With but five minutes left to play, the visitors ran up a six-point lead with a brilliant spurt, holding a margin of four tallies to the end.

LEGISLATORS OF OREGON FACING HARD PROBLEMS

simplified by a determination of the ways and means commencing to take the governor at his word on the need for drastic retrenchment and slash still deeper into the budget estimates, which the executive asserts have already been cut to the bone.

Readjustment of the automobile license fee schedule to reduce the assessments on old cars without impairing the finances of the highway department will provide a second major problem for the legislators. No less than half a dozen individual members of the house and senate have indicated their intention of offering solutions in shape of bills.

Further revision of the state insurance code, a favorable subject for legislative tinkering, will be undertaken if it is indicated, and revision of the blue sky law along lines suggested by a special commission named by the governor is in prospect.

The state banking department has indicated that it will seek amendments to the banking code to being incorporations under state regulation and control of the department, and there are persistent rumors of attempts to be made to legalize branch banking in Oregon.

To Aid Water Districts
Out of the numerous reports of the state reclamation commission, which for two years has been striving to effect a reorganization of the bankrupt irrigation districts of the state, it is likely there will come requests for supplementary legislation to relieve these districts of obligations they can never meet, such as their indebtedness to the state for guaranteed interest bonds. It has also been indicated by members of the commission that repeal of the state interest guarantee amendment will be strongly suggested to the lawmakers.

Highway Wants Coin
The announced intention of sponsors of the movement to secure early completion of the House-vetted coast highway through issuance of between six and seven million dollars in road bonds authorized but never sold, has already stirred up prospects of a heated battle. Many of the legislators have openly expressed opposition to any further sale of bonds for highway construction, and have indicated that they will seek to commit the state to a pay-as-you-go policy of highway work.

Extensive revision of the state fish and game laws, which may easily lap over into the sphere of

water power control, will be attempted by the organized sportsmen, it is announced, and the republican state central committee will try to correct minor details that have to do with absentee voting and the nomination of candidates for officers left vacant by resignations or death.

Governor Is Aided
Agreement of the various state institutions and departments to cooperate with the governor in a program of straight retrenchment will relieve the legislators of the heavy burden of making up the deficit for appropriations for new buildings and equipment. No requests for capital outlays are being included in the budget estimates except in the case of the penitentiary. Here congestion has become so acute, with more than 700 prisoners housed in an institution designed to provide accommodations for 500, that remodeling of the old boys' training school and construction of a combination garage and dormitory is deemed absolutely necessary, and the board of control has recommended that \$50,000 be made available for these improvements.

\$40,000 PAID TO FIX ASA KEYES TOLD AT TRIAL

you do, I'll kill you." A. L. Laaker, charged with Keyes in a second "fixing" case, Keyes, Ben Getzoff and Ed Rosenberg were at the dingy tailoring establishment on July 25, Pike testified. He said he heard Rosenberg cry in a loud voice "How much more do I owe you?"

On July 28, Pike testified Keyes arrived in front of the tailor shop in an expensive new automobile. In his opening address to the jury, District Attorney Byron Pitts declared that the prosecution would show that Ben Getzoff bought the car for Keyes.

Getzoff, son of Ben, the owner of the tailor shop, was drawn into the case as an alleged recipient of graft money, when Pike testified that some time early in February he saw Jack Rosenberg give a roll of bills to him. During the months of November and December, 1927, Pike recalled when he had finished reading his notes, he said Ed Rosenberg gave many checks to Ben Getzoff.

Frequently when Getzoff was not in his tailor shop, Rosenberg would leave the check in a desk drawer. Pike related a conversation with the elder Getzoff, in which the latter told him of "good times, prominent people and fashionable places" he and Keyes enjoyed together on a Christmas trip to Chicago in 1927.
