Farm News

State Market Agent's Letter (BY SEYMOUR JONES)
Growing, Grading and Packing

A pointer of great value for Oregon producers of fruits and other products is contained in the advice given to Indiana producers by the Purdue University Service, which says: "Instant shippers have been forced to grow, grade, standardize and pack a product that not only appeals to the taste but to the eye as well. The results often have been disastrous to the home grown producer. To meet this ever-increasing competition, Indiana growers must study the markets and grow, grade and pack their fruits and vegetables so that both package and contents are equal or superior to those of distant neighbors, if the fruit and vegetable industry is to remain profitable." Oregon growers must also "Grow, grade and pack" a first class product in an attractive form if they expect to hold a command of the market at home and abroad.

Poultry Cooperative Success
The Pacific Cooperative Poultry Producers of Portland report a prosperous year just closed and the Eggsaminer, the official organ of the organization, says that the signpost for 1929 will mean more hens under contract than last year, notwithstanding the withdrawal from the northern half of Clark county, Washington. At a recent meeting of the board of directors a 6 per cent dividend was declared and the surplus has been increased to nearly \$100,000. It may not be generally known that Oregon poultrymen receive an average of six cents a dozen more than the average throughout the country, but such is the U. S. department report, and that is said to be the result of marketing Oregon eggs largely through co-operatives.

For Strawberry Growers
A meeting of berry growers was held at the Gresham cannery Wednesday, January 2, at 1 o'clock, open to all strawberry growers, whether members of the association or not, and to all farmers who may want to plant this year. The further standardization of planting was taken up and discussed, also other matters of importance to berry growers. S. B. Hall, county agricultural agent, will conduct a planting and culture school, and the need of planting an acreage of strawberries this year will be made clear. It is said there is great necessity for proper selection of the plants to be set out in order to produce a profitable berry, and that matter was fully explained at this meeting.

The Profitable Pig
The pig that never stops growing rapidly from birth to market weight is usually the most profitable kind to send to market, says an authority. When fall pigs are about three weeks old they will require something to eat in addition to their mother's milk. An enclosure, usually called a creep, is a practical way to give pigs an opportunity to have and to learn to eat solid foods. In making a creep it is much better to have several openings in the enclosure through which the pigs can walk upright with freedom than to force them to crawl under a wire or board.

Wheat Situation Discouraging
The wheat market is decidedly discouraging to the holders of grain as the week opens. The news in the east is that supplies in wheat are the largest in a long time, while the speculative buying power seems sadly deficient, the worst feature being that there is no indication of a change for the better in the immediate future.

Potatoes in Klamath County
Klamath county is establishing a reputation for raising potatoes of good quality and heavy yield. It is said that 300 tons of potatoes will be shipped from Klamath Falls before the 1928 crop is disposed of.
