NATIVE DOUGLAS COUNTY DIES AT RED LODGE, MONT.

Word has been received here of the death of John E. Weaver, a native of Douglas county, who died recently at Red Lodge, Montana, where he made his home for a great many years. He was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Hans Weaver, pioneer settlers of the Myrtle Creek district, and was born February 28, 1869 at Missouri Bottom. He went into eastern Oregon at the age of 20 years, employed as a cowboy, and from eastern Oregon went to Montana where he engaged in the livery stable business. A widow and three sons survive him. Numerous relatives reside at Myrtle Creek. Mr. Weaver was very active in the civic life of Red Lodge, and was also connected with several fraternal organizations, particularly the Masonic lodge.

MINDANAO ISLAND ROCKED BY QUAKE

(Associated Press Special Wire) MANILA, Dec. 21.—Manila learned today that a violent earthquake shook the greater part of Mindanao Island Wednesday night. One person was killed at Cotabato, provincial capital. Many houses collapsed and fire broke out but it was quickly controlled. An undetermined number of persons were injured. Damage was estimated at \$100,000. The quake also was felt in Zamboanga and Davao, two other provinces of Mindanao, but little damage was done in those areas.

ADULT AND INFANT DINOSAURIANS ARE FOUND IN CHINA

(Associated Press Special Wire) BERLIN, Dec. 20.—The Berliner Tageblatt today printed a cable dispatch from Sir Sven Anders Hedlin, Swedish explorer, saying that his Chinese collaborator, a geologist named Yuan, had discovered in western China the remains of 39 fully developed dinosaurs, of the Jurassic period. Also three newly born dinosaurian babies, 24 inches long and fresh from the egg were found lying close to the mother animal. A dinosaurian egg was also found in the vicinity. It was claimed that this was the first time that dinosaurians of this geologic period had been found in Asia.
