Sheriff Percot not to proceed with the execution.

"I have consulted other members of the court," the governor explained, "and they seem to think the act of the chief justice is an impossible one. The whole state seems to be alarmed by such individual action of the chief justice against the whole court."

"I have not recalled the death warrant and it still stands. As soon as I get instructions from the supreme court I will advise the sheriff further."

The act of the chief justice is an attack upon the majesty of the supreme court, I fear."

**Justice Creates Muddle**

Chief Justice Charles A. O'Neill has ordered that executions be stayed while four associate justices of the same body have notified the sheriff to proceed with the hangings.

Sheriff Percot has not decided as yet whether the execution will be made up his mind today when official copies of the supreme court orders are received.

In granting the stay of execution, Chief Justice O'Neill ordered Judge Simon and Sheriff Percot to appear before the supreme court next Friday and show cause why the lunacy commission denied by Simon yesterday should not be appointed.

LeBonnet was slain July 1, 1927.

Eight body types in unique attractive color combinations, featuring many refinements in mechanical detail, comfort and appearance, are offered. The cars are a striking answer as to how Walter P. Chrysler intends to increase Dodge Brothers prestige, for the innumerable features at a price that only the uniting of such tremendous facilities could produce. Body types available include the 5-passenger phaeton, roadster with rumble seat, 5-passenger sedan, 5-passenger deluxe sedan, 5-passenger touring, 4-passenger Victoria, 2-passenger business coupe and deluxe coupe with rumble seat. Production is under way on a record breaking scale to insure prompt deliveries.

From the radiator emblem to the clean-cut enameled housing that conceals the gasoline tank, there is a touch of artistic finality about the car. A distinctive general appearance features the Monopiece body construction.

The Monopiece body construction, an exclusive feature of all models, provides rigidity and balance which only this design can give. The body is so mounted on the chassis that the passenger load rides close to the ground. Sideways, yet the interiors have been enlarged to afford maximum vision and room for every passenger.

All doors are unusually wide, permitting easy entrance or exit. Adjustable rubber buffers are built in the door sills to insure quiet closing and prevent squeaks or rattles.

Inside coach work gives the impression of custom built design, with mohair upholstery in blue or tan shades trimmed in brown. Seat cushions are wide and deep, tilted at the proper angles for riding comfort.

Convenience and completeness are featured on the attractively arranged controls in the driver's compartment. Grouped in a panel indirectly illuminated are speedometer, ammeter, oil gauge and fuel gauge. In the same panel, symmetrically arranged, are the starting button, carburetor choke, manifold heat control, spark control and approved theft lock ignition switch.

On top of the one-piece finger thin steering wheel are the light control switch, gasoline throttle and horn button.

Many refinements in engine design, making for increased power, economy, speed and acceleration have been developed. The engine is the "L" head type with a bore of 3.8 inches and stroke of 3.78 inches, and a total displacement of 208 cubic inches. Seven bearings, with a total area of 24.15 square inches support the 22 pound crankshaft which is dynamically and statically balanced, and completely machined. The large bronze-back bearings are held immovably in place by positive self-aligning bearing caps. A new front and exhaust manifold leaves the driving compartment free from engine heat. Four aluminum alloy pistons with three compression rings and one oil ring are provided. The engine is completely insulated from the frame by a live rear rubber mounting, insuring freedom from vibration.

Cylinders are cast in block with the upper half of the crankcase. The cylinder head being detachable. Combustion chambers are completely machined, giving uniformity of compression in all cylinders, a factor in smooth operation. Exhaustive tests have proven the engine capable of easily developing 60 or 65 miles an hour with reserve power available for higher speeds. An improved carburetor and ignition system have been adopted. Engine accessories of the latest type include oil filter, mass line filter and air cleaner. The engine oiling system is by gear type pump with full force feed lubrication.

Chrysler hydraulic weather-proof four-wheel brakes, expanding in 12-inch brake drums provide a total braking area of 151.8 square inches, affording positive control of the car at all times. The hand brake, of the contracting band type, is mounted at the rear of the transmission.

