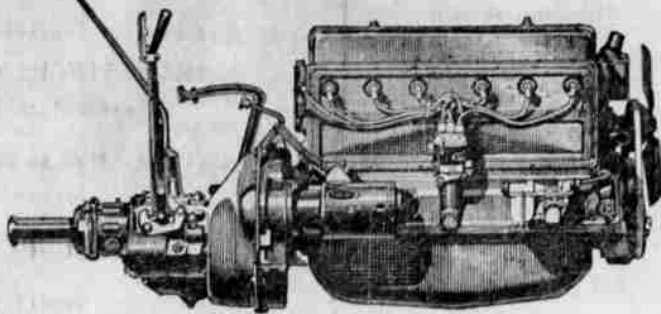

QUALITY AT LOW COST

BOOTH REFUSES TO QUIT AS HEAD OF SALVATION ARMY

LONDON, Jan. 16.—General Bramwell Booth, in a statement given to newspapers for publication today, announced that he would not resign as commander-in-chief of the Salvation Army.

This statement was understood to be the gist of his reply to the high council of the army, and the Daily Herald said it had been rejected by a show of hands. The council then proceeded immediately to a discussion of his fitness to govern the army.

It was not certain that the council would immediately appoint a successor after the vote of removal as it was supposed a majority might desire a respite of 24 hours before making a decision so momentous.

LORENZO BALL DEAD

He was a resident of the Middle and Canyonville district for many years and leaves numerous relatives. BOY'S MURDERER WILL DIE IN ELECTRIC CHAIR

JERSEY CITY, N. J., Jan. 16.—Peter Kudimowski today was sentenced to die in the electric chair during the week of February 24 for the murder of Joseph Scavelli, New York's East Side boy, in the Jersey City meadows.

TRIAL POSTPONED

The trial of Herbert Hastings of Winchester, accused of violation of the liquor law, was postponed until Tuesday, January 23, by the justice court today. The defendant, it was declared, is too ill to appear in court. The case has already had two postponements.

OREGON CITY FACTORY DESTROYED BY FIRE

OREGON CITY, Jan. 16.—Fire of undetermined origin early this morning destroyed the Starns manufacturing plant here with a loss estimated at \$15,000. Several large power transformers near the building caught fire and the city was in darkness from 2 to 3 o'clock.

PORTLAND LADY, 80, STRUCK BY AUTOIST

(Associated Press Local Wire) PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 16.—The apparent victim of a hit-and-run driver, Mrs. Flora Ferguson, 80, was in a hospital here today with a broken skull. She was not expected to recover.

Mrs. Ferguson was found shortly before noon, lying in the intersection of East Fourteenth and Knott streets. The position of the body and her injuries indicated that she had been struck by an automobile.

Traffic investigators today were watching by her bedside in the hope that she would regain consciousness long enough to tell of the accident.

CRASH OF MAIL PLANE BADLY BURNS PILOT

(Associated Press Local Wire) TOLEDO, Jan. 16.—J. L. Brandon, Detroit pilot, was badly burned when a Toledo-Detroit mail plane crashed near here today.

Arthur Ruseh, who was accompanying Brandon to Detroit, also was slightly burned. He said the plane ignited in the mail storage space from an unknown cause. The two tried to put out the fire with hand extinguishers without success.

MONTANA BOOSTS DIXON FOR CABINET POSITION

Dixon for appointment as secretary of the Interior by President-elect Herbert Hoover was given unanimous approval of the Montana legislature today. House and Senate resolutions endorsing Mr. Dixon's appointment.

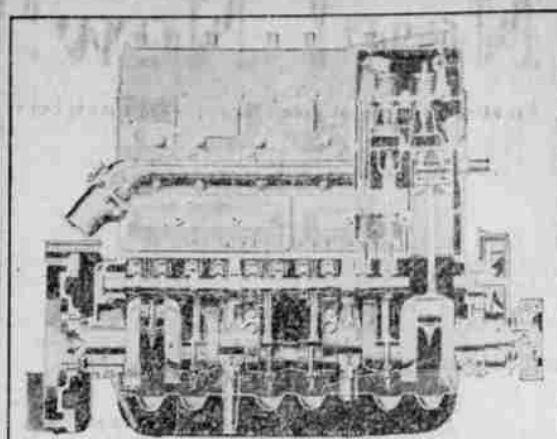
WHAT? NO BUSINESS

Hudson F-Head Motor Design

For these defects the solution has been found in the Hudson F-head design which gives us a combination valve-in-head and valve-in-side engine in that the intake valve is located in the head and the exhaust valve in the side.

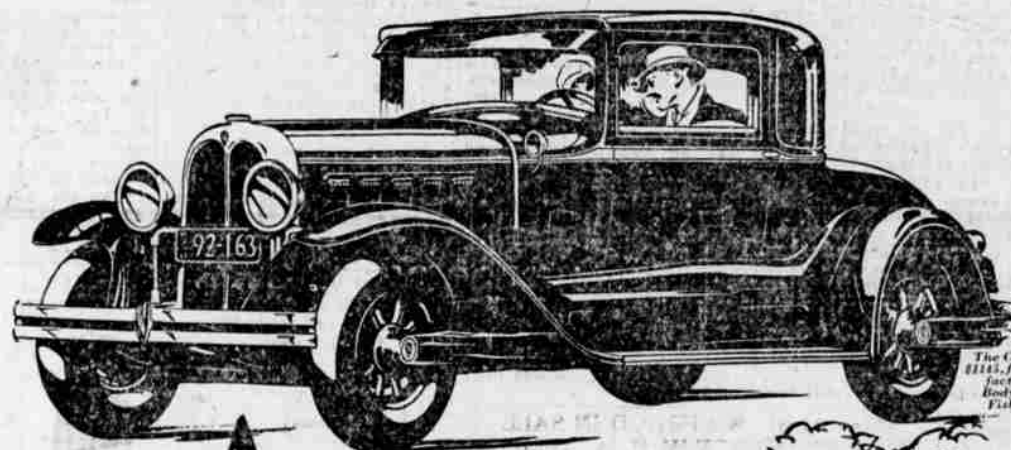
EXCHANGE TO BRANCH OUT DEALING IN FUTURES
