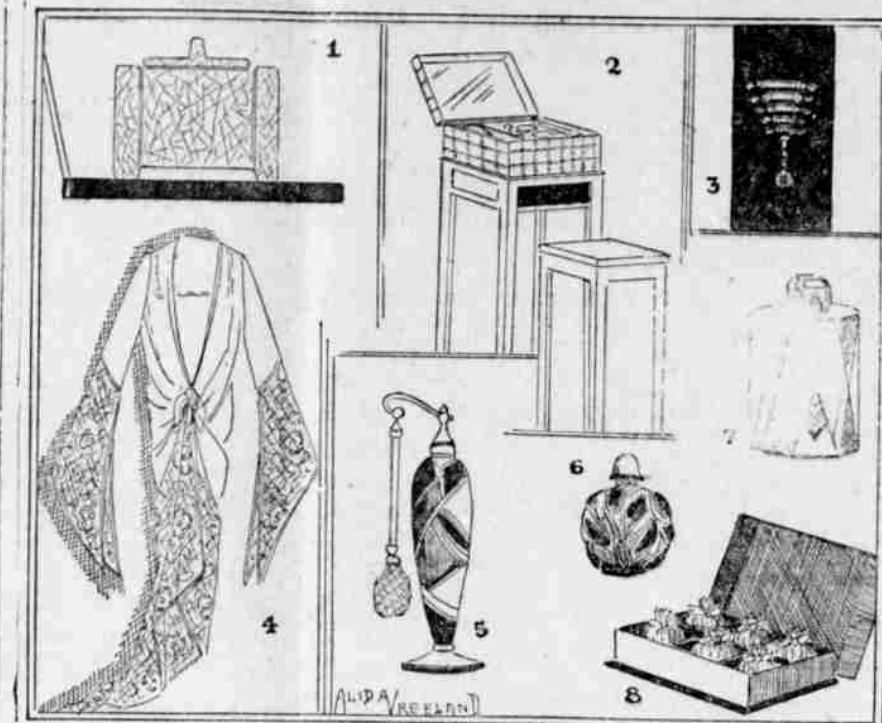
Exquisite Lingerie
