tion, comes from Metake of Columbia county and seeks to protect school districts in their vested property rights by making it impossible, as under the present law, for any combination of school districts to divert some other school district of its high school and remove it to some other school district. The bill amends section 5299, Oregon law, as amended by chapter 72, general laws of Oregon for 1925.

The house also passed Thursday morning the senate joint memorial to congress asking for tariff protection against foreign competition of timber and timber products.

Speaker Hamilton appointed

Boxing Bill Studied

SALEM, Ore., Jan. 18.—Whether the American Legion should sponsor a measure in the legislature to create a state boxing commission that would supplant all local commissions was under discussion at a meeting of the legislative committee of the house here yesterday.

Another feature of any proposed change in the laws governing organized boxing, it was said, might be a provision that a share of the profits of boxing shows be used for the maintenance of employment bureaus for war veterans.

Administration of the veterans' state aid fund and other matters pertaining to welfare of veterans were under discussion.

It was said that the committee probably would not reach any con-

clusions for a week or ten days.

Yoon Memorial Planned

SALEM, Ore., Jan. 18.—Appropriation of \$2500 from the funds of the state highway commission for the location and erection of a suitable memorial to the memory of the late John B. Yoon, former chairman of the highway commission and one of the pioneers in the good roads movement in Oregon, will be proposed in a concurrent resolution to be introduced in the senate next Monday by Senator Joe Dunne.

Govt. Reorganization

SALEM, Jan. 17.—First battle lines in the present campaign to secure reorganization in the state government were thrown out Thursday morning when Hector MacPherson, of Linn county, chairman of the house committee on administration and reorganization, met with members of his committee and with Senator Bell of Lane and Linn county who is expected to be chairman of the senate committee on reorganization, but yet appointed.

Definite plans for procedure in the plan for consolidation of branches of government or a complete reorganization, will not be made by the committee until the sentiment of the governor is ascertained, and until committee members agree on the most feasible plan.

MacPherson will call a joint meeting of the senate and house committees with the governor next Monday at the governor's convenience.

Four Plans Outlined

Four plans for reorganization legislation were suggested to the

committee Thursday morning by MacPherson: first, to draft both a constitutional amendment and an administrative code and work for their submission to the voters of the state by this assembly at the next special general election; second, to confine the activities to a suitable constitutional amendment leaving the task of framing the enactment of a state code; third, to frame legislation and have this legislature submit it to the people providing for as complete a reorganization as may be possible without a constitutional amendment; fourth, to draft for passage by this legislature as complete a reorganization as possible without a constitutional amendment to become effective July 1, 1929, in which case a constitutional amendment might be submitted from the legislature making possible a complete reorganization or not.

Own Choice Stated
MacPherson favored the second course which he said would have the advantage of placing the issue clearly before the voters unembarrassed by the details as to salaries, department divisions and other intricacies of detail which could be used by enemies of the proposed change to defeat the movement.

A fifth course was also suggested by MacPherson—the drafting and submitting of a constitutional amendment as suggested under the second plan and the concentrating of one or more of the amendments which could be handled without the existence of a revision of the constitution. Establishment of a department of agriculture, possibly of departments of agriculture and education, were suggested.

Andrews of Multnomah county stressed the necessity of crystallizing sentiment in regards to the reorganization before the plan is taken to the entire legislature. His suggestion was that "the spotlight" be turned on the committee meetings, that the press be consulted and that hearings be held to secure the general sentiment regarding the best plans for consolidation.

Mining Code Changed.
SALEM, Ore., Jan. 17.—A mining law enacted by the Oregon legislature in 1864 will be repealed by Strayer's senate bill No. 4 which passed the senate today. The old act limits an individual to one claim on a lode. The repeal will allow the federal statute to control, which allows the individual any number of claims.

Speed License Plates.
Sheriffs and motor clubs would be authorized to receive applications for motor vehicle licenses and to issue the license plates by senate bill No. 17, which was introduced by Senator Joe Dunne today. It would require an accounting to the secretary of state each month. For each set of plates issued the sheriff and motor clubs would be allowed to retain the sum of 10 per cent out of the license fee, together with the amounts necessarily expended for postage. The object of the bill is to facilitate the distribution of license plates which is now done entirely by the motor vehicle division of the secretary of state's office.

The teachers' retirement fund bill, prepared in Portland, was introduced in the senate today by the joint Multnomah delegation.

Two More Jobs?
Senator Dunne today introduced a bill that would increase the membership of the state industrial accident commission from three to five, one of whom would be a woman. It would leave the salaries at \$2600, the amount received by the commissioners at present.

Former Florida Man Buys Interest Local Auto Camp
F. W. Green, who resides on the Dixonville road east of Roseburg, has purchased an interest in Camp View, the fine auto camp located just north of Roseburg, and will assist Mr. John Ewell in handling the business in the future.

Mr. Green came to Roseburg a year ago from Florida, and was so well pleased with the prospects here that he decided to remain and so brought his family here.

Mr. Ewell and Mr. Green are planning on immediate improvements at the camp in preparation for the coming tourist season.

Northcott Does Poor Job in Role of Own Attorney

RIVERSIDE, Cal., Jan. 18.—Gordon Stewart Northcott, in the capacity of attorney for himself, today was convicted by law experts to have lost an advantage he enjoyed in the cross-questioning of Sanford Clark, his young nephew and chief accuser in preparation for grilling the boy on whose story the state is basing much of its effort to send Northcott to the gallows for murdering Lewis and Nelson Arnold and an unidentified Mexican lad, the defendant-attorney spent much of his leisure time framing the questions he would ask. Today, however, the 22-year-old Canadian correspondence school lawyer had no advance knowledge of what witness the state would call against him next.

No witness on the stand when the court adjourned yesterday, and this morning Northcott was faced with the necessity of carrying on his fight without advance preparation. Northcott, who has lost much of his posing attitude during the past two days, apparently is taking seriously the legal aspects of his self-imposed counselship. He comes to court loaded with a brief case and law books and in placing motions and objections before the court, he is punctilious in quoting the chapter and section of the legal code in which he bases his contention.

The young accused murderer has begun to marshal his witnesses and last night he placed in the hands of the court clerk six subpoenas with the request that they be served.

SENATOR NORBLAD WILL PRESENT TWO IMPORTANT BILLS

SALEM, Ore., Jan. 18.—Senator Norblad will introduce a bill providing that the state of Oregon take over the lease of the training school grounds of the Oregon national guard on Clatsop Plains in Clatsop county. This was recommended by Governor Patterson in his message.

The lease dates from March 1, 1927, to February 28, 1937, and provides that the state or federal government may buy the tract of 363 acres at any time during the life of the lease, for the sum of \$39,000. Clatsop county has spent \$15,000 in the construction of a road into the camp, and the citizens of the county have paid the lease for the first two years, which is \$2553.50 annually. The land is privately owned. The Norblad bill provides for a continuing appropriation of that amount each year.

In the hope of relieving the state from the expense, however, Norblad will also introduce a memorial to congress asking that the federal government buy the

To Aid Young Lawyers
Senator Norblad will also introduce a bill Monday providing that graduates of the law school of the University of Oregon shall be admitted to the practice of law in Oregon upon submission of their diplomas and without further examination.

At present the board of bar examiners of the state bar association conducts an examination each year which must be passed by all persons wishing to practice in the state, regardless of what schools have given certificates.

Sensor Norblad explains that practically all eastern states admit applicants on their diplomas if the diplomas are from state institutions.

JUDGE HAMILTON TO HOLD COURT COOS CO.
