of a packing house at Roseburg would result in a great saving to the poultrymen. He stated that in a recent conference with the head of the poultry association, he had been assured that the organization was still ready to establish an egg packing plant in the city as soon as 100,000 producing hens are signed up with the association.

C. F. Stinson, of Portland, who has been visiting his parents at Garden Valley, made a very inspirational talk in a few moments of time, voicing a plea for harmony and the elimination of prejudice in Chamber of Commerce affairs. He paid a high tribute to Roseburg's climate and the city and county resources.

North Umpqua Road Stressed—Senator B. L. Eddy was the next speaker on the program and developed the importance of the North Umpqua road.

"I am sure you will all agree with me," he said, "that if the North Umpqua road could be secured without paying for it it would be a wonderful gift. But we are not going to get this road as a gift, we must work for it. A few years ago someone started the use of the phrase 'I am satisfied' as the meaning of the word 'Umpqua'. That is not the meaning of the word and I believe we made a great mistake in allowing it to be used, for a good many people have taken just that attitude. A satisfied citizen does not improve the city of which he is a resident. When we look around us we see that other communities are not satisfied. They want more mills, they want better roads, they want better buildings and more business, and because they are not satisfied they go out to get these things that want."

"I am sure that if we would study a map for just a little while, seriously viewing the Umpqua highway, in its relation to other roads and highways, that we would quickly realize its importance." Senator Eddy stressed the fact that highways are the most important factors in the development of a city or county's resources. At one time the cities were as striving for railroads, but it has been the fact in late years, since the advent of the automobile that highways are of greater importance than railroads. He stated that the Umpqua highway should not be looked upon as a merely local project, but should be considered, in its more important connection, that of forming a direct east and

# NEW YORK'S ACCIDENT TOLL GRAVE WARNING

Q.—What are the causes of gas in the stomach?  
A.—There are all sorts of causes for gas in the stomach, among the chief of which is the swallowing of air through hasty eating and gulping of food.

In New York state accidents occurring in industry are tabulated according to their causes and very careful record is kept of those which cause death or permanent disability.

For the year ending June 30, 1928, there were 1129 deaths from accidents in that state for which the sum of more than seven million dollars was paid in compensation.

There were 52 accidents with permanent total disability for which three-fourths of a million dollars was paid, and there were 17,021 cases with permanent partial disability for which more than thirteen million dollars was paid.

Almost 62 per cent of deaths were due to falls, vehicles and to hoisting and conveyance devices.

Paralysis and Blindness—The greater number of the 52

cases of permanent total disability were paralysis and loss of the use of the eyes. Here again falls were primarily responsible, with the handling of objects and explosions as second and third in the list.

So far as permanent partial disability is concerned, handling of objects is responsible for 23 per cent of all of the cases, with such secondary causes as machinery, falls and vehicles.

Few people appreciate the vast toll paid by the workers of the United States each year as a result of carelessness on the part of other workers, inefficient and insufficiently inspected machinery and similar causes.

Infection Not Included—The accidental group moreover does not include the terrible loss resulting from infection due to carelessness in treatment of small wounds. During the year ending June 30, 1928, there were 21,148 cases of injuries of the hands and fingers among workers in New York sufficiently serious to demand compensation by the employers.

In such instances the establishment of proper first-aid measures, including thorough cleansing and the prompt use of some safe antiseptic solution will greatly lessen the incubation of infection and shorten the duration of the disability.
