A revival campaign at Dillard, sponsored by the Methodist church, is entering upon its second week. The meetings, which are being held each night at the Dillard church, are conducted by Rev. Ira L. Dumas, who is in addition to being an interesting speaker, is also a fine singer and conductor.

## TO WHOM IT MAY CONCERN:

You are hereby notified that there has been filed with the Oregon State Highway Commission a proposed form of petition proposing the organization of a highway improvement district under the provisions of Chapter 359 of the General Laws of Oregon for 1921, said district to be known as the "North Umpqua-Diamond Lake Highway Improvement District." The land which it is proposed by said petition to include within said district is described as follows, to-wit:

Beginning at the northwest corner of section 28, township 25 south, range 5 west of Willamette Meridian, Douglas County, Oregon. Thence east 4 miles; north 1 mile; east 4 miles; north 11 miles; east 2 miles to the Lane County line. Thence along said line as follows: South 1 mile; east 18 miles to Willamette Meridian; thence south along said Meridian approximately 7 1/2 miles to the southeast corner of section 36, township 24 south, range 1 west; thence east approximately 30 1/2 miles following the Lane-Douglas County line; thence following the eastern boundary of Douglas County in a southerly direction to a point on said line due east of the southeast corner of section 15, township 25 south, range 1 west, thence west for approximately 34 miles to said southeast corner of section 13, township 25 south, range 1 west; thence continuing west for 5 miles to southwest corner of section 15, township 25 south, range 1 west. Thence southwesterly for approximately two miles to the southeast corner of section 15, township 25 south, range 2 west, and thence west along the regular section lines for 2 miles to the northwest corner of section 19, township 25 south, range 5 west; thence south for 6 miles to the southeast corner of section 13, township 29 south, range 6 west; thence west for 6 miles to northwest corner of section 19, township 29 south, range 6 west; thence south 2 miles to southeast corner of section 36, township 29 south, range 7 west, thence west 12 miles to southeast corner of section 31, township 29 south, range 8 west; thence south 6 miles to southeast corner of section 26, township 29 south, range 9 west; thence east 6 miles; north 1 mile; east 1 mile and thence north to the center of the Umpqua river; thence following the center of said river upstream to a point due east of the quarter section corner of sections 7 and 8, township 23 south, range 6 west; thence east to said quarter section corner; thence north 11 miles; east 3 miles; north 2 miles; east 4 miles; east 4 miles; and then east to the east line of the Oregon and California Railroad right-of-way. Thence southerly along the east line of said railroad right-of-way to a point where said right-of-way line intersects the north line of section 29, township 25 south, range 5 west of Willamette Meridian thence east to point of beginning; all in Douglas County, Oregon.

You are further notified that Tuesday, the 11th day of December, 1928, at the hour of 2:00 o'clock P. M. of said day at the County Court House, Roseburg, Douglas County, Oregon, has been set as the time and the place for approving or disapproving the form of said petition, the contents or matters set forth therein and the boundaries of said proposed district.

Any person desiring to protest the organization of said proposed district or desiring to be heard with reference to any of the matters therein set out are hereby notified to appear before the Commission at the time and the place herein designated and file with said Commission at said time or prior thereto, their objections or protests in writing.

## HOLD-UP SHOTS INTO AUTOMOBILE

## OREGON LAWYERS WOULD RETIRE JUDGES AT 70

(Associated Press Special Wire)

PORTLAND, Ore., Dec. 9.—The Oregon State Bar association yesterday decided not to press at the coming session of the legislature a proposal for redefinition of the state laws. A committee reported that the work would be too expensive to be practical.

The association went on record as favoring retirement of judges at full pay at the age of 70 when they have served fifteen years or more. A committee was named to draft such a measure for the legislature.

A committee advised waiting until some later meeting to recommend redistricting of the state. A committee was named to investigate legal work done by some real estate firms.

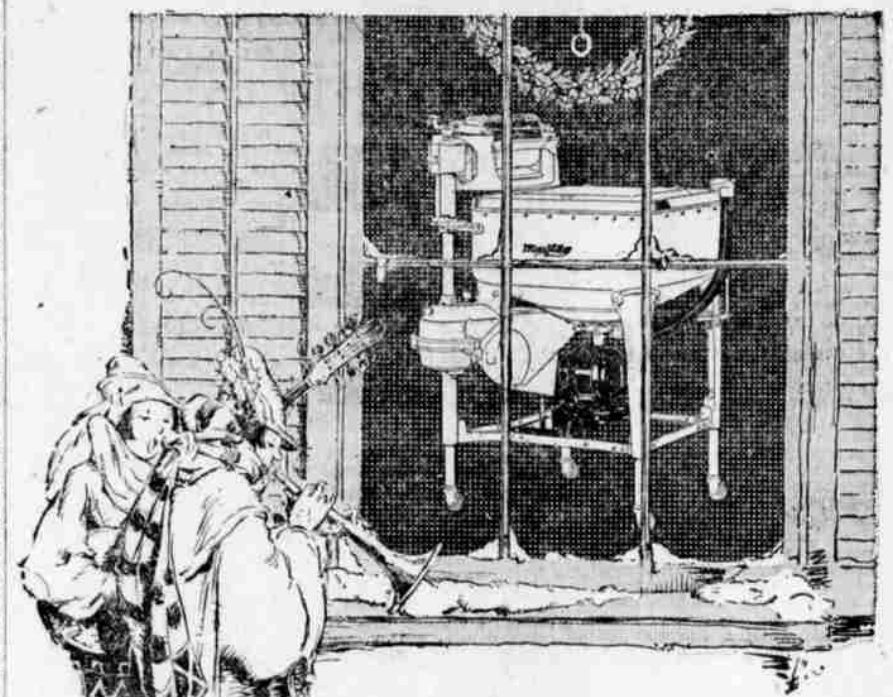
