EXPLOSION DOES \$150,000 DAMAGE; 6 PERSONS HURT

DETROIT, Jan. 18.—Six persons were injured seriously and a furniture store, a motion picture theatre, a grocery and a restaurant were destroyed by an explosion at Gratiot and Harper avenues shortly before 1 o'clock this morning. The damage was estimated at \$150,000. No one was killed.

Police believed the blast was planned as reprisal for the fatal shooting of an Italian marcher in a Columbus day parade here last October.

Two of the injured are under police guard in a hospital for questioning and a third man found hiding in the vicinity is held for investigation.

Detectives investigating the blast said it was caused by a gasoline tank in the rear of a furniture store. Relatives said he left with his family for Chicago yesterday after having received several threatening letters.

Chicago Bombing
CHICAGO, Jan. 18.—A dynamite bomb exploded in the hallway of a six-story building on the west side shortly after midnight today, tearing a hole in the floor. None of the persons living in the building was hurt, though the entire structure was shaken.

Anthony Panicki, owner, blamed labor troubles. It was the seventh bomb of the year in Chicago.

When he was arrested Saturday, Walker says he is a native of Milan county, Texas, and was born in 1901.

Fred Nave, held here with Walker and also wanted in many cities and towns for crimes of various sorts, refused to make any admissions.

Oklahoma Wants Walker
While the questioning of the pair was under way, a telegram came from Fred Bowles, sheriff of Pontotoc county, Oklahoma. It stated that Walker was wanted as the leader of the gang that held up a bank at Alton, Okla.

"Walker has been positively identified," the telegram read. "Conviction is certain. Curtis Black, member of the gang, gives life and half reward if reward of \$500 is paid. Walker is turned over to me."

Many Cities Heard From
Telegrams, letters and telephone calls continue to pour into detective headquarters from all parts of the southwest. More cities continued to be heard from and in most cases Walker and Nave seem to be wanted mainly for slaying.

Buffalo police have received telegraph requests to hold the two for Austin, Texas; Fort Worth, Texas; Dallas, Texas; and Wellington, Texas. Further, Oklahoma City, Washington City, Okla.; Eldorado, Ark.; Colorado Springs, Colorado City and Lamar, Colo.

The pair, police say, are implicated in eight killings. Daylight robberies of banks seem to have been their forte.

STUDENT BOARD VOTES TO OUST ENOCH BAGSHAW

hoped that it would reverse the board if possible.

Shortcomings Cited
Student leaders carefully refrained from expressing their objections to Bagshaw during an open meeting which preceded the executive session. But when they were closeted they declared that "Bagshaw" was generally unpopular.

That the majority of the student body had lost confidence in him, that he lacked drawing power at the gate, that he failed to draw football material from state high schools, that his continued presence as head coach would be a financial loss to the student body, and that he would have to be removed at some time and there was no use dodging the issue longer.

Bagshaw's supporters, however, said they had no intention of dropping their fight until every means of retaining him in his present capacity had failed. Rumors were current that if the board's action stands the assistant coaches and the faculty committee will walk out. They refused to discuss their plans.

Bagshaw Has Support
Bagshaw's proponents were far in the majority among speakers at an open meeting that preceded the executive session of the board. Ten men, mostly former football players, spoke in favor of the coach, while three alumni urged that his contract be bought out.

Among those that supported Bagshaw were Chuck Carroll, all-American halfback; Paul Jensen, captain-elect; Clarence Dicks, 1925 captain, and George Guttersen, 1925 captain.

They all declared that Bagshaw was an excellent coach, that the football players liked him and that his opposition was from those who had never fought on the gridiron.

"I Am Fired"—Bagshaw
The attitude of the board of control, Bagshaw said, "in voting to relieve me of my duties as head football coach, merely indicates on

their part their desire to evade the issue. It was my understanding that I was to be fired as head football coach and that in addition I was to perform such other additional duties as the board might assign to me.

"I am relieved as head coach. That means in plain language to me that I am fired."

"I can make no other interpretation of the situation."

The board's vote, after several hours' discussion, was 11 to 3 against Bagshaw. Smith Troy, president of the student body, who had called the special meeting, did not vote.
