

TOD MORGAN GIVES FIVE POUNDS AND LOSES TO ED MACK

Tuffy Griffiths to Battle Leo Lomski—"Buzzaas" Burnell Wins Hot Semi-Final.

DENVER, Colo., Jan. 8.—Eddie Mack of Denver, Rocky mountain lightweight champion, mauled and slashed his way to a decision over Tod Morgan, Seattle, world's junior lightweight champion, in a vicious ten-round bout here last night.

Starting slowly, Mack unleashed a blazing attack in the last three rounds that kept 7,000 customers on their feet and had the champion bloody and groggy at the final bell. The title was not a stake, Mack weighing in at 134 pounds, five more than Morgan. Mack brought the claret to the champion's face with a torrid smash to the nose in the second round, and kept pecking away at that member throughout the rest of the fight.

Griffiths K. O. s Gemaz
CHICAGO, Jan. 8.—Tuffy Griffiths, Sioux City boxer who climbed to the bantamweight ranks to be a light heavyweight contender in two years, has successfully invaded the heavyweight class.

Making his debut with the heavyweights, Tuffy, who won 55 bouts as a light heavyweight before being stopped by J. J. Braddock, knocked out George Gemaz of Philadelphia last night in the second round of their 10-round bout. It was Tuffy's first Chicago appearance since his sensational string of victories was stopped by Braddock in New York in November.

Griffiths, who was substituted for Les Marriner, when the former University of Illinois football player injured his hand, floored the wild swinging Quaker City boy ten times before Gemaz took the count.

The fight was Griffiths' last until he meets Leo Lomski in Detroit February 8.

Sergeant Baker Wins
PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 2.—Sergeant Sammy Baker punched his way to a ten round decision here last night over Primo McGale, Panama negro fighter. Baker, hitting straight out with tremendous thumps or hooking short-arm pots to the jaw or body, displayed a crunching punch and gave no indication that his fighting days were fading. McGale was best on the defensive and a hard man to hit. Baker weighed 148, McGale 149.

The evening thriller, however, was the six-round semi-final between Frankie (Buzzaas) Burnell of Atlanta and Red Hays of Salem. It was every bit the exciting match that had been predicted. Burnell took the decision on his early showing with Hays coming back strong in the latter rounds. Burnell weighed 148, Hays 151. Eddie Cartwright and Lou Sauer fought a six-round draw. Lex Johnson took a four-round decision over Frankie Monroe and Domingo Cris. easily outclassed Johnny Snell in the curtain raiser. Just before the main event, the crowd stood bareheaded while the bell was tolled ten times in memory of Tex Rickard.

CITY'S FORMER POWER COMPANY LOSES TAX APPEAL

WASHINGTON, Jan. 8.—If a corporation official misappropriates its funds and the loss is not discovered until some time later, the failure to discover the fact prevents deduction of a bad note given by the official to square the account when the corporation makes out its income tax return. That is the hard luck case of the Douglas County Light & Power company of Roseburg, absorbed a few years ago by the California-Oregon Power company, according to decision of the United States board of tax appeals, handed down today.

In this case A. Welch was president of the power company up to 1915. In the following year it was discovered that some of the bonds were missing.

In 1921 Welch gave a note for \$10,000 to cover the bonds. The next year he became a bankrupt and the note worthless. This loss could have been deducted in computing tax the year it occurred, says the decision, but the time of discovery has no bearing and it cannot be claimed afterward.

On another claim, where the commissioner of internal revenue attempted to impose taxes amounting to over \$14,000 because of alleged profit on redemption of its own bonds for a sum less than its

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received, the board sustains the company's contention that this difference between sale and redemption prices is not taxable income. The company's high depreciation account, which was also under attack, is held fair and reasonable.

22 MILLION SPENT DURING 1928 BY OREGON SCHOOLS

SALEM, Ore., Jan. 9.—For the fiscal year ending June 15 last, the public schools of Oregon expended \$22,000,000, says the biennial report of C. A. Howard, state superintendent of schools. The enrollment of pupils in the schools totals about 187,000 and about 8,000 teachers are employed. Clerks and school board members in the state number 9,624.

In buildings, grounds and equipment the schools represent an investment of \$40,000,000, says the report.

