WORSE OUTBREAK OF INFLUENZA THIS WINTER FORECAST

WASHINGTON, Dec. 28.—Another outbreak of influenza more severe in nature than the disease now prevailing is regarded as a possibility later in the winter by Surgeon General Cummings. He said that he viewed the situation at present as serious, but declared that the present wave is mild in character and that there is an apparent absence of complications.

There is little likelihood in the opinion of the surgeon general that the disease will not spread over the Atlantic states at its west and parts of the south. "This seems to be a typical influenza epidemic," he said, "and it is similar to the 1918 outbreak in the midst of the first cases." Deaths in the 1918 wave of influenza were 50,000 in excess of the normal number from the country, and in 1920 there were 100,000 excess deaths but in 1920 there were only between 15,000 and 20,000. Indications thus far have led Surgeon General Cummings to believe that mortality this year may be greater than in 1920.

He agreed with the estimate by public health officers that there were approximately a million and a quarter new cases in the United States during the week ending December 22. This estimate was based on 240,562 cases actually reported from all but seven states. Deaths from 58 cities for the week ending December 22 were 710, reports to the census bureau showed, as compared with 475 deaths in 62 cities for the previous week. Surgeon General Cummings said that his bureau expects totals of a large increase in deaths as the number of cases increased.

DEVOS UNDER 160 POUNDS FOR FIGHT WITH ACE HUDKINS

NEW YORK, Dec. 28.—Rene Devos expected difficulty in getting in under the middleweight limit of 160 pounds failed to materialize and the Belgian boxer scaled 158½ pounds at the official weighing for tonight's battle with Ace Hudkins. The Nebraska wildcat weighed 155½, giving Devos an advantage of only three and a quarter pounds.

MIAMI BEACH, Fla., Dec. 28.—Definite announcement was made here today by Tex Rickard that W. L. (Young) Stridling of Macon, Ga., and Jack Sharkey, the Boston sailor, had been signed for a heavyweight bout here on February 27. The winner probably will meet Jack Dempsey for the championship.

CHICAGO POPULATION SHOWS 75,000 GROWTH

CHICAGO, Dec. 27.—Chicago is further entrenched as the second city of the United States with a population of 2,215,000 figures compiled by the Chicago association of commerce show.

This figure represents an increase of 75,000 over the 1927 population.

The association estimates metropolitan Chicago will have a population of 4,500,000 January 1, 1929, or 100,000 more than last year. Metropolitan Chicago includes the territory within 35 miles of the loop.

FAMILY ILL AFTER FEAST ON SUPPOSED MUSHROOMS

FARM REAL ESTATE SITUATION BETTER

A more favorable status of the farm real estate is reported by the Bureau of Agricultural Economics, United States Department of Agriculture, in a lessening rate of decline in farm land values.

Farm land values on March 1, 1928, says the bureau, brought the national average value to the level that prevailed in the year 1917. This is 17 points above the 1913-14 level taken as the pre-war average, and 20 points higher than the value in 1912, the earliest year for which data are available. Reckoned as a percentage of its 1920 peak, the national average on March 1, 1928, had come down about a third.

Discussing the farm-mortgage credit situation, the bureau declares that "first mortgage money is generally in good supply. Interest rates generally have continued to be favorable. Terms offered by owners to move farms in the present market are frequently unusual. It is favorable to buyers. However, the easiest terms usually go with the poorer lands."

The general tendency of farm taxes has been "slightly upward" during the past year, says the bureau, and there is little likelihood of any marked decrease in the next few years. The only possibility of a radical decline in farm taxes, it is pointed out, is in a revision of state and local revenue systems that will make something other than the sales value of real estate the criterion of tax liability.

MILCH COW HAS RIVAL IN GUATEMALAN TREE

CHICAGO, Dec. 27.—"Milk from contented trees" might well be a slogan in Guatemala.

Samuel J. Record, wood technologist on the staff of the Field museum, has returned from Central America, bringing a sample of milk and wood from the Guatemalan cow tree.

The milk is palatable and tastes and looks much like cow's milk. Record said a "dairy" of cow trees would be practical. He added, however, that the tree might be used more profitably in the manufacture of chewing gum.
