

DOUBLE CRASH OF MARYLAND TRAINS KILLS 5 OF CREWS

(Associated Press Local Wire)
ABERDEEN, Md., Jan. 18.—Deaths from collisions yesterday of two passenger trains and a freight train near here amounted to five today, Leon Sweeting of Philadelphia, engineer of the north bound passenger train, dying at a hospital.

Four others of the train crews were killed in the double crash, the cause of which had not been definitely determined. Hundreds of passengers were shaken up but all were able to proceed on their trains to their destinations.

K. A. Klein, brakeman and T. W. Stewart, flagman, riding in the caboose of the freight train, which had just pulled on to the main track from a siding, were killed when the north bound passenger train struck the rear of the slower freight.

Telegraphed freight cars toppled on to the adjoining track and a heavy south bound train carrying sleeping cars and coaches for connections at Washington with other railroads to the south plowed into the wreckage. Engineer A. C. Terhune and Fireman T. J. Kar-

18 PORTLAND COPS UNDER SCRUTINY OF "SLAVE" ACCUSER

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 17.—Three police sergeants and fifteen patrolmen stood in a "line-up" here today, while a 21-year-old girl attempted to prove the ones who said she had seen taking protection money from keepers of second rate hotels.

The hearing was secret. Three times the girl passed up and down the line, with the officers in a different arrangement each time. On the third review the girl was seen to write in a notebook.

In her statement to the district attorney's office here, the girl charged that owners of second-rate hotels and rooming houses, taxi-drivers and girls were operating a vice ring. She said she had seen policemen in uniform take money from proprietors of the establishments.

The eighteen men comprised all males in the district in which the hotels named are located.

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LOMSKI FAVORED TO BEAT BRADDOCK IN BOUT TONIGHT

NEW YORK, Jan. 18.—Leo Lomski of Aberdeen, Wash., will be a 1 to 5 favorite over James J. Braddock of Jersey City, when they enter the ring for their ten round battle in Madison Square Garden tonight. But that should not worry Braddock particularly. He was on the short end of the betting when he battled Tuffy Griffiths at the garden some time ago but knocked out the highly-couted Sioux City light heavyweight in ten rounds.

Lomski, however, is one of the greatest of the present crop of light heavyweights. A crowd, smashing, tearing type of fighter, he has held his own with the best of the 175-pounders. He had the title within his grasp in the garden last year when he spilt Tommy Loughran, ruler of the division, onto the canvas. He could not keep the title-holder down, however, and Tommy danced and jabbed his way to the decision.

Braddock got little notice from the experts until he broke Pete Latona's jaw with a right hand punch. He followed this victory up with the sensational knockout of Griffiths. That earned him the bout with Lomski. Some of Leo's supporters would say that Braddock is not getting much of a "drunk" in tackling a rival as rugged and experienced as Lomski.

**GRANTS PASS MAN
WINS LAND DRAWING**

At a drawing held in the local land office yesterday afternoon Ben Wallace Constant, of Grants Pass, secured first rights to homestead an 80-acre tract of land near Grants Pass. Fifteen applications were submitted by ex-service men on this land, which was recently thrown open to entry after a power site filling had been withdrawn. Mr. Constant is a member of the Grants Pass American Legion post and is a linotype operator on the Grants Pass Courier.

The property is quite valuable as it is only 5 miles from town and is located near the Redwood highway and is in the irrigation district.

All applications received prior to 2 o'clock yesterday afternoon were treated as having been made simultaneously. The applications were then sealed in uniform envelopes and were tossed into a box where they were shaken up and the applications drawn one at a time and listed in the order of drawing. Should number 1 fail to complete his filing, then the opportunity goes to number 2, and so on in order of drawing. There is little doubt, however, that there will be any failure on the part of the winner to complete the filing, for the property is of much value.

**AMERICAN BANKERS NAMED
FOR REPARATIONS BOARD**

BARNUM'S "WILD MAN OF BORNEO" DIES IN POVERTY

PLATTESVILLE, Wis., Jan. 17.—The original "wild man of Borneo" was buried in Greenwood cemetery yesterday.

"Sylvester Henerahot" was the name they put on the headstone. He was 82 years old, and had spent his last years, broken in health, at the Grant county poor farm.

For 20 years Henerahot was Barnum's "wild man." Then came domestic trouble, and the wife of "the wild man of Borneo," and their five children, left him. Henerahot was found in a shack near the farm last week, cold, hungry and dying.

A few years ago he let his hair grow again and started looking for another wild man job but the times were different and the market for wild men was glutted. He went back home to spend his last days.
