BROCCOLI GROWERS AT MYRTLE CREEK PLAN YEAR'S WORK

The broccoli growers of the Riddle and Myrtle Creek districts met yesterday at Myrtle Creek and completed their pooling arrangements to market their broccoli for this season. Most of the growers in those districts were present and considerable acreage was signed up in addition to that already in the pool.

The following officers were elected for 1929: Ray Allen, president; E. Vint Weaver, secretary-treasurer; E. V. Weaver was appointed as the pool's representative in all matters regarding the marketing of the crop.

Garcia & Maggini Co., who so satisfactorily marketed their 1927 and 1928 crops, was again appointed as sales agents for this season. A contract presented by this firm's agent, A. W. Baum, was discussed and accepted by the pool, with a few minor changes. It was decided to leave the membership list open for the time being, to allow those growers who have not already signed up to join the pool and take advantage of the loading and marketing facilities as above noted.

Mr. Goff of Melrose then addressed the meeting in the interest of the farm bureau, pointing out the advantages the growers might gain in joining this cooperative organization. He principally spoke of advantageous insurance rates obtainable through his bureau and the legislative influence an organized body of growers has on bills and measures that are continually coming up in the state legislature at every session.

Subscription lists to the broccoli pool are in the hands of the Riddle representative, Gilbert Ball, and E. V. Weaver of Myrtle Creek, and those growers who want to join the pool might do well to see them promptly.

The members of both houses are chiefly concerned in the taxation and auto license problems, so that they are holding off a great deal of new legislative matters are disposed of.

WILL ENDEAVOR TO SECURE FUNDS REPAIR ARMORY

A determined effort is to be put forth by local people during the present session of the legislature to secure appropriations for the repair of the city armory. The building is in a very bad state of repair and needs considerable work to bring it back to proper condition. The roof leaks badly, the floor in the main auditorium has become warped, both the exterior and interior need painting and tinning and the foundations need some attention.

Umpqua Post of the American Legion has adopted a resolution urging an appropriation to make the necessary repairs, and at the meeting of the Elks lodge last night a similar resolution was adopted.

Representative Walter Fisher is personally endeavoring to secure this appropriation at the present session and is preparing to take the necessary steps to have the project included in the money set aside by the legislature.
