CUMANAS RUN DESCRIBED BY EYE WITNESSES

Earthquake Destroyed All Buildings in Seaport of Venezuela.

TIDAL WAVE ENSUES

Persons on Docks Thrown Into Sea; Dutch Vessel Narrowly Escapes Being Sunk.

(Associated Press Leased Wire) CARACAS, Venezuela, Jan. 18.—The Dutch steamship Commewijne, from which first news of the disastrous earthquake which struck the seaport of Cumana was received several days ago, has arrived at Caracas with a large number of persons injured in the quake. Eyewitnesses of the disaster were interviewed here with the arrival of the vessel and the newspaper El Universal today published the following details:

The quake, which lasted thirty seconds, was felt at 7:30 o'clock in the morning of January 17. Every building in the city was destroyed, persons on the docks were thrown into the sea. A tidal wave which followed wrecked sailboats and for a time endangered the Commewijne. The steamer escaped only through skillful maneuvering by her captain.

A factory building, the cathedral, fort, museum, state capital and prison were all in ruins in less than a minute. Paving stones from the sidewalks and other objects

flew high into the air and loud subterranean rumblings were heard. Large cracks appeared in the ground.

Curious Escapes
By a curious chance, the equestrian statue of Marshal Sucre, chief general of the famous liberator, Simon Bolivar, escaped damage and from its granite pedestal looked down upon the ruins of the marshal's birthplace.

At the moment of the earthquake, sixty girls were attending religious exercises in the chapel of the school of the Sisters of Charity. The school building fell in ruins, but the chapel, with its image of Christ, alone remained standing, together with Sucre's statue and a new concrete bridge across the river Manzanares.

The Venezuelan government has sent \$100,000 as its first contribution for distribution among the poor and homeless in the stricken region.

Rapid Fire Volcano
BATAVIA, Java, Jan. 19.—Four hundred eruptions during the past 24 hours are reported to have taken place on the famous island volcano, Krakatau, which is showing a rapid increase in its renewed activities.

Eye witnesses report that burning material has been hurled several thousand feet high with vapor clouds going still higher, affording an imposing spectacle, especially at night when flames from the crater added to the impressive scene. Unceasing tremors are felt on the sea.

No loss of life or damage has been reported thus far from the volcanic activities on isolated Krakatau, which already have lasted many months.

COORDINATION OF STAGE LINES PLANNED BY S. P.

Arrangements Made for the Operation of Newly Purchased Lines.

TO BE INDEPENDENT

Terminals and Schedules Will Remain Unchanged but Tickets Will Be Interchangeable.

Control of Oregon Stages Incorporated and the Coast Auto Lines acquired by the Southern Pacific Motor Transport company was announced by J. A. Ormandy, assistant passenger traffic manager of the Southern Pacific, following his return here yesterday from San Francisco where he discussed plans for the operation of the newly acquired transport lines with T. B. Wilson, vice president and manager of the Southern Pacific Motor Transport company.

The properties of the Oregon Stages Incorporated and the Coast Auto Lines will be operated independently except insofar as coordination of the newly acquired stage lines with the operation of the S. P. stages may be brought about to improve the service now rendered, according to Ormandy. They will continue to operate in their respective fields and from their present terminals. The personnel organization of the companies will also continue as they are.

Tickets of the acquired companies will soon be made interchangeable with those of the Southern Pacific Motor Transport company, said Ormandy. "The combined equipment consisting of 145 stages, interchange of tickets and other conveniences to the public resulting from coordinated effort will improve the motor transport service in Oregon. The acquired control of the two companies is a step typical of the present trend in the development of motor transportation throughout the United States. Similar and more extensive consolidations have long since taken place in those states which preceded Oregon in extensive use of this kind of transportation.

"The Southern Pacific Motor Transport company in acquiring control of these Oregon stage lines is meeting the public's demands for a real, through service which only can be given by a large, well-equipped, properly equipped, financed and having insured responsibility."

The purchase marks further expansion of stage services by the Southern Pacific Motor Transport company and further coordination of railway and highway transportation. The company now operates a complete system of stages plying the more important rail lines in Oregon and is the largest operator of motor transport in this state.

