distance of 11,500 miles. Speed and distance were no issue of the flight which lasted nearly 7 days, but army observers predicted that success of refueling the plane and the remarkable demonstration of endurance of men and machine had brought closer the day of non-stop flights around the world.

Dirigible Pierces Fog PORT ST. JOE, Fla., Jan. 10.—The navy dirigible, Los Angeles, which groped about in a heavy fog over western Florida last night, poked its nose through the clouds over St. Joseph's Bay today and proceeded toward the tender Patoka, anchored a half mile off shore to moor.

Virtually every one of the inhabitants of this tiny Gulf coast town rushed into the streets to greet the dirigible. Many persons from surrounding towns also were here.

A light rain stopped and the sun was attempting to peep through a heavy fog bank.

The captain of the tender said he believed the dirigible would cruise about the bay for an hour or more until the weather improved.

Disaster Evidence OSLO, Norway, Jan. 10.—It was stated today that wreckage found on the Flomarken coast marked "Latham-Paris" was not a fire-bomb but two tubelike parts fastened together. It was understood the wreckage was found on the western side of North ape on New Year's day.

Ronald Amundsen and five companions were flying toward Spitzbergen in a French Latham seaplane in June when they disappeared. Since the end of August various pieces of wreckage have been picked up at sea off the coast of Norway and one was positively identified as having been a float on the Amundsen plane. It was generally believed that this indicated that the craft had broken up and that all members of the party were dead.

Widow Makes Denial DETROIT, Jan. 10.—Denying any knowledge of a plan to slay her estranged husband before he could divorce her, Mrs. Grace M. Wood, 35, charged today that the husband, Ralph A. Wood, wealthy builder and contractor, was trying to "frame" her. Wood's death was said to have been the object of a surprise attack by gunmen at his office in Wyandotte, a suburb, last night.

From information gathered today by police and prosecutors it was learned that Wood had carried \$100,000 insurance which he allowed to lapse recently. Mrs. Wood, the officer said, has since paid the premiums.

KEYES' EX-AIDE OUTLINES BRIBE CASE TO JURORS

Berman, has agreed to testify for the state. He will testify, it is claimed, to the alleged payment of a \$125,000 bribe to Keyes.

Case is Astounding LOS ANGELES, Jan. 10.—Two weeks after stepping from office, District Attorney Ama Keyes, a figure in Los Angeles political circles for a quarter of a century, is on trial charged with one of the most astounding bribery plots in the city's history.

Keyes' name is identified with many sensational trials, including the Alvin Karpis-McArthur case and the murder trial of William E. Hickman for the slaying of 12-year-old Marian Parker.

The famous prosecutor sits in a familiar court while Baron Pitts, his elected successor and one-time aide in office, seeks to prove that Keyes accepted bribes to secure the acquittal of the notorious Julian Petroleum corporation promoters.

40,000 Swindled The history of that alleged oil swindle will be as much a part of the trial as the stocky prosecutor himself, for three of the men charged with a part in the swindle of more than 40,000 investors also

have been caught in a grand jury's charges of corruption.

Keyes, it was agreed, should be tried apart from the others. The defendants are Jacob Berman, known up and down Broadway as the "bright youngster" of the Julian case; the Rosenbergs, Ed and Jack, promoters; Charles Kerner, special investigator in Keyes' office; Ben and Dave Getzoff, father and son proprietors of an obscure Spring street tailor shop where the "pay-offs" were alleged to have been made during the Julian trial, and A. J. Lasker, former head of a defunct finance company.

The Lasker case, separate from the Julian trial, was an embezzlement action in which the grand jury accused Keyes of accepting a bribe to dismiss the charges.

The case against Keyes is all the more sensational in that it involves a man upon whose name scandal never had touched before in a long public career.

Keyes' prosecutor, once lieutenant governor of California, was elected after Keyes, a short time before the grand jury laid its cards on the table, announced his retirement.

The money involved in the alleged bribery was not large, the indictments disclosed. Officially it totaled \$38,200, but rumors sent it soaring to huge sums. A United States district attorney said Berman made \$3,000,000 off the Julian collapse.

The Tip-Off First evidence of a ripple in the smooth workings of Keyes' office came when an employee of the tailor shop, Milton Pike, angered at the Getzoffs for alleged salary differences, brought a little diary to a county official.

