## KEEP MILLAGE TAX. HEADS OF PUBLIC SCHOOLS ADVISE

(Associated Press Local Wire)  
PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 3.—The public school forces of the state issued their challenge to the property tax relief commission yesterday. H. E. Inlow, retiring president of the Oregon State Teachers' association and superintendent of the Pendleton schools, was spokesman for the educational bodies in their fight against the proposed elimination of the 2-mill elementary school tax.

"We are compelled to oppose any attempt to abandon the 2-mill elementary school tax unless a sound and suitable substitute is found for it—and we see no acceptable substitute in view," said Dr. Inlow.

"We will take our fight into the legislature or to the people if the commission recommends abolishing this tax. Of course, if at the legislature a sound and stable solution can be found, we will work with those who have the matter in charge.

"If no such substitute can be found, we will be glad to go into a conference with this or any other body having the matter in charge to study the question. We would like to work with this commission, but will be unable to do so if it continues to recommend a repeal of the 2-mill elementary tax without giving a proper and suitable substitute.

Mr. Inlow declared many school folk oppose the proposed tobacco tax to raise school funds in lieu of the elementary tax. He said these persons hold it would be inconsistent to raise educational funds this way.

For himself he declared the chief objection to be that it would be unstable and could never be depended upon. He said any luxury tax would be unacceptable on account of being indefensible.

The speaker was accompanied by State Superintendent Howard and Portland City Superintendent Rice. Both said Mr. Inlow spoke for the entire elementary school folk of the state.

## IDAHO WOMEN TO WAR ON POOR BEAUTY DOCTORS

BOISE, Idaho, Jan. 3.—Club women of Boise, in conference here last night, voted to sponsor legislation in the coming legislature to protect the feminine public from inefficient beauty specialists.

The women, constituting what they termed the legislative council of all clubs in the city, also proposed measures for putting more teeth in the state prohibition law and for making women eligible for jury service.

But they sponsored a measure for abolishing the elective office of state superintendent of public instruction, the only office in the state government habitually held by a woman.

## YOST DEFENDS HIS PROPOSED FUMBBLED FOOTBALL RULE

FAIRMONT, W. Va., Jan. 3.—Fielding H. Yost, director of athletics at the University of Michigan and one of the country's foremost football coaches, does not believe the football rule making a fumbled ball dead as proposed at the recent coaches' conference at New Orleans would slow up the game or make it less exciting.

"A fumble is a mechanical error on the part of a player and I do not believe a 'live' team should suffer from his error," said Yost, who was called to Fairview, near here, several days ago by the serious illness of his mother.

"I do not agree with the impression held by some that the change of rules will slow up the game or rob it of exciting features," he said. "In fact, I think it will add to the sport in every particular.

"During the years that I have been connected with the great American game," Yost continued, "I have made three suggestions regarding rules changes. Two have been adopted and I have helped the game; the other, made three years ago is the fumble amendment."

The Michigan director deplored the all-American craze which has swept the country since Walter Camp's death. No man can see all the players eligible to a mythical stellar eleven and the selections always do an injustice to some player, he said.

## AIR MAIL POSTAGE RATE CUT RESULTS IN HUGE DEFICIT

WASHINGTON, Jan. 4.—Decrease of air mail postage rates from ten cents to five cents an ounce has doubled the postage carried but cut returns to the government in half and postal officials see little hope of ever operating this business without a loss.

This was the recent testimony made public today, of W. Irving Glover, second assistant postmaster general, before a house subcommittee in urging a deficiency appropriation of \$5,000,000 to take care of air mail transportation this fiscal year.

Glover said under the old rate 214,000 pounds of mail were carried by planes last July and that the figure jumped to 419,000 pounds the following month when the five cent rate took effect. He placed the loss to the government from \$5,000,000 to \$7,000,000 a year and said that while the receipts under the new rate equalled those under the former, the expense went higher as more mail was carried.

## MAMMOTH CAVE BOUGHT

LOUISVILLE, Ky., Jan. 3.—Purchase of Mammoth cave by the Mammoth Cave National Park association was announced today. The cave and nearby land of 2208 acres was bought from heirs of the original owner for approximately \$500,000 and will be operated by the association until such time as it raises enough money to complete the purchase of nearby tracts, when the whole is to be donated to the government for a national park.
