of throwing open the windows and chilling the rooms. The school rooms will also be kept above ordinary temperature and as dry as possible.

Many people are criticizing the instructions to keep the rooms above ordinary temperature, and the elimination of the exercise period. Dr. Payne stated, "but that is because they do not understand the nature of the disease."

"Influenza" is spread through droplet transmission. It is highly contagious, but can only be spread through contact with germs from a person afflicted with the disease. The spread is greatest during moist, cold weather. The breath condenses, and as the air is already saturated with moisture, the droplets of vapor from the breath hang suspended in the air to be blown about by the wind over considerable distance.

"In most of our schools it is the practice once or twice daily to open the windows and permit the children to march or exercise while the rooms are filled with fresh, cold air. It is a very excellent practice under ordinary circumstances, but should be discontinued during the present emergency. When the cold, wet air is allowed into the room the children must be kept exercising and moving about, so that any child having the disease will get the room with breath vapor laden with the flu germs, so that the activity and movement will spread the disease throughout the room."

"The best practice is to keep the rooms warm and dry, so that the vapor from the breath evaporates immediately, which prevents the germs from hanging suspended in the air. Of course, the children must be given exercise, but this, for the time being, should be in warm rooms only."

"We have also recommended that the recess period be eliminated, as that is the time when the youngsters come in close contact and are most apt to transmit the germs from one to the other. We would further urge that parents caution their children to avoid contacts as much as possible, and that the children be instructed not to enter going to or from school for play, as a football, or some other playing, handed from one to another, may prove an ideal conveyance for the disease germs."

"This policy was adopted after a conference with all of the physicians of Roseburg. While it may be stringent, yet we believe that precautions should be taken and every possible means to avoid the disease used."

There are still a number of very severe cases in the city and several new ones were reported today.

was appointed chief last June, by Mayor Fred Hartman who said he wanted things "cleaned up and kept clean."

Last Friday there was an "execution" similar to that of Gilbert when Joseph Martinez, regarded as a leader in the "alky" racket, was shot and killed in front of his soft drink parlor in Chicago Heights. The killers drove by slowly in a large car, with an attempt at concealment and used shotguns and pistols.

Two men whom Chief Gilbert arrested a fortnight ago as they drove through South Chicago Heights with a truck load of alcohol, were caught today as the officers. Police said they believed the pair had slain Gilbert to silence his testimony against them. The police chief had turned them over to federal authorities and they were to have been arraigned today.

The men caught are Giuseppe Bahndi and Rosario Annunzio, gunmen. Scores Again.

CHICAGO, Dec. 7.—Gunmen ripped shotgun shells into a car in South Chicago Heights early today to kill Thomas Scanlon, a type-setter, less than five hours after the village chief of police fell a victim to assassins.

Scanlon was shot in the head as he rode in Adam Roddyberg's car on Lincoln highway. Four men waved flashlights signaling Roddyberg to halt, but he disregarded their commands. Roddyberg, who was not injured, said he believed the men had planned a holdup.

Less than five months ago Roddyberg damaged the plant of the Chicago Electric Light Co., a newspaper where Scanlon was employed. Roddyberg, the editor, said he could not connect the slaying of Scanlon with his own troubles.

mak and coon. Another coon was trapped recently, he says, but escaped with the trap. The region in which he is operating has been heavily infested with wolves, coons and bobcats, he states, and as a result deer have been very scarce. Since trapping has been carried on, however, the deer are increasing rapidly. The fawn crop this year was particularly good and many does were seen with twin fawns. Bobcats are the worst enemies of the fawns and slaughter hundreds of them each year.

PRISON TERMS DEMANDED FOR OREGON RUSTLERS

SALEM, Ore., Dec. 7.—Finding themselves unable to cope with cattle rustlers, members of the Grant county stock growers association have adopted a resolution calling upon the courts to sentence offenders to prison instead of fining them. Copies of the resolution have been sent to the circuit judge for the district in which Grant county is located and to the state supreme court.

The resolution declares that fines, no matter how large, are inadequate.

Stockmen in grant and adjacent counties are said to be losing many thousands of dollars worth of stock each year.

DAMAGE ACTION AGAINST HODGES STARTS AT ALBANY

The damage suit brought by H. S. Brookhart and R. V. Haworth against Jesse G. Hodges, deputy sheriff, is being started in Albany today. Brookhart and Haworth were arrested in 1926 charged with the theft of sheep and after pleading guilty were sentenced to terms in the penitentiary.

They were taken to Salem by Deputy Sheriff Hodges, who, on the way to the penitentiary, wrecked his car near Albany. In the wreck the two prisoners suffered injuries, which they claim are of a permanently disabling nature, and they are suing the officer for \$20,000 each.

They claim that Mr. Hodges was driving in a reckless manner and that he cut around a car at an excessive rate of speed, colliding with a car coming from the opposite direction. As the accident occurred in Linn county, the damage action has been filed at Albany.
