REVENUE FROM OAKLAND AIRPORT SHOWING BIG GAIN

OAKLAND, Calif., Jan. 10.—Gross revenue accruing to the city for the operation of the Oakland municipal airport during the month of December was almost 10 times greater than the amount received for the same period in 1927, according to the monthly operations report of the board of port commissioners.

The gross revenue for the month just ended totaled \$4,571.30, while the operations revenue for December, 1927, was \$455.

This month's revenue also represents a new record, the greatest amount previously received being \$4,004.18 in October, 1928.

New commercial operators at the airport and a greater number of visiting planes are responsible for the increased revenue, it was said.

Passengers and students carried at the airport tripled in number during December, as compared with the same month of 1927. During the month just ended, 2203 passengers were carried and 428 student flights were made. During December of 1927, 790 passengers and students were carried.

Plane landings recorded at the airport in December totaled 3961, while the figure for December, 1927, was 2056.

During the year 1928, 65,432 plane landings were recorded at Oakland municipal airport, 49,691 passengers were carried, 8297 student flights were made and the gross revenue totaled \$39,794.34.

Transient plane landings at the airport during the year totaled 3443. Passengers carried in transient planes totaled 4712.

An unconditional gift of \$10,000 cash for the Oregon State college is such a rare but pleasurable event that a special committee is at work to determine the way to use the money to insure the best and most lasting benefits. This committee is composed of James T. Jardine, director of the experimental station, and Dean George W. Peavy, dean of forestry.

Though the gift was made unconditionally by Mrs. Mary J. L. McDonald of San Francisco, the donor's chief interest is in forestry, hence the fund will probably be used in some project in connection with that industry. Suggestions may be placed there soon. The fund will be used for purchase of an experimental forestry plot or that it be invested with the income devoted to providing scholarships for students making a special study of reforestation. The committee will make its recommendations to the board of regents.

No casualties among workmen endeavoring to prevent a third well from becoming ignited had been reported. The steel derrick above the third well, Getty Number 2, which is near blazing Number 20, late yesterday melted in the heat and crashed to the ground, cutting an engine house in two. This well and five others were in danger of being fired and lost in smoke, but two of the latter had been partially consumed and the flow of the others shut off.

A definite plan to conquer the flames had not been decided on early today. R. A. Sperry, general manager of the General Petroleum company, said it will be several days before workmen can clear away debris sufficiently to permit active combat of the flames.

TATE HOUSE OF OREGON FIRE TRAP, REPORT DECLARES

SALEM, Ore., Jan. 10.—Should the Oregon state house catch on fire there would be grave danger of loss of lives, says a report made to the state board of architects which recently inspected the building at the request of Secretary of State Hal E. Hosie.

"The building as a whole is antiquated in construction," says the report. "It is nothing more than a frame structure encased within a brick wall. Every precaution should be taken against fire, as a very serious loss of life and records would be suffered should the fire be started."

ARCHBISHOP LEES DIES

MELBOURNE, Australia, Jan. 10.—The most Rev. Harrington Clare Lees, anglican archbishop of Melbourne, dropped dead today. He was 58 years old.
