MONTEVIDEO, Uruguay, Jan. 14.—Clemente Sanchez, Cuban heavyweight, was in a hospital today suffering from concussion of the brain after being knocked out by Mauro Gallano, of Uruguay, in a bout here on Saturday night.

After taking a terrible beating during the seventh round, Sanchez came out groggy for the eighth. He was battered to the floor by his Uruguayan opponent and failed to rise after the count of ten. A hospital examination revealed concussion.

INDIANA ISSUE IS TO DROP PRIMARY

INDIANAPOLIS, Jan. 14.—A well organized effort to restore the selection of senatorial gubernatorial candidates to party conventions will be made in the winter session of the Indiana assembly. The lawmakers met today. The top-heavy republican majority in senate and house, however, already are badly split over the issue, despite the fact that the party platform recommended that such candidates be named in convention. The platform also advocated that the presidential preference primary be abolished and that candidates for congress be nominated in district conventions. Party leaders favoring the abolition of the direct primary have used party loyalty as their rallying cry.

Neither republican nor democratic voters gave any gubernatorial candidate sufficient votes in the last primary to determine the contest there, and each was settled in convention. Harry G. Leslie, the new governor, was fifth in the primary. Frank C. Bailey, his democratic opponent, was first in the primary, and was named on the first ballot at the convention. The contest to remove the primary recalls that the late Senator Albert J. Beveridge was one of the pioneer exponents of the senatorial primary.

PREACHER STOCK MARKET PLUNGER 6 DAYS A WEEK

NEW YORK, Jan. 13.—Six days a week the Rev. Chester A. May, 24, is to trade in securities and the seventh day he is to preach. Parson May, minister of the Church of the Second Advent, in Brooklyn, he has bought a membership on the stock exchange for \$500,000, having worked up in eight years from messenger boy, meanwhile studying theology.
