MALONE PAYS WITH LIFE FOR SLAYING WIFE

charge of first degree murder.

Plea to Taft Falls

WASHINGTON, Dec. 7.—Chief Justice Taft refused to stay the hanging at San Quentin prison, California, today of John Joseph Malone, convicted of the murder of his wife at Los Angeles a year ago.

The chief justice told Ernest Spagnoli, of San Francisco, counsel for Malone, that the attack which he sought to make upon the validity of the California law regulating the trial of insanity pleas in murder cases had been brought to the attention of the court in the William Edward Hickman case, at Los Angeles, and that he could see no reason why the court should again go into the matter.

Spagnoli was advised that the warden of the San Quentin prison had refused to postpone the execution until this afternoon to enable him to see other members of the supreme court.

Proceeding on that assumption Spagnoli continued to seek contact with all members of the supreme court.

Another Plot Foiled

SAN QUENTIN PRISON, Cal., Dec. 7.—Prison guards today frustrated the third attempt to escape planned by convicts within the last two weeks when they pulled George Williams, Los Angeles burglar, out of a pile of lumber and stone outside the prison walls. Missing at lockup time last night Williams was sought for hours until his carefully constructed hiding place was discovered. He had evidently spent days in its construction. Williams, serving from one to ten years, was placed in solitary confinement with the prospect of time added to his prison term as punishment.

Last week four condemned men and two long term prisoners were apprehended shortly before they were ready to put an attempt at a break into execution. A few days later a convict, missing at lockup, was found hiding under a rock.
