GLENDALE WILL BE GIVEN CELLS FROM OLD JAIL

One of the first orders to be signed by the new county court was one that gives the city of Glendale the steel cells from the old county jail. The order ratifies the unofficial action of the late court that promised the cells to the city providing the new court, which will have charge of their distribution, would agree. The city will receive the cells as a gift from the county.

Glendale is preparing to build a new \$10,000 city hall to replace the one recently destroyed by fire. Commissioner Clough pointed out that Douglas county had given help in all disasters of the past, even in foreign lands, but that when Glendale suffered its recent loss, which was as heavy per capita as those which the county gave its share in relief when appeals were made, Glendale did not ask nor receive help from the county. He stated that he thought Glendale's request for these steel cells should be met with immediate favorable action on the part of the county, giving them this small assistance even at such a late date.

The cells are now housed in a temporary wooden structure, and will be discarded as soon as the new jail on top of the court house is completed. Glendale will then be allowed to move them and use them in providing a city jail. The cells are well arranged for such a purpose, although they are too small for county use.

ter being assisted to the home. Mr. Hercher was born October 2, 1869, at St. Louis, Missouri. He spent his early life in that locality, and was married May 14, 1891, at Desoto, Missouri, to Miss Jessie Davis, of that city. They lived there until 1902, when they moved to Pine Bluff, Arkansas, where Mr. Hercher was employed in the car department of the Cotton Belt railroad.

In 1903 the family moved to Brockway and later to Dillard, Mr. Hercher engaging very successfully in farming.

Served in Legislature. He was a man who was connected with many public affairs and organizations. He was of the executive and progressive type, and was very interested in the advancement of the county. He served in the Oregon legislature as a representative from Douglas county, in the session of 1925, and was instrumental in securing some badly needed legislation.

He was one of the organizers and officers of the Farm Bureau, was president for one term of the Douglas County Taxpayers' league and was an officer in the Federal Farm Loan association for many years.

He was a candidate at the last election for the office of county judge, being defeated by a narrow margin in the political contest.

He was intensely interested in religious work, and was a member of the Methodist church for more than twenty years. Most of that time he had served in an active capacity as a church worker and a superintendent of the Bible school. A few years ago he was ordained as a local minister.

Fraternally he was an active member of the Roseburg Masonic order, the I. O. O. F. lodge and the Modern Woodmen of America. He was also a member of Evergreen grange.

He leaves a widow, three sons, Lawrence and Walter, of Dillard and Chester of Portland, and two daughters, Mrs. Herbert Williams of Roseburg and Mrs. Kenneth LaViolette of King Hill, Idaho. A son, Harry, died in 1923 while visiting with relatives in Kansas. A brother, Jacob Hercher, resides at Barnhart, Missouri.

Mr. Hercher was a man who was vitally interested in county welfare and was willing at all times to give of his personal service in anything that might be for the public good. He was of the highest type of character and in his death the county has lost a valued citizen.

Funeral services will be held Tuesday afternoon at 1:30 o'clock at the Dillard church. Rev. F. F. Allen, pastor at Dillard, will officiate. Interment will take place in the Civil Bend cemetery. Arrangements are in charge of M. E. Ritter of the Roseburg Undertaking company.

QUESTION MARK ON 7TH DAY OF EPOCHAL FLIGHT

on refueling in the air. His description of his contacts with the Question Mark follows:

"Despite our heavy loads of gas and the weight of three men, our ship hops off like a pursuit plane. We climb to the altitude of the Question Mark and then throttle down and fly along side of it on the left side to get its course and speed.

"I pick a landmark ahead for a straight course and maintain it. The Question Mark dips beneath us and is lost to sight from me, although it is within 20 feet of our plane. Sometimes it comes as close as ten feet and then I can see its tail.

"Lieutenants Woodring and Strickland lower the hose from the fuselage and Major Spatz fits it into the funnel and the refueling proceeds at 75 gallons a minute. All I do is fly a straight course. My only signals come from Woodring by a rope attached to my arm. One long pull means 'slow up'; two pulls, 'speed up.' A constant jiggle means the refueling is over. As soon as the Question Mark is through refueling, she glides along to the left and then I land.

Two Methods Recited

"Refueling is a practical achievement now for commercial aviation. We have had no trouble with the contacts. I have made nine contacts in the last 24 hours for an average of nine minutes each, making 81 minutes actual contact in 24 hours.

"The only difference between flying in formation and making contacts is that we can see each other in formation while in contact the pilot cannot see the plane beneath him. This may cause anxiety, but the answer is confidence between the two pilots. All we have to do is to watch our speeds and altitudes and maintain a straight course. When we hit an upward current, both ships move in unison and there is no change in the planes' positions.

"I get into contact a little nose heavy when the fuel has been delivered, thereby lessening the load on my plane. When the contact is completed, Major Spatz waves 'OK' signal to Woodring who climbs off the gas valve and the Question Mark flies away.

"Last night was the first time I broke contact. I had picked a mark in Hollywood as a course and was flying directly toward it. We got so close I could see Grey cliffs and when I could about count the pebbles I nosed up. I knew Capt. Eaker was wing the refuel line and I was the only one watching ahead. Capt. Eaker of the Question Mark keeps his eyes on my landing gear during the contact to prevent the planes from coming together. We separated and got away all right.