GROCERS OF SEVEN OREGON COUNTIES IN 125-LINK CHAIN

SALEM, Ore., Jan. 9.—Total resources of about \$1,500,000 are represented in the merger yesterday of 125 retail grocery stores of the Willamette valley, which will be known as the United Purity stores. The operations of the chain are in Marion, Linn, Polk, Yamhill, Tillamook, Lincoln and Benton counties. The merger was brought about by the Willamette Grocery company, Theodore Roth, president, said that the chain will be allied for buying purposes with 450 stores in Washington.

HOOVERS WILL NOT ATTEND ANY BALL AT INAUGURAL

WASHINGTON, Jan. 8.—One phase of the speculation that was swirling about the return of Herbert Hoover was definitely quashed today when he gave his approval to the March 4 inauguration plans of a simple nature. Beyond the official ceremony of path-taking at the capitol the program calls for a parade chiefly of military units. The inaugural ball of other days will be omitted. A statement issued says: "In conformity with the president-elect's wishes there will be no inaugural ball and he will not attend any other ball on March 4. No objection was made to a charitable ball that evening such as was held on the induction of President Coolidge, but Mr. Hoover has made it clear that he and Mrs. Hoover will not attend."

BRONX ZOO RECEIVES ONLY CORILLA IN U. S.

NEW YORK, Jan. 9.—The Bronx zoo this spring will place on exhibition the only gorilla in a zoological garden in this country. The gorilla, 14 months old and weighing twenty-one pounds is the gift of Dr. W. Reginald Wheeler of the Presbyterian board of missions, who rescued him from ill-treatment by natives in Belgian Congo. The animal is now in a hospital suffering from scurvy and malnutrition.

BULGARIAN KING TO WED ITALIAN PRINCESS, RUMOR

SOFIA, Bulgaria, Jan. 8.—Rumors that King Boris will marry Princess Giovanna of Italy have been received in Sofia and it is now thought possible that the engagement may be announced formally soon after Jan. 20, the 55th birthday of the king.

In this event it is believed that the marriage and subsequent coronation would be held some time during the celebration of the 50th anniversary of the liberation of Bulgaria from Turkish rule and the 100th anniversary of the reign of the ancient Bulgarian monarch, Simeon the Great, which will take place this year.

HOME POINTERS

(From School of Home Economics)
The proportion for a very soft custard is three to four eggs to one quart of milk; for a firmer custard, four to six eggs to one quart of milk. Two eggs to one cup of milk will make a custard that will unroll, while three eggs to one cup of milk makes a very firm custard. When using yolks alone three to four yolks to one cup of milk makes a firm custard. One tablespoon cornstarch may be used for each egg omitted.

The standard proportion for a soufflé is one cup of thick white sauce, three eggs, yolks and whites separated, and three-fourths of a cup of finely chopped meat, fish, cheese or vegetables.

When cooking navy beans in hard water it is best to add one-fourth to one-third teaspoon soda to each quart of beans.

Tough cuts of meat are best cooked in moist heat for a long time to soften the connective tissue and tender cuts may be cooked quickly with dry heat.

The most common methods of cooking tough cuts are braising, pot-roasting, stewing and fricassée. Methods of cooking tender cuts are broiling, roasting and frying.

Washing spinach in warm water the first time loosens up much of the sand and dirt.

Cake may be kept fresh when only a small amount is eaten at a time by cutting the desired number of slices from the center of the cake. Push the two remaining pieces close together like a whole cake, and this will keep it moist and soft for several days.

One may avoid scraping carrots by scrubbing them and then boiling. When tender, rinse in cold water and the skins will rub off as easily as the skins of beets.

FOUR OF BIRGER GANG OF KILLERS GET LIFE TERMS

MARION, Ill., Jan. 8.—Four members of the Charlie Birger gang of southern Illinois gunmen were sentenced to life imprisonment this afternoon, by Circuit Judge D. T. Hartwell, for the slaying of Mrs. Thel Price, who with her husband, State Highway Patrolman Loty L. Price, was kidnapped and slain two years ago. The four are: Art Newman,

chief lieutenant for Birger; Leslie Simpson, Freddie Wooten and Riley Stinson.

In addition to the life sentences, each was sentenced to serve 57 years in prison for conspiracy to murder Mrs. Price and 57 years in prison for conspiracy to murder her husband. Under these sentences none of the four will be eligible for parole for fifty-eight years.