The Oregon Stages Incorporated operate between Portland and Astoria. The Coast Auto Lines operate in the Coast Bay section. The coordination of these lines with the present operating lines of the Southern Pacific Motor Transport is a logical step in uniting routes and schedules so that they may better serve the public.

Ormandy stated that the company has plans under way for the retirement of obsolete motor equipment and its replacement with comfortable high powered and modern equipped stages. Some of the stages are now under construction and will be placed in service early in February.

DRY LAW GESTURE PURELY PARTISAN. SENATORS CHARGE

WASHINGTON, Jan. 18.—A charge that the prohibition enforcement personnel was mobilized to help the republican party in the last election was made in the senate today by Senator Robinson, of Arkansas, the democratic leader and candidate of his party for vice-president in the recent campaign.

Employees of the prohibition service he declared, were informed as to the course they were to pursue in the campaign "where to go, how to vote, and what influence to exert."

The senator made his statement during a discussion of the proposed increase of \$25,000,000 for prohibition enforcement at a Senate hearing. He declared that politics was the motivating influence in the appointment of prohibition enforcement workers.

direct enforcement work in their state but he was appointed only after a representative of the prohibition bureau had twice asked Norris if he knew his man was a democrat. The man's superior qualifications were not considered, Norris declared, but his political connection was given great weight. A move to change the proposal of Senator Jones, republican, Washington, for an appropriation of \$250,000 to permit the prohibition department to disseminate information urging law observance, so that the information instead would be distributed under the direction of the president was made by Senator Glass, democrat, Virginia, who offered a substitute to that effect. The Jones proposal also would authorize \$1,002,000 for additional field workers.

NEW BOY SCOUT TROOP FORMED AT WINCHESTER BAY

Registration was received this morning for a new organization of Boy Scouts at Winchester Bay. There are not many boys there of scout age so that a troop of any size is impossible. For a small group the organization name is known as a Farm or Home patrol. Any number of boys from three to eight may organize for such a unit. It is not necessary to have any organization of adults sponsor these groups but it is required that three fathers vouch for the character of the man to be in charge of the unit as scoutmaster.

Mr. Thomas E. Grae, principal of the Winchester Day school is heading this "Home" patrol. The boys already registered are: Clyde Parker, Richard Dayles, Murray Graff, Frank Andrews. Other communities are planning on just such organizations. A meeting was held at the Bridge school Tuesday evening with parents and boys of that community in which five scouts from Roseburg troop two made a good demonstration. Moving pictures of last summer's camp were shown and a short talk made by the scout executive. A similar meeting is to be held at Glendale on the 30th and another at Camas Valley soon.

FORMER WIFE OF O. L. MILLS WOULD DIVORCE NUMBER 2

(Associated Press Leased Wire) PARIS, Jan. 18.—Lady Dukes has filed suit for divorce against Sir Paul Dukes, British author and musician. She was formerly the wife of Ogden L. Mills, undersecretary of the United States treasury.

Lady Dukes and Sir Paul were married secretly at Nyack, N. Y. in October, 1922. She was born Margaret Stuyvesant Rutherford, daughter of Lewis K. Rutherford, in New York on November 11, 1891. Her mother later married the late William K. Vanderbilt.

Lady Dukes was married to Ogden Mills in France on September 20, 1911, and was granted a divorce from him on July 10, 1919.

Sir Paul was knighted for brilliant work as head of the British secret service in Russia in the early days of the soviet.

Lady Dukes appeared on the New York stage in April, 1925, in Alexander Gavrilov's "The Ballet Moderne." The couple's address was given as 150 Riverside Drive, New York, in the petition.

GRAND JURY WILL PROBE PORTLAND'S BROTHEL TRAFFIC

(Associated Press Leased Wire) PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 18.—The Multnomah county grand jury has assumed responsibility for a complete investigation of charges of a 21-year-old girl that many cheap hotels and second-rate rooming houses here are operated as brothels, and that she has seen policemen in uniform accept money from the proprietors or operators of such houses.

