FOUR FIGHTERS ON ROSEBURG CARD GET SERIOUS INJURIES

The results from last night's boxing card resemble those of a football game rather than a fight. Boxers seldom sustain serious injuries in the ring, but last night's bouts were the exception. Four of the contenders in three bouts received very painful injuries.

In the main event both Joe Blackwell and Jack Kelly finished the bout with broken hands. Blackwell broke his right hand near the end of the 5th round, when he struck Kelly on the shoulder with a terrific right hand swing. In the 7th round Kelly broke his hand when he drove at Blackwell with an overhand right that landed on the Kansas boy's head. Both fighters continued to slug away until the end of the 14th round despite their injuries.

Following the fight Dr. E. V. Hoover made an X-ray examination of the hands of both fighters, revealing the nature of the injuries.

Al Morey, Glendale fighter, who was knocked out by "Tiger" Dunn, sustained a broken rib. Dunn caught Morey with a straight right near the beginning of the second round and the punch was sufficient to break a rib. Morey was knocked down a few seconds later and stayed down for the count rather than continue the fight.

Jimmie Marcell of Spokane, who was beaten in the second round by Pat Bedford, sustained a slight concussion of the skull, when his head hit the floor. He was knocked off his feet by a left uppercut to the jaw and as he came down he hit on the back of his head with sufficient force to knock him unconscious. It took considerable time to bring him out of it, but he finally recovered completely from the effects of the blow.

Fighters, as a rule, receive less serious injuries than competitors in other lines of major athletics, but last night's bouts were of such an intense nature that injuries resulted.

The fight cards held in Roseburg under the direction of Mr. Ward, the local promoter, have uniformly been better than in almost any other part of the state. While Portland and some of the larger towns can secure boxers of greater reputation and skill, yet there are few cards that show more real action than have been exhibited on the local programs. The results of the bouts last night indicate that there were no "setups" but that the fighters were well matched and were capable of giving and taking punishment.

Mr. Ward is arranging for another card to be presented Wednesday, January 24, when Pat Bedford of Medford and Joe Alago of Portland will be featured as the headliner. A heavyweight exhibition bout is also promised on the same card.

BODY ACCIDENT VICTIM WILL BE BURIED SEATTLE

The body of James M. Linn, Portland manager for the Fox Film company, who was burned to death when his car was wrecked on Camas mountain Monday night, was taken to Portland last night. L. N. Walton of the Fox company's office and E. C. Stanford of Seattle, a brother-in-law of the dead man, came to Roseburg yesterday to assist in the identification of the body which was burned beyond all recognition.

New York Eyed
The general situation in New York state, which is giving the president-elect concern both from its political and patronage aspects, was canvassed at conferences held by Mr. Hoover at his home with Charles D. General reports in political circles here have been that there is a disagreement among republican leaders in New York on the distribution of patronage. Recommendations along this line must come from the national and state party leaders since both of the senators from New York are democrats.

DISCHARGED ELEPHERS FIND OUTSIDE WORLD COLD

CARVILLE, La., Jan. 16.—Because there appears no one interested in adding them to start life anew after years of incarceration in the national lepers hospital here, two women prominent cases of leprosy and now able to leave the institution, probably will remain as voluntary patients.

The women, whose release was authorized today by acting governor General C. E. Pierce of the public health service at Washington, are a 30-year-old native of Louisiana and a 28-year-old Missa-Mipian.

All relatives of the two patients have died outside here of treatment, while the younger woman expressed a desire to remain with her mother who came here with the same disease five years ago.
