SONNENBERG GETS ANOTHER CHANCE AT LEWIS' TITLE

Former Dartmouth Griddler and Wrestling King to Clash Before Gate of \$75,000.

(Associated Press Local Wire)

BOSTON, Jan. 4.—Ed "Strangler" Lewis, world's heavyweight wrestling champion, and Gus Sonnenberg, former Dartmouth football player, meet in a championship match at the Boston garden tonight.

Lewis, who tipped the scales at 255 pounds, had a 35-pound weight advantage over Sonnenberg. During their training this week both men have concentrated on the holds which have given them their present position in the wrestling world. The champion has worked on his headlock, the hold that won him his nickname, and Sonnenberg has further developed the flying tackle which he borrowed from his college football training.

Last year Sonnenberg, then a rank outsider, lost his first chance at the title, and won the first fall from Lewis with this hold. A few minutes afterward, however, the champion dodged him, and Sonnenberg landed head first on the concrete outside the ring. He was in a hospital for the next week.

\$75,000 Gate Expected
Lewis, according to Paul Bowser, promoter of the championship match, will receive \$25,000 for his purse and Sonnenberg has agreed to wrestle for 125 per cent of the gate receipts, which were expected to reach \$75,000. When Bowser started his advance sale, he took in \$4,700 the first day, a record-breaking figure for Boston.

Most of this cash, the promoter said, came from men and women who have never seen a wrestling match, but who were willing to spend money to see Sonnenberg in action. Bowser expects the championship struggle to be a sell-out many days before the match.

During the past football season, when Sonnenberg wrestled twice and sometimes three times a week, he played tackle in every game played by the Providence Steamrollers, which won the professional league title. During one week Sonnenberg was five consecutive victories in as many nights.

Promotes Football
Sonnenberg's first year in the mat game netted him about \$20,000 and his earnings for the coming year should exceed twice that figure. He is "sold" on professional football, his favorite pastime, and has been considering the use of his mat profits to promote professional football in Boston, now that this state has legalized Sunday sports.

OPINION DIVIDES ON WOMEN EVENTS IN THE OLYMPIAD

NEW YORK, Jan. 4.—Opinion expressed by the Women's Division of the National Amateur Athletic federation to participation by women in the 1932 Olympic games will not prevent that part of the program from being carried out in full, according to Olympic and A. A. U. leaders.

Addressing the fifth annual meeting of the women's division yesterday, Ethel Percin, chairman of the division's executive committee, reported that her committee had endorsed the launching of a campaign to educate girls in schools and colleges and other girls of school and college age not to train for competition in the next Olympic games to be held in Los Angeles.

Most Olympic and A. A. U. officials thought the women's organization's opposition would have no effect on the program. "I do not think it will have any effect on the host," said Gustavus T. Kirby, past president of the American Olympic committee. "There are tens of thousands of girls who demand the right of competition and they are going to get it."

The matter was discussed very carefully by the International Amateur Athletic Federation at Amsterdam. Some thought that the events were perhaps too strenuous but statistics showed that the competition of girls and women had no bad effect, with due consideration to their condition at the time.

U. S. UNENTAINED LAND OF VAST PROPORTION

WASHINGTON, Jan. 4.—The government still owns 193,847,240 acres of public lands, unentered and unreserved.

The territory equals, it was shown in the annual report of the interior department, the combined area of Maine, New Hampshire, Vermont, Massachusetts, Connecticut, Rhode Island, New York, New Jersey, Pennsylvania, Delaware, Maryland, Virginia, West Virginia and North Carolina.

In addition, the government owns 125,000,000 acres of national forest lands available for mining leases and mineral rights on 15,800,000 acres of patented homestead and 12,600,000 acres of other patented lands. The areas all are exclusive of Alaska.

PORTLAND POPULATION OVER 356,000. CLAIM

CHARLES HALL TO TAKE PRESIDENCY OF EUGENE BANKS

Bancorporation Adds to Its Chain; Gardiner Men Named Official Positions.

(Associated Press Local Wire)

EUGENE, Jan. 4.—In accordance with decision of the executive committee of the Pacific Bancorporation, Charles Hall, president of the Bancorporation, will assume presidency of the United States National bank of Eugene, and of the Eugene Loan and Savings bank, at the annual bank elections January 10.

G. S. Hinsdale, vice president of the First National bank of Gardiner, is to become a vice-president of the two Eugene banks, and H. L. Edmunds, vice-president and cashier of the Gardiner bank, will become cashier of both Eugene institutions.

Mr. Hall will retire as president of the American bank at Marshfield, and will be succeeded by W. L. Douglas, a well known attorney with long banking experience.

Mr. Hall's personal direction of the affairs of the United States National at Eugene, member bank of the Pacific Bancorporation, is held particularly desirable by the executive committee, according to an announcement of the proposed changes, because of the importance of the city of Eugene by virtue of its central location and the prospects of its growth and business expansion.

W. W. Calkins, president of the Eugene banks, will become chairman of the board of directors of the two banks. Mr. Calkins, relinquishing active management of his banking interests, will have time in his leisure to devote to other interests.

The change in bank personnel probably prefigures Senator Hall's taking up his residence in Eugene, although there has been no announcement to that effect.

Mr. Hinsdale and Mr. Edmunds both live on the Umpqua, and both are well known in Eugene. They will retain an official connection with the Gardiner bank, with the "cross and growth" of which they had a large part, but will make their homes in Eugene and center their major activity in the administration of the business of the Eugene institutions.

The other vice-presidents and junior officers of the Eugene banks will remain the same, it is announced.

The banks affiliated with the Pacific Bancorporation are Bank of Commerce, Astoria; Portland National bank; First National bank of Gardiner; Farmers and Merchants bank of Coquille; Clifton State bank; United States National and Eugene Loan and Savings bank, both of Eugene; American bank of Marshfield; First National bank of Silverton; Bank of Myrtle Point. The combined resources of the 10 banks are approximately \$10,000,000.

GOULD'S GAMBLING DEN NOT OPENED; LICENSE LACKING

NICE, France, Jan. 3.—Failure of the French government to issue a gambling license, has prevented the opening of Frank Jay Gould's new \$5,000,000 casino.

The situation was regarded today as so serious to the welfare of the city that the mayor of Nice went to Paris to plead that the government grant a gambling license to the establishment. City leaders feared that the failure to open the casino, since it would result in a heavy loss to its builder, might create unwillingness among other foreign capitalists to invest their money in France.

The gala opening was widely advertised for New Year's day. Hundreds of persons dressed in evening clothes waited outside the gates for several hours while 500 employees, including waiters, croupiers, cashiers and managers, stood at their posts within.