"Simple Matter" "The delivery of oil in five gallon containers and food and supplies is a simple matter. Woodring lowers the package on a rope and it drops into the cockpit and into Major Spatz' arms.

"We have demonstrated the practical aspect of simple refueling in air and it will enable commercial aviation companies to increase their pay loads."

Lieutenant I. A. Woodring describing the refueling said: "I let out a reel of coiled four-inch hose closely. It strikes the wind of the Question Mark and glides down into Major Spatz' arms. As soon as he grabs it he signals and we turn on the gas. He signals when he has sufficient gas and we turn it off and he is gone."

IMMUNITY GRANTED TO TESTIFY AGAINST KEYES

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 7.—On motion of Deputy District Attorney Robert Stewart, the indictment against Jacob Berman, "bright boy" of the defunct Julian corporation, charging bribery and conspiracy, was dismissed by Superior Judge Edwin I. Butler today. Stewart said that Berman had agreed to turn state's evidence against former District Attorney Ana Keyes and five other codefendants.

SCHEDULE FOR GARDINER FERRY IS PRESENTED

A schedule for the operation of the ferry service between Reedport and Gardiner has been presented by the Gardiner Chamber of Commerce to the county court. The increased traffic between the two points has increased to such an extent that additional service has been made necessary. The recent budget adopted by the county calls for an additional appropriation to provide for this service, and a schedule has been worked out which is believed to be satisfactory.

The proposed schedule of trips and charges is as follows. Leaving Gardiner:

7 a. m.—Passengers free, cars 50 cents.

9 a. m.—Passengers 15 cents, cars 50 cents.

12:45 p. m.—Passengers 15 cents, cars 50 cents.

4 p. m.—Passengers free, cars 50 cents.

Leaving Reedport:

8 a. m.—Passengers free, cars 50 cents.

11 a. m.—Passengers 15 cents, cars 50 cents.

2:15 p. m.—Passengers 15 cents, cars 50 cents.

5 p. m.—Passengers free, cars 50 cents.

In each case a car fee would include the driver. The fees are arranged so that people traveling between two points in the business hours would not be subject to fees. Special trips made aside from regular schedule would be made at a rate of \$1.50 per car, which would include passengers. The night trips would be charged according to conditions. It is believed that on this basis the ferry could be maintained at a cost of \$175 per month to the county.

When the Scottsburg bridge is completed it is proposed to use the money now appropriated for that service, to give a free ferry between Reedport and Gardiner.

SEEKERS OF LOST BOY BATTLE WITH APACHE INDIANS

DOUGLAS, Ariz., Jan. 7.—Echoes of old Indian warfare days were resounding here today as the expedition which left Agua Prieta last Thursday to hunt down and wipe out a band of Apaches was believed to be in the fastness of the Sierra Madre mountains.

A pitched battle was expected sometime early today and several men here were being picked to augment the punitive force if a runner returns with word that reinforcements are needed. These include Sam Rayburn, an old Indian trapper who trailed the same band of Apaches when it raided the Diamond A ranch in 1922.

The expedition into the mountains is headed by Francisco Fimbres, whose child was snatched from his dying mother's arms when the Fimbres family was ambushed by the Apaches in October, 1924, on a trail south of Naco.

Fimbres and a small daughter were several hundred yards behind when the attack occurred, and were unhurt. The expedition set out with the purpose of ridding the mountain region of the marauding band of Apaches, and it is hoped that the Fimbres boy will be found alive when the two forces meet. The pursuit party went as far as Colonia Morales by truck. From this point they planned to traverse the whole mountainous region on horseback until they reached their objective and then dismount and go the remainder of the distance on foot.

MRS. L. PITTMAN, 25 YEARS IN CITY, PASSES SUNDAY

Mrs. Lurena Pittman passed away at her home on Brown Avenue, West Roseburg yesterday morning, after a long illness, at the age of 80 years. She was born in Iowa March 5, 1848, and had been a resident of Roseburg for 25 years. William Pittman, Adelle Chamber and Dora Robinson all of North Platte, Neb.; Charles Pittman, Lead, S. D.; Mrs. Mazie Ross, Glendale, Calif.; and Mrs. Berrie Royer, Dillard, Ore. She also leaves 22 grandchildren and 5 great grandchildren. Mrs. Pittman was a member of the Bible Standard church and funeral services were held in the chapel of the Douglas Funeral Home this morning at 10 o'clock. Rev. Crook officiating. MURDER IN FIRST DEGREE CHARGED TO LANZA BRYANT

CORVALLIS, Ore., Jan. 7.—Lanza Bryant was indicted today by the Benton county grand jury on charges of first degree murder in connection with the death of Lewis "Big" Dickerson, Oregon State college student and assistant football coach. Bryant was charged with stabbing Dickerson in a fight here the night of Dec. 17. Dickerson was escorting a young girl to her home when he was attacked by Bryant, who was an admirer of the girl.

Circuit Judge Skipworth set time for arraignment this afternoon, when Bryant will enter his plea.

The trial of Bryant is expected to start in about three days. District Attorney Fred McHenry will be assisted by Deputy Arthur Clarke. Bryant will be defended by Mark Weatherford, of Albany and George W. Inman, of Corvallis. Miss Mae Troxell, waitress, who was being escorted home when Bryant attacked Dickerson, has been in seclusion much of the time since the affair. She is expected to be a witness at the trial.
