HOOVER GIVES NO PROMISE ON EXTRA SESSION

President-Elect Confers
With Visitors, But No
Plans Made Known.

POLITICS DISCUSSED

Slomp Thinks Virginia May
Elect G. O. P. Governor;
B. L. E. Names Man
for Cabinet.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 11.—President-elect Hoover continued today his crowded schedule of conferences with political leaders with a view to determining, if possible, before his departure for Florida next week, whether and when he would be obliged to call a special session of congress to consider farm legislation.

Recommendations for cabinet appointments continued to pour in on Mr. Hoover from his callers, who included Senator Gillett of Massachusetts, and Senator Phipps of Colorado.

With C. Bascom Slomp, a former republican representative from Virginia, Mr. Hoover discussed means of consolidating in that state the advantages gained by his party in the election. Mr. Slomp told the president-elect that with Virginia's swing to the republican column last November, the chances were excellent for the election of a republican governor this year.

After the conference, Mr. Slomp said that he himself was not seeking any presidential appointment. Senator Phipps said he had reviewed with the president-elect the legislative outlook in congress with special reference to the likelihood of a special session, and Senator Gillett, who intimated that appointments had been discussed with Mr. Hoover, declined to go into details.

B. L. E. Recommends
G. W. Laughlin, national legislative representative of the National Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers, submitted to Mr. Hoover the brotherhood's selection for appointment as secretary of labor in the next administration. Laughlin said after his conference that he did not feel at liberty to disclose the name submitted.

It has been known for some time, however, that friends of W. N. Doak, vice president of the Brotherhood of Railway Trainmen and a leading representative of organized labor here, have been urging his name upon the Hoover advisers.

F. C. Davila, resident commissioner for Porto Rico, also called upon the president-elect and told him of the enthusiasm in the island over his prospective visit. Mr. Hoover, he said, assured him that he will visit the West Indies if he has time to do so.

Farm Group Heard
The executive committee of the National Grange called on Mr. Hoover and discussed with him features of their legislative program. The committee, composed of Louis J. Taber, national master, Leslie R. Smith, secretary, of Boston, Mass., Eugene Eckert, chairman, of Mascoutah, Illinois, and Albert S. Goss, of Seattle, Washington, said after the conference that their organization still stood on its previous declaration that they would favor an extra session of congress if satisfactory and comprehensive measures for the relief of agriculture were not adopted at the present session.

Taber said that Mr. Hoover had always shown himself to be very sympathetic toward the rural problem and added that he was convinced that a satisfactory solution of the subject would be found within the next year.

The executive committee emphasized that they would deem a special session of congress necessary unless at this session of congress, as appeared very unlikely, legislation comprehensive enough to effect higher agricultural tariffs, change the existing land policy, and other aspects of the farm problem were adopted.

RICKARD ESTATE OVER ONE MILLION

OLD BADGER GAME FAILS IN PORTLAND

WESTERN OREGON STAGE LINES PASS INTO S. P. HANDS

EUGENE, Ore., Jan. 10.—A merger of all major bus operations in western Oregon under the control and management of the Southern Pacific railroad is said to be foreshadowed by the sale in the last week of large blocks of Oregon Stages voting stock in Eugene, Salem and Portland. That these deals will be followed by a request that the legislature pass laws establishing exclusive franchise regulations on the major highways is also indicated by the transaction in the Willamette valley which are said to be paralleled by plans of the Union Pacific to acquire all competing bus lines along the Columbia river and in Eastern Oregon.

**DRY LAW PROBE BY
BOARD OF 9 TO BE
ASKED OF HOOVER**

WASHINGTON, Jan. 10.—The senate judiciary committee went over proposals for an investigation on prohibition enforcement today and finally postponed action until Monday so that amendments to pending resolutions might be considered.

Senator Jones, republican, Washington, a dry and edge, republican, of New Jersey, a wet, have written resolutions on the subject and both appeared before the committee declaring they were in agreement as to the results to be obtained from the investigation. The Edge plan, which is agreeable to Senator Jones, would have Mr. Hoover name a commission of nine citizens of his own choosing after he becomes president, empowered to make "a searching investigation" of enforcement conditions.

Both the New Jersey senator and Senator Jones expressed confidence that Mr. Hoover would appoint men and women to the commission who would make an honest and non-partisan examination of the prohibition situation.

**ITALIAN ACE TO TRY
ROME-NEW YORK FLIGHT**

ROME, Jan. 10.—It was understood today that Capt. Arturo Ferrarin would pilot the Rome-New York air voyage of which General Italo Balbo, under secretary for aviation, spoke when he was leaving New York.

A semi-official announcement said "one of the greatest Italian aces" will accompany the under secretary on a flight to America. Capt. Ferrarin with the late Major Carlo Del Prete flew from Rome to South America last year.

WRESTLER NEARLY DIES

EUGENE, Ore., Jan. 10.—George ("Wildcat") Pete of Eugene, claimant to the world's junior middleweight wrestling championship, came near losing his life by asphyxiation in a room in a hospital at Wink, Tex., a few days ago, according to word received by friends here.

Pete became ill from influenza and was taken to a hospital, sharing a room with another man similarly afflicted. Someone left the gas on and the other man was asphyxiated, but the odor of the gas was discovered in time to save Pete's life, although he was unconscious.

When last heard from he was in a bad condition, but was expected to recover.

MEDICAL EXPERTS DISCUSS METHOD TO CONTROL FLU

No Specific Promised Thus
Far but Discovery of
Cause of Disease
Is Expected.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 10.—Physicians and health officers gathered here today for a national conference whose aim was to devise methods of definite control for

influenza. It met at a time when an outbreak of the disease had extended practically all over the United States, this outbreak being a factor in the calling of the conference by Surgeon-General Cummings. Approximately 60 were in attendance when the call to order came.

Public health service officials declared that influenza is thought to be a germ disease but that the bacillus causing it had never been isolated and that it was not known whether the malady resulted from one or several germs.

No Specific In Sight
Conference members who made it clear that they did not expect to find at this time a specific for influenza, but they hoped that before the meeting ended Saturday progress would be made toward the discovery of the cause and control of the disease. One result expected is further cooperation by surveys planned by the public

physicians and health officers to health service on the manifestations of the malady. Its rate of spread and the forms in which it appears. The present outbreak is reported to be comparatively mild but fear has been expressed that later in the winter it would be followed by another and more severe wave. This was the case in 1918, the second outbreak being a particularly virulent type.

Reports made to the census bureau for the week ending January 5 showed an increase in the death rate from influenza and pneumonia in sixty-seven cities 1,316 persons died from influenza during the week as compared with 968 deaths in the same cities during the previous week. The death rate from pneumonia in the cities reported was 2,232 for the week as compared to 1,517 the week before.