**GUS SONNENBERG TAKES TITLE FROM STRANGLER LEWS**

When the "strangler" did get going he tried for victory with a series of headlocks, all of which Sonnenberg broke or slipped free. Lewis received \$50,000 for his night's work. Sonnenberg's share ran about \$9,000. Total receipts exceeded \$120,000.

By winning the title, Sonnenberg probably assured himself of professional football next fall. The former Dartmouth player, who became "wild" on that game while playing with the Bears, this year's professional champion, promised that if he defeated Lewis for the title, he would use the resulting profits in the promotion of the professional game in this city.

**Title Long Held**

Sonnenberg, who is in his early thirties, first went to Dartmouth, where he starred at tackle, and then to the University of Detroit, from which he was graduated five years ago.

Lewis, who is 27, is a native of Lexington, Ky., and as Frank Frederick, his true name, was graduated from a college in that

state. He is a berrilliantist by avocation.

Lewis had held the title for nearly ten years with one brief interim after his defeat by Wayne Munn, the big Iowa. He resigned it from Joe Stecher in St. Louis in February, 1927.

Last summer in this city Sonnenberg threw Lewis once but when Sonnenberg tried his flying tackle for the second fall, the stranger dodged and Sonnenberg sailed through the ropes to the concrete floor. He was unconscious for hours.

**EDWARD F. NELSON**

**A. P. NEWS EDITOR**

**GIVEN PROMOTION**

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 5.—Edward F. Nelson, who has been correspondent of the Associated Press in charge of the bureau at Portland the past eight years, has been appointed news editor of Rocky Mountain division of the Associated Press, which includes the states of Colorado, Montana, Wyoming and New Mexico. His headquarters will be at Denver, where he will take charge January 16.

Leslie J. Smith, who has been night editor of the Portland Oregonian more than two years, will take Nelson's place in Portland, and A. E. Harris, of the Morning Astorian, Astoria, will become night editor. Charles E. Brannin will continue as editor of the day state wire.

Nelson took charge of the Portland bureau in September, 1920, and has been active in developing the news service of the Associated Press in Oregon, including the establishment of the Oregon state relay. The day state wire was opened five years ago, and the night state wire three years ago.

**CHICAGO CREATES "RACKET COURT"**

CHICAGO, Jan. 5.—A "racket court" designed particularly to apply justice to the racketeer, has been created by Chief Justice Harry Olson of the municipal court, and will function for the first time Monday.

Judge Daniel P. Trude will provide. By an arrangement with the United States district attorney the court will handle minor prohibition law violations and 19 other types of cases that fall in the catalogue of "rackets."

Among the cases that will be heard in this court are: Property destruction by explosion; obtaining money by holding employment suffer collecting payment as penalty; conspiracy to do an illegal act (boycott and black list); trust or combination to fix price of, or limit quantity of any article; malicious mischief to houses; intimidation and kidnapping for ransom.

**ESCAPED ELECTRIC CHAIR 11 TIMES; DIES NATURALLY**

PITTSBURGH, Jan. 5.—Joseph Valotta, slayer of two Pittsburgh policemen, and who escaped the electric chair eleven times, died of pneumonia today in Western penitentiary here. Valotta, after gaining eleven reprieves, and carrying his case to the United States supreme court, finally was given a commuted sentence of life imprisonment by the state pardon board.

Convicted of shooting to death Patroumen Edward Conch and Thomas Hopkins here October 2, 1922, Valotta was sentenced to die in the electric chair June 28, 1923.

**LIGHT RAY DEVICE IS AUTOMATIC TAB KEEPER**

WASHINGTON, Jan. 5.—A device perfected at the bureau of standards to record by means of an interrupted beam of light the exact number of visitors who will inspect the American government exhibits to be installed at the Spanish world fair at Seville next summer.

The automatic counter will be placed at a point where those who enter the American exhibit will pass in single file. A tiny beam of light shining across the aisle will be interrupted successively as the visitors pass and the number of interruptions will be automatically counted by the electrical attachments.