It recited the frequent meetings of Keyes and various defendants in Getzoff's shop. Pike said he and other employees overheard "interesting" conversations in the partitioned office. A three-shed mirror facing the office reflected the actions of the occupants and Pike said he saw large sums of money exchanged. Subsequently, others related alleged surreptitious deals in Keyes' office centering about the Lasker and Julian cases.

JUST PLAIN BULL RUN FOR LEGISLATORS OF OREGON

Secretary of State Hoss said today that he had arranged for the shipment of 20 gallons to Salem each day, the arrangement to continue through the session unless Salem water improves to a satisfactory degree. Containers will be placed in the senate chamber and the hall of representatives and in the restaurant in the basement of the state house.

TIP-OFF FOILS PLOT TO SLAY MANUFACTURER

him to an isolated spot to be killed, and leave the body with narcotics stuffed in his pockets so police, when they found it, might think Wood had been killed as the result of a dope feed.

Police of Detroit, Riverview and Wyandotte, deputy sheriffs, state police and newspapermen surrounded the isolated frame structure which houses the construction company offices late yesterday afternoon to await the coming of the conspirators.

Bullets Fly At 10 o'clock two men crept through the heavy shrubbery in front of the office building. One, Haggerty, hid behind an ornamental urn beside the office door. The other was Holt, who in accordance with the plot, stepped to the door and called Wood.

As Wood stepped onto the porch the concealed man leaped toward him with a lit fuse. At the same instant Wood, who has but one arm, fired. Haggerty fell dead. As the shot sounded a car, occupied by two men, drove to the walk leading to the office and its occupants opened fire upon the group on the porch.

Immediately a fusillade of shots burst from the shadowy shrubbery and the car, with windshield shattered, sped away.

Mrs. Wood was in bed when state police entered her home. She said she was ill with influenza but she was almost completely dazed and the officers took her to the hospital for examination.

Physicians there permitted her to be taken to police headquarters for questioning.

Domestic Triangle The involved chain of motives assigned by police to Mrs. Wood was tangled even more as details of the Woods' domestic difficulties came to light. Wood had filed suit for divorce but Tuesday ordered the suit withdrawn.

Police said he had settled \$20,000 cash, two large houses and 12 other pieces of city property on Mrs. Wood pending outcome of the divorce action. She was reported to have demanded more.

Thompson and Pierce, told assistant prosecutors that they did not know how much they were to get for the "job."

When the plot was first formed, they said it was decided merely to plug Wood and carry him to the country and then rob the office safe, in which they were assured a large sum of money lay. The plan was kept. They were to divide. The continuation of the safe, they were told, was known by Holt.

Pierce said Haggerty introduced him to Mrs. Wood and invited him to join in the plot. He was told, that Mrs. Wood wanted some valuable papers from her husband's safe and that they were to get the cash. He said he did not know that Wood was to have been killed as part of the plot.

Thompson's statement was much like Pierce's.

COPIED WORKS OF ART LEAD TO SUIT FOR BIG DAMAGES

(Associated Press Leased Wire) ROME, Jan. 10.—Trial on a suit for 1,250,000 lire (about \$63,875) filed by Alceio Dossena, a sculptor who reproduced classic masterpieces, against two antique dealers was postponed today until January 25.

Dossena reproduced works of Donatello, Pisano and other masters so truthfully that they were regarded as genuine by various experts. In filing suit, Dossena contended that he had made the reproductions in the belief that they were to be marketed as copies but recently learned that they had been sold as originals, some of them to museums in Germany, New York, Boston and Cleveland.

He also claimed that although some of his statues had been sold

at fabulous prices, he himself had actually lost on his work.

FIRST CIVILIZATION OF WEST IN PANAMA, BELIEF

(Associated Press Leased Wire) SAN PEDRO, Cal., Jan. 10.—Panama was described as the first of the western hemisphere's first civilization by Dr. Ernest Forbes, collector of Indian antiquities, who arrived here today aboard the Panama mail liner Colombia with six golden idols to support his claims.

These idols, whose metal value was placed in excess of \$2,000, were made about 10,000 B. C., Dr. Forbes estimates and were buried with tribal chiefs. The early inhabitants were remote worshippers, he said, and destined their idols after snakes, frogs and lizards. The six idols will be loaned to the M. H. De Young Museum in Golden Gate park, San Francisco where a number of his Indian relics are now on display.
