## MONOPOLY CHARGE AGAINST MAKERS OF RADIOS FAILS

WASHINGTON, Dec. 19.—The federal trade commission dismissed today its complaint charging monopoly in the manufacture and sale of radio devices against the Radio Corporation of America, the General Electric company, the American Telegraph and Telephone company, the Westinghouse Electric Light company, International Radio Telegraph company, the United Fruit company and the Wireless Specialty Apparatus company.

The radio commission today notified six stations that because they have been off their assigned frequency, their licenses will not be renewed at the usual time unless they present satisfactory evidence that the violations of the radio law had ceased.

The stations were: WJBS, Elizabeth, N. J.; KPQ, Seattle,

Wash.; WKBO, Jersey City; KPQW, Seattle; KPCH, Seattle, and WSGH-WSDA, New York.

## BLIND CHURCHMAN SHORT \$150,000 IN ENTRUSTED FUNDS

LOUISVILLE, Ky., Dec. 19.—Private detectives, employed to investigate the financial affairs of Albert Nisbet, blind treasurer of the building fund of the Baptist tabernacle, one of the largest churches of Louisville, who yesterday was reported short nearly \$150,000 in his management of the building fund, resumed the investigation today after announcing that Nisbet's alleged speculations now may total \$150,000.

In addition to the alleged shortage of church funds, Nisbet is now alleged to have defrauded close friends of thousands of dollars.

The detectives also are investigating on the theory that Nisbet had an accomplice and are endeavoring to establish the latter's identity.

Nisbet gained prominence here several years ago when serving as district magistrate by heavy fines and sentences handed down to persons convicted by him for violation of the prohibition law.
