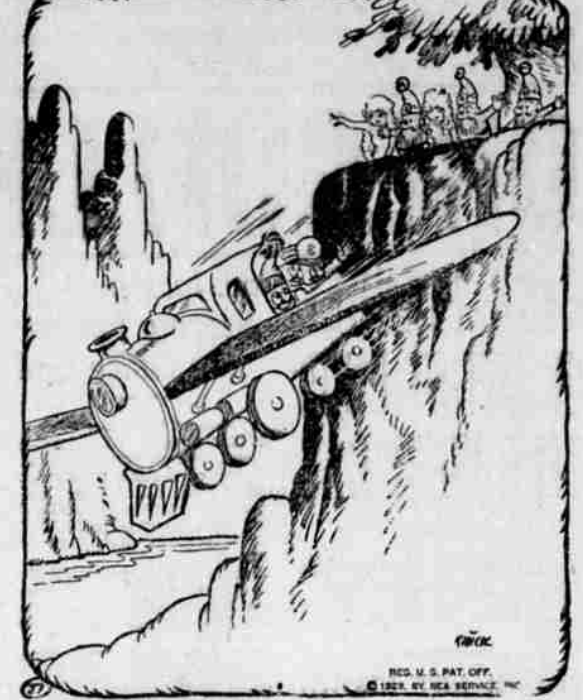
W. M. KELLER DIES AT SUTHERLIN SAT.
