FIGURES SHOW G. O. P. VICTORY LAST NOVEMBER

every state than that of Mr. Coolidge four years ago with the exception of Rhode Island. This held true in President Coolidge's home state of Massachusetts, which was carried by Governor Smith. The governor's total was less than the democratic figures of four years ago in New Mexico, Tennessee and Texas, notwithstanding the large increase in the number of ballots cast.

The Hoover column shows he received more than a million votes in five states—California, Illinois, New York, Ohio and Pennsylvania. Governor Smith reached the million mark in Illinois, New York and Pennsylvania.

Solid South Broken

States of the once-solid south recorded 2,004,145 votes for the two major party candidates, almost a million less than cast in New York state for Mr. Hoover and Governor Smith.

Hoover polled 1,466,488 of these and Smith 1,537,657 in Alabama, Arkansas, Florida, Georgia, Louisiana, Mississippi, South Carolina, Texas, Virginia and North Carolina, all of whom had supported the democratic presidential candidate since reconstruction days until the recent election.

Mr. Hoover's southern vote was more than double that of Mr. Coolidge four years ago and almost twice the combined figures for the president and Senator LaFollette that year. It came within 91,000 votes of equalling Mr. Davis' total in the same territory.

Vote 25 Per Cent Higher

The vote of 38,798,669 showed a big jump over the figures for 1924, when 29,981,417 persons cast ballots in the presidential race. This increase was especially reflected in the south, Alabama as an example recording 248,981 ballots as against 166,593 four years ago. Other states in various sections showed a similar result.

The increase for the nation as a whole over 1924 was slightly more than 25 per cent. In the south the figures were approximately 43 per cent higher than they were four years ago.

TURKEY MARKET NEWS NOTES

SAN FRANCISCO.—Receipts were heavier: live turkeys brought 25c to 30c; dressed turkey hens sold for 22c to 25c; and dressed toms brought 24c to 26c. The 4, 8, 12, paying prices were 24c for hens and 26c for toms; 25c was paid for culls.

The Los Angeles market was steady to firm. No 4 dressed turkeys brought 26c to 28c at Los Angeles. Receipts were heavier with heavier arrivals expected today and Thursday.

At Boston buyers were looking around but buying light. Texas hens at Boston brought 26c to 28c; Texas toms, 41c.

Northwestern hens at Boston brought 42c and Northwestern toms, 45c in Boston. The undertone of the market was easy.

Philadelphia, Pennsylvania market was steady to firm; trading is still light. Northwestern hens and toms sold for 42c to 44c with a few sales of heavy young toms at 45c. Western hens and toms brought 41c to 42c. Arrivals from Texas at that market to date are light.

At Fort Worth, Texas, the last report indicates that demand is largely for local market; the dressing plants report heavy arrivals with much stock going into cold storage. Prices are 25c to 26c live weight for toms; and 18c to 20c live weight for hens. Much stock now arriving was delayed on account of rainy weather last week. Carol shippers report a fair profit on cars, but not enough to overcome losses at Thanksgiving. At San Antonio, Texas receipts were liberal; prices were steady at 20c to 21c for hens and toms; a few sales of car lots of dressed turkeys were made at 20c to 21c for hens and toms. This concludes the market report for this afternoon.
