**MIAMI DEDICATES NEW CITY AIRPORT**

MIAMI, Fla., Jan. 7.—Miami took to the air today to dedicate a new municipal airport. Here for the occasion were some 150 civilian and military planes, while at Lakehurst, N. J., the giant navy dirigible Los Angeles was being groomed for a cruise during the event.  
Many notables of the aeronautical world were gathering for the official dedication exercises today which will be followed by a gala arena of aerial events.  
William P. McCrackon, Jr., assistant secretary of commerce, aeronautics division, was awarded the honor of dedicating the port.  
Among the distinguished visitors expected are Harry S. New, postmaster general, Amelia Earhart, Lady Mary Heath, Lieut. Lester Matland, San Francisco-Hawaii flier, W. Irving Glover, second assistant postmaster general and Colonel John A. Hamblinton, vice-president of Pan American Airways, Inc.

**DEATH PUTS ITALIAN CARDINALS IN MINORITY**

ROME, Jan. 8.—An unprecedented situation in the sacred college was created today by the death of Cardinal Tosi, archbishop of Milan.  
For the first time since the so-called Babylonian captivity (when the popes lived at Avignon in the 14th century) the Italian cardinals are in the minority of four.  
There are now 29 Italian cardinals, 33 others and 8 vacancies.  
This makes it practically certain that the pope will bestow several red hats at the spring consistory.  
Cardinal Tosi at that time was apparently in good health. He was stricken shortly after his return to his diocese.  
The cardinal was 67 years old and succeeded the present pope as archbishop of Milan.

**YOUNG SWAINS RUN AFOUL BOY SCOUT JUSTICE**  
Rivals Held Off by Heavy Bombardment—Applies Used for Ammunition—Scout Law is Invoked.  
Boy Scout law may not be recognized as legal, but it certainly is thorough, particularly when administered by E. A. Britton, scout executive for Coos and Douglas counties.  
It seems that one day last week a couple of junior high school boys, also members of the Boy Scouts, went to call upon their lady friends at a local apartment house. The young ladies and other young "gentlemen" friends, who, landing the territory invaded, proceeded to institute a siren of catcalls and booms. **GOVERNMENT TAKES 12 PCT. NATIONAL INCOME**  
NEW YORK, Jan. 8.—The cost of government is known. Taxes collected by federal, state and local agencies in the last fiscal year amounted to \$9,179,000. The national industrial conference board finds this was nearly 12 per cent of the national income, the highest amount ever collected in any one country in any year in the world's history.  
The governments of the 48 states collected \$1,758,381,000 in 1927 and spent \$1,726,389,916.

**WITCHCRAFT CASE KILLERS INDICTED ON MURDER CHARGE**  
YORK, Pa., Jan. 7.—Three bills against all three of the principals in York county's witchcraft case were returned by the grand jury today.  
The jury heard only two witnesses, Coroner L. U. Zoch and Dr. R. L. Ellis, coroner's physician. Two counts were included in each indictment, murder and manslaughter.  
All three defendants, John M. Blymyer, W. B. O. Hess and John Curry were indicted to hear the bills read. The bills charged them with killing Nelson D. Rehmyer, 69-year-old reclusive farmer with "malice afore-thought."  
Blymyer then pleaded not guilty. The other two defendants entered the same plea.  
They were charged with killing Rehmyer on November 27. They went to Rehmyer's home, in a sparsely settled section of the country, with the ostensible purpose of obtaining a lock of his hair to break a "spell" he was believed to have cast over the Hess family. They choked him to death, it is charged, when he resisted their efforts to get the hair.

**NORTH CALIFORNIA R. R. EXTENSION IS OPPOSED**  
(Associated Press Linked Wire)  
WASHINGTON, Jan. 8.—Disapproval of the Northern California Railroad company's projected line construction in Plumas and Lassen counties, California, was recommended to the interstate commerce commission today by C. P. Howard, examiner assigned to investigate the plan.  
The Northern California Railroad company, a proposed connector line with the Western Pacific, asked permission to build 21 miles of track from Crescent Mills to Westwood.  
The Western Pacific planned route arrangements whereby the new line would open new routes to the east and south over the Western Pacific's system.  
Howard's report pointed out that the Southern Pacific already serves the area the new line would reach.  
The commission will hold further hearings before disposing of the case.

ROME—(A. P.)—In line with Premier Mussolini's campaign for a higher Italian birthrate, doctors and nurses found guilty of illegal practices have been given long jail sentences or terms in exile to Mediterranean islands. Now it is forbidden for lawyers, members of the Fascist party, to defend any persons accused of accomplishing or abetting such practices.  
SOFIA—(A. P.)—Bulgaria has achieved the distinction of being the only country in Europe without beggars. The house of representatives passed a law declaring mendicancy illegal, and the police arrested 10,000 beggars within a week. Mendicancy increased rapidly after the war, when demobilized troops could find no employment. The government is making use of empty barracks for the purpose of teaching the beggars how to earn a living.  
PARIS—(A. P.)—The Paris poor, those who live in benevolent institutions at the expense of the state, drink 2,339,000 litres, over 700,000 gallons of beer a year.  
Such are the figures which two great breweries of Paris have undertaken by contract to supply to the Public Assistance institutions during the year 1928.  
The beer costs a little less than 3 cents a quart.  
SEMIPALATINSK, Kazakhstan.—(A. P.)—The soviet government has declared war on illiteracy in all republics of the Russian union. A strong body of young communist teachers and propagandists were recently sent here to teach the inhabitants communism and civilized ways of life.  
Fifty primary schools have been opened and several public bath houses established. There are courses of instruction involving the use of soap, wash stands, towels, plates, knives and forks.  
During the last few years, said speakers at a recent woman's conference, 2,500,000 had been taught their ABC's, but there were still 30,000,000 women to whom the alphabet was a complete mystery.

## Our Ability to Stand Exposure Very Varied

By DR. MORRIS FISHER, Editor Journal of the American Medical Association and of Hygiene, the Health Magazine.

Primitive man in tropical countries uses clothes primarily for display. He is not concerned with keeping himself warm. He does not have to protect himself against the elements, and he soon becomes accustomed to the bites of insects, stand exposure. The swimmers of the English Channel spend 21 hours in the cold sea protected only by a wool bathing suit and a coat of grease, but they are continuously moving.

A man who works at a desk in New York or Chicago may wear a thick woolen shirt, a woolen and lined waistcoat, a tweed suit and

woolen-lined motor coat. Riding home in his motor car he covers himself with a robe and complains of the cold.

**Degree of Exposure.**  
Woman's dress has changed greatly in recent years and has given much concern to the physiologists. Prof. Leonard Hill, the noted London physiologist, points out that a civilized man, when naked and quiet, finds exposure to still air at 55 to 58 degrees F. not unappealingly warm, 75 to 85 pleasant, 60 cold, and 40 to 50 very cold. For sedentary occupations he wants the atmosphere under his clothes to be 95, and only about 20

percent of the body's surface is exposed to the air. On the other hand, people used to being outdoors can stand much colder temperatures.

Children are sometimes dressed in this garments with bare knees; in foreign districts not infrequently they wear as many as 14 different garments, some of these sewed on for the winter.

Many Overclothed. In the majority of cases children are being overclothed, and as a result do not develop any resistance to exposure. Insufficient clothing for the child, however, may lead to exposure with numerous illnesses during infancy.

Perhaps the question will never be settled until human beings have standardized clothing as they now standardize most other affairs in human life.
