

EIGHTEEN YEARS IN RING SLOWS UP JOHNNY DUNDEE

Former Holder of 2 Titles
Defeated by Rosenberg;
German Edition of
Dempsey Wins.

NEW YORK, Jan. 5.—The end of the road, a long and honorable way that has wound through fastness for over eighteen years, appeared today in the sight of Johnny Dundee, brave little warrior who has fought them all, and once a champion in both the featherweight and junior lightweight divisions.

At times Johnny baffled the rugged Phil Rosenberg, ten years his junior and five pounds heavier, with the lightning left hooks, the bounding footwork, and easy swapping at close quarters that

made him famous. A few times Dundee tried his old trick of bounding backward into the ropes, leaping forth again to spear his opponent off balance. But last night this maneuver, a trick Johnny himself invented, was just a slow-motion exhibition of how it used to be done.

Although Johnny was beaten solidly about the body at times at long range, where he once was invincible, the Scotch-woy had the satisfaction of flooring Rosenberg for no count in the sixth round with a right to the chin, thus adding in perhaps his final engagement to the reputation he has always borne for light hitting.

New Dempsey Election

The main bout, overshadowed in sentimental interest at least by the battle of the former champions, added more impetus to the surge of the young German heavyweight, Max Schmeling, who easily routed Joe Seayra, blonde Bohemian from Dayton.

Schmeling, who is almost a duplicate in appearance of Jack Dempsey—the same cast of countenance, lowered black brows, long, slim muscles and bobbing weave—fought for the second time in America. In his first engagement he knocked out Joe Monte, of Boston, and last night did all but that to Seayra.

The Dayton youth was blood-

drenched and wobbling at the close from the short hooks Schmeling threw from a crouch to his head. He rarely played for Seayra's body and might have knocked him out with a more varied attack. As it was, Schmeling drew round after round of applause from the 15,531 fans. He seemed impervious to punishment, a sharp blitzer with either hand, a smart, clever boxer.

Foley-Filipino Draw

VANCOUVER, B. C., Jan. 5.—Vic Foley, Vancouver lightweight, and Ignacio Fernandez, San Francisco Filipino, fought ten rounds to a draw here last night. Foley weighed 131 and Fernandez 123. Fernandez had Foley down for a count of five in the eighth round. Except for this and some mixing in the final round the bout was tame.

STATES FACE HARD FIGHT TO RECOVER MONEY PAID U. S.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 4.—Development before the house ways and means committee at hearing today on the resolution seeking to permit states to sue the federal government for recovery of \$200,000,000 allegedly illegally collected direct taxes in 1895, 1897, and 1898 indicated that the states face a strenuous battle. The resolution has been adopted by the senate.

State's rights, statutes of limitations and definite claims were debated between the witnesses, Senator Stephens, democrat, Mississippi, and Burton Schmitt of Brooklyn, N. Y., representing New York and 24 other states involved in the claims, and committee members.

Chairman Hawley read a letter from Attorney General Sargent expressing the opinion that the matter should go before the court of claims and not to the supreme court as provided in the resolution.

In another letter read, Secretary Mellon informed the committee that several hundreds of millions of dollars would be required "to settle all claims with respect to internal revenue taxes since 1868 alleged to have been illegally collected or on which the statutes of limitations have run against the taxpayers."

THOS. T. BENNETT, PROMINENT COOS RESIDENT, DIES

MARSHFIELD, Ore., Jan. 4.—Thomas T. Bennett, 42, former state representative from Coos county and ex-president of Coos County Bar association, died here today of complications following influenza.

Bennett was the last direct descendant of the pioneer Bennett family which came to the Coos bay country from Bandon, Ireland. He was a grandson of George Bennett, who came from Ireland in 1873 and who founded the town of Bandon, Oregon, at the mouth of the Coquille river.

J. W. Bennett, father of Thomas Bennett, founded the Flanagan and Bennett bank in Marshfield, which is now the oldest institution of its kind in Coos county.

Thomas T. Bennett gained national recognition when he represented the Brookings State bank against the Federal Reserve bank of San Francisco, in which suit he gained a complete victory for state banks in this country on the question of exchange.

AMERICAN GIRL MAY BECOME BALTIC QUEEN

STOCKHOLM, Jan. 4.—The possibility of an American queen for a new monarchy which is being talked of through the union of three Baltic states has been suggested by dispatches to Swedish newspapers from Riga. These state that there has been an intense propaganda during the past month in favor of the establishment of a monarchy in Estonia, Latvia and Lithuania united under one king.

It is declared that such a move is considered even by many non-monarchists as the most suitable solution for the problems of those countries with regard to their future status.

In Estonia there is a move reported in favor of electing Prince Folke Bernadotte of Sweden, king of the "Baltic states." It is recalled that the prince recently was married to Miss Estelle Manville of Pleasantville, New York, which, in the event of his selection, would give the proposed new state an American girl as queen.

