

INDIAN OFFICER SLAYS WHITE MAN IN LIQUOR FEUD

(Associated Press United Wire)

COLVILLE, Wash., Dec. 27.—Victor Dupuis, 55, and Kik Carson, 54, both Indian reservation policemen, were held in the county jail on an open charge today, awaiting federal hearings at which Dupuis is expected to be charged with murdering Robert Sizemore, a white man, at Inchellum, Wash.

The arrests followed a rough and tumble brawl Christmas night, when hot words passed between the policeman and Sizemore, which led to the latter's fatal injury. Officers found the two Indians asleep last night, and Dupuis had under his pillow the .35 caliber revolver with which he admitted having fired at Sizemore.

Dupuis told officers, they said, that the shooting was the result of a feud started two weeks ago when he attempted to arrest Sizemore on a charge of liquor possession. The matter came up again on the dance floor, and the Indian policeman said he knocked Sizemore down with a pair of handcuffs, and "left the hall to report to Indian Farmer Tardy."

Sizemore followed and knocked Dupuis down and the latter fired three shots at the white man. Sizemore died the next day at a hospital here.

Kik Carson, who wears the long hair and beard of his famous namesake, denied any connection with the affray, but Sizemore's wife said that he also attacked her husband and that after she wrested a pistol from Dupuis, Carson kicked it out of her hand.

Charges were expected to be filed before the U. S. commissioner here Saturday.

BRIDGE REPLACES THE OLDEST COUNTY FERRY CROSSING

Clyde Catching, local contractor, has just returned from Elkhon, where he has been constructing the Smith Ferry bridge over the Umpqua river. This bridge is located on the site of the oldest known river crossing in Douglas county.

The road started as an Indian trail. The Indians themselves did not know how old the trail was, but they followed it for many, many years in their trips up the Umpqua river and it was their main artery of travel into Eastern Oregon and up to Cape Lisianski on the North Umpqua, where the Indians gathered each year from all of Southern Oregon for a period of festivity.

The first white men to arrive in the county found the trail big enough to be used as a road, and so it was put into use. The bridge followed was very nearly the same as that of the present road between Willard and Elkhon, only a few changes having been made from the original location.

Scottsburg was the first town in Southern Oregon. When the Oregon-California trail was established, Canyonville became an important stop, and a thriving business was begun hauling freight overland between Scottsburg and Canyonville over the road which crossed the Smith ferry.

In 1855, General Joseph Hooker, later of Civil War fame, surveyed the road for the government, and it was laid out for military purposes and became a military road.

Improvements have been made year after year, particularly recently, grades being eliminated and curves widened, until it is now a fine piece of highway, except for a few short, narrow stretches.

Until last week no means of crossing the river, other than by ferry, had ever been provided. Early in the year, however, the county court let the contract for the construction of the steel bridge, which Mr. Catching has just finished, and now the old pioneer ferry has been abolished.

The bridge is 750 feet long, with a continuous steel span of 400 feet and 300 feet of approach. It is the only county bridge having a tongue-and-groove deck, the timbers for the floor being 6 by 6 inches with the tongue and groove joint, giving greater strength and security. The bridge will cost approximately \$45,000 and was built from special district, bridge and market road funds.
