SAFETY STORES FACTORY MAKE OWN CANDY SUPPLY

On July 19, 1928, the first batch of candy was turned out of the Safety candy factory, operating under the name of the General Foods Products Company, Los Angeles. Production has now reached the total of approximately one car load, or 30,000 pounds of candy daily, and although the plant is running on a 24-hour basis, it is unable to supply the demand of the Safety stores for their Christmas candies. To date orders have been placed by Safety stores for more than 2,000,000 pounds of candy to be delivered for the 1928 holiday trade. To handle this immense amount of business requires a crew of 200 skilled workers on a payroll of \$250,000 annually. According to a statement made by the management of the local Safety store something over 5,000 pounds of these fresh Christmas candies have been ordered by the store here, considerable of it having already been received. Modified has two Safety stores, and between them almost 11,000 pounds of these candies have been ordered.