NEW HOTEL WILL BE BUILT AT GLENDALE

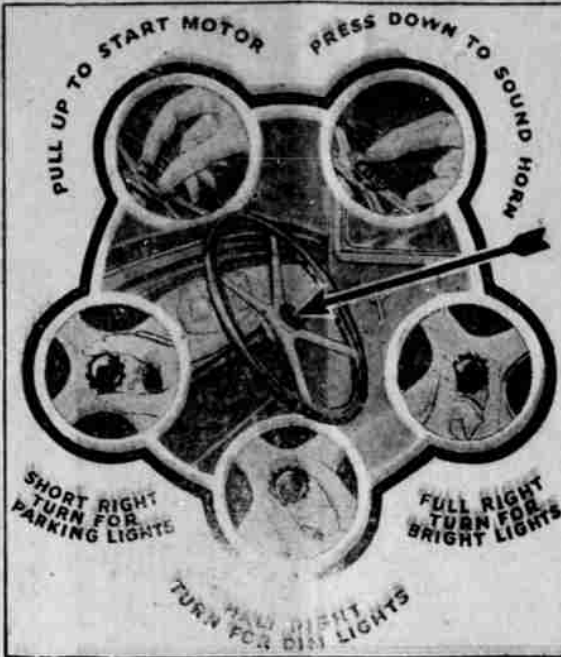
Construction of the new two-story hotel building was started the first of the week by Nerbas and Miles of Roseburg, says the Glendale Lee. The building is to be located on Pacific avenue between 4th and 5th streets. The structure will be of concrete, 60x80, the excavation is well under way. There will be 24 bedrooms and lobby on the second floor, while the lower floor will be occupied by Kafe's Kafe and a pool room and soda fountain each having a floor space of 25x50 feet. The building will be equipped with hot and cold water and will be steam heated throughout.

The new "Finger-Tip Control" controlled from a single button located in the center of the steering wheel. \$30,000 ASKED TO AID FLU-STRIKEN WESTERN INDIANS

WASHINGTON, Jan. 4.—Officials of the bureau of Indian affairs declare that the influenza epidemic has made serious inroads among Indians of the west and emergency funds are needed to help them.

Edgar H. Merritt, assistant commissioner of Indian affairs, testifies before a house sub-committee in support of a deficiency appropriation of \$30,000 to meet the situation, declared the epidemic was principally in the southwest, but was spreading northward, and that as many as 300 children from one school had been in hospitals at Phoenix, Arizona.

The testimony, given on December 22, was made public today along with the report of the Post deficiency bill to the house. Merritt said the disease started among the Indians in southern California, spread through the reservations in Arizona and New Mexico and then northward. The \$30,000 would be in the form of a gratuity, serving only Indians who have small or no tribal funds.

Part of the money also would go toward relieving sufferers from drought in the Navajo country.

PATTERSON PUTS D. C. BORTZMEYER ON STATE BOARD

SALEM, Ore., Jan. 5.—O. C. Bortzmeyer, member of the Portland civil service board, insurance man and civic worker, was yesterday appointed by Governor Patterson to succeed Edward Ostrander as a member of the public service commission. Ostrander has served four years.

Hylen H. Corey of Baker, who has served 12 years as a member of the commission, was reappointed by the governor.

Governor Patterson said that Bortzmeyer was one of several candidates to represent the western Oregon district on the commission, and that Corey was the only eastern Oregon candidate. A letter in Corey's behalf was received by the governor from Clyde B. Atchison, member of the interstate commerce committee, who was a member of the Oregon commission when Corey was its secretary.

The change in the personnel of the commission is effective next Monday.

Corey was appointed a member of the commission in June, 1916, by Governor Withycombe after having been nominated for the office at the May primary of that year. He was elected the following November. Corey was reelected in 1920 and 1924.

Edward Ostrander, the deposed

member of the commission, served as secretary of the department a number of years ago. He then left the employ of the state, later returned as secretary and was elected a member of the commission four years ago. Prior to entering the service of the state he was identified with the railroads as a rate expert. He has been connected with the lumbering business.

TREE CAUSES MUNICIPAL WARFARE IN FRISCO

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 4.—Warfare flamed today between John McLaren, creator and superintendent of Golden Gate park, and the San Francisco board of public works. McLaren directed his men to rip up a concrete roadway near the park police station and to replace a cypress tree that had been rooted up by board of works laborers.

Last night, McLaren said, board of works laborers surreptitiously tore up the tree and carried it away to make room for a road running from Kezar stadium through the park. Today the superintendent, who for years has guarded every plant and flower in the park, ordered out a tractor and personally supervised the work of tearing out the concrete and replacing the tree.

Timothy A. Reardon, president of the board of works, ordered the road extension. It was said, when he noticed traffic congestion after a football game at Kezar stadium. At a late hour today McLaren was still holding the fort and replanting the outraged tree. Although board of works laborers appealed to Captain John J. O'Meara, of the park police to stop it.