The girl admits that she was a member of a wide-spread vice ring involving from fifteen to twenty rooming houses and hotels, and from 50 to a hundred young girls.

Stanley Myers, district attorney, under whose direction the grand jury investigation is to go forward, declared today that every piece of information available would be presented to the jury. Witnesses other than the girl, who declare they have knowledge of the paying of graft money to policemen, will be called, the district attorney said.

Myers declined to reveal his plans for the investigation, but it is known that those plans include the calling in of the rooming house and hotel proprietors, who will be questioned under oath. These persons will face perjury charges in case the stories they tell the grand jury are later proved to be false.

LETTERMEN AND OLDER PLAYERS BACK BAGSHAW

Student Body's Ouster of Washington Coach Not Yet Approved.

FACULTY UNDECIDED

Contract Has Three Years to Run; Play Strategy Highly Praised by George Wilson.

(Associated Press Leased Wire) SEATTLE, Jan. 19.—The fight over Enoch Bagshaw, football coach of the University of Washington whose virtual ouster was ordered yesterday by the student body of control, was at a standstill today.

The faculty athletic committee, which has the right to review the board's action, was to meet as soon as it received a legal opinion on whether the coach could be legally dismissed before the remaining three years of his contract have expired.

The committee members, along with football players who have been coached by the "little giant" during his eight years at Washington, are regarded as Bagshaw's staunchest supporters.

Faculty Opinions
Dean Alfred Scheweppe, head of the university law school, rendered an opinion yesterday that the board's action relieving Bagshaw of his duties as head coach to be assigned other work by the board was tantamount to a dismissal and therefore subject to the ruling of the faculty committee.

When Dr. M. Lyle Spencer, president of the institution, received Scheweppe's opinion, he authorized the committee to review the board's action. In a later statement he said the students would have the ultimate decision "so long as they acted within the scope of their authority."

Lettermen Back Coach
While those in control of the situation tried to straighten out the legal tangle, the Husky club, composed of football lettermen, added its moral support to the coach's cause. At a special meeting last night the club ousted Lloyd Turncliffe, senior representative on the board of control, and former president of the club, for his stand against the football manager. The club refused Turncliffe's offer to resign.

Then club members unanimously passed a resolution urging that Bagshaw be retained as head coach.

"We want some voice as to who will coach us," said Herman Brix, former tackle and one of America's shot putting representatives in the Olympic games, who acted as spokesman for the club. "To a man we are behind Baggy. Furthermore, we demand some power in deciding this matter. Football players themselves are really the best judges of a coach's ability."

Star Lends Bagshaw
The opinion of Bagshaw's proteges was expressed by George Wilson, professional football player, who was the first outstanding backfield man developed by the Husky mentor.

SUICIDE'S FIANCE DROPS FROM SIGHT WITH HER MONEY

(Associated Press Leased Wire) SPOKANE, Wash., Jan. 19.—Leonid Fink, Seattle artist, was missing today from the hospital where he was reported yesterday in a state of collapse over the death of Miss Ruth McDonald, his wealthy fiancée. His attorneys disclaimed knowledge of his whereabouts but admitted Fink did not return to his hotel and "does not want to be disturbed."

It is understood Fink has made no arrangement to assign bonds valued between \$150,000 and \$187,000, given him by Miss McDonald to his mother. His attorneys pointed out that their client's possession of the bonds was legal.

Miss McDonald committed suicide last Friday by inhaling carbon monoxide fumes from the exhaust of her automobile.

POLISH MINISTER

TO U. S. HAS SEEN CAREER OF PERIL

Thrilling prison escapes, banishment from their native land, bomb plots and the harried, hunted life of revolutionaries under the Russian czar have been the lot of Filipowicz and his wife, Wende Krahelska, in their adventurous careers as Polish patriots.

Irrepressible in his soul, first for the creation of an independent and sovereign Poland and later for the development and stabilizing of the new republic, Filipowicz has been engaged in the work of Polish nationalism since his early youth. Likewise, his wife has done her bit for Polish freedom.
